WAR IN INDONESIA . . . Describing the offensive as "police action" against Indonesian terrorists, the Dutch government managed to invade the Indonesian republic by land, sea and air in time to enable Dutch troops to spend Christmas on Java. The capital city, Jogjakarta (1), was captured in the first hours of fighting, and the Netherlands forces moved easily through Indonesia in an almost bloodless occupation.

DUTCH PUSH: Into Indonesia

The young Indonesian republic was fallen on evil days. Dutch troops raced through Java and Sumatra in a bloodless occupation, threaten-

ing the remaining important centers of the republic. DUTCH MARINES had forged to the outskirts of the Republican army's only oil center on Java. Other Netherlands forces, in a lightning thrust through western Sumatra, were within 40 miles of the

chief Republican city on that island. Decrying charges of war and invasion, the Dutch termed their ac-tivities "police action." Well ahead of their time-table, the Dutch had effected advances with practically

no bloodshed. International diplomats turned eyes toward Washington where the United States had been formally asked to grