Farmers Co-Operative Gin Society Completing Extensive Improvements

G. W. Fleming, manager of the Farmers Co-Operative Gin Society, is happy to announce a number of needed improvements to the gin property. Work will be completed in the next few days.

To begin with, the eye-sore office building was torn down to the ground and the old outmoded scales taken out. A new concrete foundation supports the new office building; new Howe scales replace the old scales. The office building is of modern design, with every detail planned for the utmost efficiency. Overall size of the structure is 20x34 feet, consisting of a large front office, private office for cotton buyers, store room and wash room. The inside walls are knotty pine, varnished to a pleasing high gloss, ceilings of Celotex and floors of inlaid linoleum. The entire atmosphere is pleasing and one in keeping with the dignity of a prosperous organization.

Housing for the mill and grinder is being erected on the West end of the Gin lots. The old building formerly stood North of the old office, blocking traffic to and from the scales, which were formerly on the West side of the

office. Now the scales are on the South side, easily accessible, even for long trailers and trucks. A new burr burner has been constructed West of the gin. It is made of fire brick, the latest in design and efficiency. Dimensions are: 20 feet in diameter, 26½ feet tall; a round-hot box capable of digesting all the burrs the gin can pour into it.

This year the No. 2 gin, located across the tracks, was sold. It has been held for many years in reserve to take care of emergencies.

Every year since 1928, the Farmers Co-Op Gin has paid its members a dividend. In 1947 the dividend amounted to \$6.50 per bale to members.

Up until Wednesday of this week, twelve bales of cotton have been ginned at this gin. Prospects now are that the cotton crop in this area will be about average or above.

The management and the members wish to offer thanks to the City of Burkburnett for moving a number of light poles from the gin lots. With the building program and rearrangement, some of the poles were in the way.

United Gas Office On Avenue C Undergoing Complete Face-Lifting

Monday a crew of workmen began tearing out the front of the brick building next door to the Star office which has been used as office space for the United Gas Corporation for many years. A-B-C contractors of Wichita Falls has the job. W. J. Ainsworth of Burkburnett will do the plumbing work. Jude Willingham, also of Burkburnett, has charge of the electrical work.

Instead of two doors opening to the office from the street, one large door in the center will grace the remodeled structure. On either side of the door, large plate glass windows will admit light to the display room. Plate glass will be installed in the corner where the door used to be, also on the South Side where 2 small windows formerly were. Everything inside the building is being torn out. A new concrete floor will be poured, over

which will be asphalt floor covering. The walls are being scraped down for a new coat of plaster. Sagging ceilings are being leveled up and will be beautified by Celotex. Partition in back of the office space will be removed and replaced with a plaster wall.

When the office is re-occupied all equipment will be new. Counter, desks, chairs, cabinets, etc. will be in keeping with the new appearance of the building.

To complete the job, central heating and air conditioning units are being installed. W. W. Carter, local maanger, expects to occupy the new office in about 30 days. While the remodeling is in process the Gas office is located at 120½ Main Street, in the McGee studio building, next door to Lax Music Store.

W. A. Roberts, local real estate and insurance agent, owns the building.

Crowding Into The Cities

The population of the United States at the present time is 146,116,000. There is a notable shift that shows an increased population in industrial centers and resort areas away from agricultural regions. There is a real boom on the Pacific Coast that shows an increase in population of 45 per cent in California, 49 per cent in Oregon, 40 per cent in Washington, 35 per cent in Arizona, 28 per cent in Arizona, 28 per cent in Nevada. In Florida and the District of Columbia there is an increase of 29 per cent in each case. The only slumps reported were 6 per cent in South Dakota, 2 per cent in Kansas, 3 per cent in Mississippi and 12 per cent in Montana.

Strangely enough the growth of U. S. population for the year just ended has been about double the prewar rate. Births exceeded deaths by 2,242,000 over last year.

GETTING READY TO HOUSE BIRDS

This is the time when many poultry raisers should be thinking about housing their birds for the fall and winter. Housing is an important task, one which requires plenty of preparation. If the job is well done, it means the poultry raiser has taken the first step toward achieving high winter egg production and toward giving the flock the protection it needs from disease.

Make Necessary Repairs
The first step in preparing for housing is to make whatever re-

pairs are necessary in the laying house. Plugging up cracks and crevices, replacing broken windows, and nailing down loose

boards will help eliminate drafts. Examine the roof for any needed repairs. Give the entire building a thorough going over and make a list of the things that will have to be done and the materials you will need to complete the repair work.

When the house is in good shape take all movable equipment outside and give it a thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Then allow it to dry in the sun. Remove all loose litter and droppings with shovel and broom. Then take a hoe and give the floor and roosting pits a thorough scraping. Sweep the ceilings, walls, nests and floors, eliminating all cob webs, dust and other filth.

Clean and Disinfect
Next scrub the floor and roost areas with hot water and strong soap. And while the interior of the house is still damp spray the walls, floor, and fixtures with a reliable disinfectant. Then allow the house to air and dry.

Now you're ready to place litter on the floor. Many poultrymen cover the floor with a thin layer of sand before adding the litter. This practice, they say, prevents litter from sticking. Select a dry, absorbent litter and scatter it about the floor. Litter should be about 2 or 3 inches deep. Continue to add litter as required during the season.

After litter has been placed in the house put all equipment in place and get ready to bring the birds off the range.

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FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

QUESTION: How should plaster walls that show dampness through the wallpaper be treated?
ANSWER: I would not advise using black asphaltum for this purpose. Your wallpaper may be pulpy and absorbent, and probably the plaster also absorbs and holds much of the dampness from the air.

QUESTION: There is a "ring" in the ceiling where some patching had been done. Will this correct itself if the ceiling is repatched after a lapse of several months?
ANSWER: It is possible that the plaster may have disintegrated from excessive dampness or leakage, and the discoloration should be examined by a plasterer and taken care of before paper is hung.

U. S. Registers Cold War Victory; Moscow Talks Headed for Failure; Truman, Congress in Budget Fight

COLD WAR Villian Revealed

At last something had happened that could and did make people understand what this Russian situation was all about. It had been pretty difficult going for the world public to perceive the basic truth when it was obscured by confusing circumstances like currency reform in Berlin, control of the German Ruhr, a maze of spies at home and political annihilation of small European nations by Russia.

What it all amounted to, as far as most people were concerned, was a mess of verbal potage that they wouldn't trade for the comics page any day of the week. Then it happened. Mrs. Oksana Kosenkina, the Russian school teacher, jumped from a third-story window in the Soviet consulate in New York to achieve the liberty she so desperately sought.

Mikhail Samarin, the other Russian school teacher, was wanted by the Russians but managed to retain his freedom. Refusing the Soviet demand that he return to Russia, he tossed this scallion for the Communists into the propaganda war: "I won't return to death."

And finally, in England Olympic athletes from Czechoslovakia and other Soviet satellite states were steadfastly refusing to return to their home countries after their taste of a free land.

It all added up to the biggest break the western nations have had yet in their propaganda battle with the East.

This was simple, basic, understandable: These people from the land of the Soviets—the schoolteachers and athletes—utterly despised the idea of returning. They simply would not do it.

Thus, it was in the end a few ordinary persons who destroyed the elaborate fabrication which Moscow had constructed to represent to the world the ideal way of life that existed in the Soviet Union.

One Voice of America spokesman said: "This is what we have been waiting for in our war of words. This is something that can be easily understood by people all over the world."

The Communists tried frantically to cover this breach in their curtain by calling it, among other things, an underground conspiracy in the U. S. to wreck any possibility for peace between the two nations.

But the villain's disguise was off now and everyone knew him. Try as they might, the Communists never would be able to explain why two obscure school teachers would seek their freedom so desperately, nor why Russia was so determined to get them back.

PARLEY: Failure

From Moscow came crushing news for all those hoping for peace: The talks between the western democracies and Russia were reported to be on the brink of failure. Barring a last-minute miracle in the conferences between the U. S., England, France and Russia, the East-West stalemate would continue, along with the Soviet blockade of Berlin.

It was reported that the western powers were getting ready to stay in Berlin under conditions of economic siege, planning to maintain and enlarge the air lift to supply the 2.5 million persons in their sectors.

There was, however, one slim chance that utter failure could be avoided. The three western ambassadors were scheduled for a final talk with Premier Stalin, and it was a possibility that the negotiations might be rescued. But the odds against agreement stood at about five to one, officials said.

If the conference ended in the anticipated failure, it was thought that the Big Four governments would try to conceal the extent of the fiasco from the public in order to avoid the even greater degeneration of East-West relationships that undoubtedly would result if everyone knew just how hopeless the case was.

However, if the Moscow talks did break up in futility it would not mean necessarily that all similar negotiations would be abandoned. It would mean that any further effort to reopen them would be delayed until at least next spring—possibly March—after the election and inauguration.

Coffee and milk, by a wide margin, remain the favorite beverages of American drinkers who will down nearly eight billion gallons of coffee and nearly seven billion gallons of milk in 1948.

BUDGET: Unbalanced

Will there be a surplus or deficit in the government's budget at the end of this fiscal year?

It was a question good for a lot of politics: haymaking, and both President Truman and his Republican opponents in congress went to work with a will.

Mr. Truman's forecast was that the government would be 1.5 billion dollars in the red next June. In his mid-year budget report he blamed the Republicans "ill-timed" five-billion-dollar tax cut for putting the nation back in the hole.

Stricken with horror, GOP lawmakers rapped back sharply: Far from harboring a deficit, they said, the treasury will close its books next June with a surplus of between five and six billion dollars.

The President had juggled figures for political campaign effect, the Republicans charged bitterly.

"Another of the weird distortions which are coming from the White House while its occupant is a nervous candidate for re-election," commented Sen. Styles Bridges (Rep., N. H.) mordaciously.

Mr. Truman had said that federal expenditures this year would hit 42 billion dollars, while Republicans claim that actual expenses will total 38 billion. They charged, too, that the President had figured the national income 3.4 billion dollars too low for the year.

Just who was right in the matter, if anyone, was impossible to say. The entire affair had many of the characteristics of the kind of tempest in a teapot that is a run-of-the-mill event in an election year.

Actually, even if President Truman's estimate turns out to be the correct one, the books still will show an "adjusted surplus," despite the 1.5-billion-dollar operating deficit. That is because congress provided that three billion of the surplus last year should be shifted to this year's accounts to help meet foreign aid costs.

PSYCHIATRY: War Cure

How can the world prevent wars? Use of psychiatry would be a big help, according to Dr. John Milne Murray, professor of clinical psychiatry at Boston university.

A psychiatrist, he said, is one who seeks the reason for the failure of human relations in the individual rather than in the mass. "But," he asked, "what is war except a mass breakdown of inadequate relations ending up in a tremendous burst of self-destruction?"

Take, for instance, the reactions of a child trying to adjust itself to a harsh environment. Under stress the child may revert to archaic forms of behavior, and that is very similar to the impulse of destruction which, on a world-wide scale, becomes war.

Therefore, knowledge of mass human reactions should be employed to abolish war, Dr. Murray concluded.

Actually, it's all very simple. If people didn't act the way they do they wouldn't have to fight each other. The trick is to make them understand that.

HUSBAND AND WIFE: Team or tug-of-war?

Team or tug-of-war? In times when more and more homes are splitting apart, it is refreshing to read the story of one home that stuck together.

We do not know whether these two ever had children; no doubt their home was happier if they had. But we do know their names. No one who ever spoke of them mentioned one without the other. You could not think of Aquila without thinking of his wife Priscilla (or Prisca for short), or vice versa. They were displaced persons, but that did not keep them down.

Family Trade Union

LIKE ALL JEWS of that time, they had a specialty, a trade they had learned. In this case someone had taught Prisca the same trade (or did she learn it from her husband?), so the two of them formed a sort of trade union. They were tentmakers, working not only in heavy tent-cloth but in the tanned skins of which many tents in that time were made.

Their home was a workshop, their hands were bent by long use of hard tools, very likely they initiated their produce. P & A tents were good tents. Their business was good, for we know they always had room for another guest, for another hand at the workbench. That was one thing helping their marriage to stick.

How many husbands and wives today are working teams? One reason why divorces are more common in cities than on farms is that the city man and his wife seldom have any work in common, while a farmer and his wife are a working team in which each needs the other to succeed. Find some work you two can share, even if it is washing the dishes, and you have something to help you hold together through the years.

More Than Meals

ANOTHER bond that held these together was their hospitality. They had a long list of friends, some of them distinguished. We know about Paul and Apollos and we hear of many others. But when Apollos stayed at their house, he was getting more than meals.

If you don't do more for a guest than feed him, he might as well be at a restaurant. If you don't do more than amuse him, he might as well be at the movies. What those two did for Apollos was to give him ideas, bigger ideas, truer and better than he had ever had, about the Christian faith. No doubt Apollos enjoyed Priscilla's lamb chops, but when he left that home he was not merely a well-fed man but one whose soul had grown.

Here again is something for husband and wife today. What are you doing for the people who come in your door? If they come for dinner you wouldn't insult them with trash or poison. What do you give their minds, their souls? Poison, trash or food?

The Church in Their House

EVIDENTLY the P & A tents made enough money for Priscilla and Aquila to have a spacious home, for we find Paul in a letter mentioning "the church in their house." This more than anything else kept these two together, a working team. You know in every church there are a few key people. They may not be conspicuous, but like the distributor under an automobile hood, if they are not there things do not run smoothly and maybe not at all.

Aquila and Priscilla were like that. Their church naturally revolved around them. This must have taken a good deal of their time, no doubt it cost them money, and it must have meant work. But if the church was in their house it was because they wanted it that way. It would be hard to believe that they asked for this so as to keep themselves from drifting apart; yet undoubtedly that was one effect of it.

The great majority of divorces are among people who have no connection with the church whatever. Many, of course, are of persons who are on church rolls somewhere. But how many broken marriages do you know among persons who are active in Christian work?

This is exactly the type of thing we decry in Russia. These were the methods that made millions of school children just like Hitler and Mussolini wanted them.

SUGGESTIONS FOR CURING FIDO OF PURSUING CARS

"How can my dog be trained not to chase automobiles?" is one of the most frequently-asked questions of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, these days, what with the extraordinarily great volume of traffic on our highways and streets and more and more dogs being killed — a great percentage of them because of their dangerous habit of pursuing passing motor vehicles.

Most drivers will do everything short of wrecking their cars to avoid hitting a dog, states the Center, but in heavy, fast-moving traffic a driver usually can't swerve out of the way of a dog that leaps suddenly from the roadside. The habit is too dangerous to be tolerated and, if necessary, stern measures should be used for breaking it. The Center suggests two proven methods for persuading Fido to abandon this suicidal pastime.

One system is as follows: For this method the trainer needs an assistant, a car, and a long carriage or buggy whip. While one person drives, the second sits by an open window of the car with the whip. When the dog charges toward the car, the whip must be used with full force on him and he must be shouted at in an angry voice to "Go home!" If the whip method does not prove successful, the same general procedure should be followed, but instead of a whip, the trainer uses a powerful squirt gun loaded with a mild solution of ammonia and water. Dogs hate the odor of ammonia, and if the squirt gun is well aimed, the lesson is usually learned after one or two sessions. If one method doesn't work, the other usually will. The idea, of course, is to cause the dog to associate an unpleasant experience with the act of running after a car, to which is added his utter astonishment at having an automobile attack him, the Center states.

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How to Control
To favor federal aid is to argue for the exchange of our present public school system, with locally controlled public schools operating alongside many private and church related schools, for a nationally financed and nationally controlled educational system. No two ways about it, federal aid would mean undesirable federal controls.

Controls do go along with financial assistance, and our federal government has no record to the contrary. In fact, the Supreme Court of the United States has already declared, in the case of farm subsidies, that the federal government may control that which it subsidizes.

Political Spoils
When we recall powerful influences within our own generation to get political influence into nearly every American institution, it doesn't take much imagination to see federal control of the American school system following any general aid program. We can all remember when, at election time, WPA workers were told: "Remember who your friends are" when you vote.

Dependence upon Washington sets up a political system, super-deluxe model. I would look upon the nationalization of American education, which could be expected to follow federal aid bills, as a decisive step in the development of a totalitarian state. Should America nationalize her education, it is my conviction that full nationalization of industry, distribution, and agriculture would follow within a generation.

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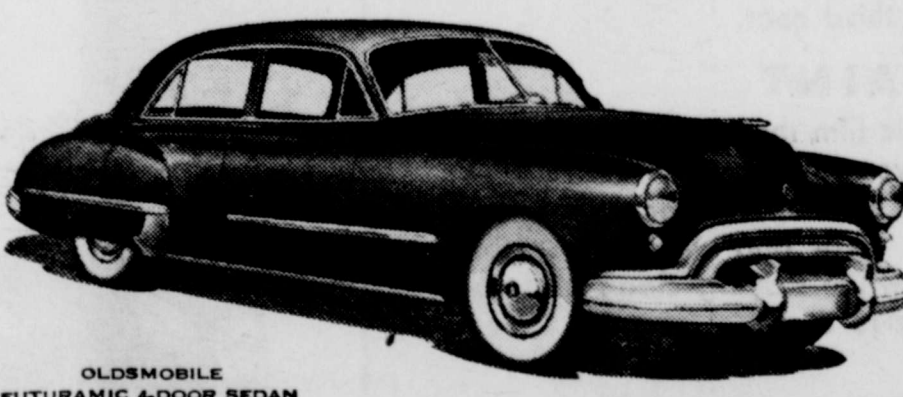

Every motorist and every pedestrian should keep constantly in mind the thought that courtesy does prevent accidents. Courtesy saves lives. You never heard of anyone apologizing for being courteous, but you can be sure that many a driver has been sorry for his recklessness.

He listed these courtesy tips for drivers:
Use hand signals to inform other motorists of your intention

to turn or stop.
Know the lane you should be in, then stay in that lane. Don't take your half of the road out of the center.

Recognize a situation where others have the right-of-way, and yield to them.

Don't insist on the right-of-way even when it's rightfully yours. Give pedestrians a break. They can't walk or run as fast as you can drive.

Use your horn to warn, not to bully.

Dim lights for other drivers at night.

Remember that the other fellow may be in a hurry, too.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

For A Summer Bride

OFFHAND it's hard to think of a nicer wedding gift for a summer bride than a dozen or so enlargements from snapshots made at her wedding reception.

It's a gift any bride will cherish for years, particularly when it's packaged as nicely as a group of such "candid" shots a friend showed me recently. He had picked out the best of some three dozen snaps, had 8 x 10 enlargements made, and mounted them in their own individual album for the bride.

Naturally, such a gift requires forethought on the picture taker's part. He must know well in advance of the ceremony what he wants to shoot. Sometimes, at home or garden weddings, he may take shots of the marriage ceremony. Where the minister has no objection, he might even make them at a church. But even when this last can't be arranged, there's always a fine picture waiting as the bride and groom leave the church.

However, probably most wedding pictures can best be made at the reception. Here's the place for grand unposed shots. The bride and groom

cutting the wedding cake. Or the families in the receiving line. Or one of the flower girls, pink and pretty, happily eating a dish of ice cream.

There's virtually no limit to the number of pictures that can be taken. Advance planning will suggest any number of possible shots to you. And once you know the pictures you want, plan ahead just how you will get them.

Make sure, for instance, that you've plenty of film so you can make enough shots to get 10 or 12 very good ones. Depending on whether or not the reception is indoors or out, decide whether you need to use flash for your snaps. And figure your exposures ahead of time. If you're working indoors, plan what exposure you'll use for shots at various distances.

Then "shoot" when ready. Mix your pictures. Make close-ups; make shots from medium distances, such as 12 to 15 feet. Try to get the bride or groom in every picture. But strive for variation in your pictures so they tell the whole story.

Better Control of Farm Dogs Sought

The answer to sheep and poultry killings by roaming dogs lies largely with the farmers themselves, in the opinion of Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City. "There is little hope for relief from such depredations until owners of farm dogs are willing to assume greater responsibility for them," he states. "This means knowing at all times the whereabouts and doings of their dogs. Sheep and fowl losses cannot be

reduced as long as farmers themselves allow their dogs to run at large nights and get into bad company and habits. No farmer would think of allowing such liberties to his son or daughter, and he should not permit it to his dog or dogs.

"The farmer should think of his dog in the same light as he does of his automobile. Both, properly controlled, are wonderful helps on the farm. But without brakes the automobile becomes a dangerous weapon. Similarly, the dog who runs at large day or night—the uncontrolled dog—is a constant invitation to trouble. No dog is under control whose owner does not know at any given time where he is or what he is up to."
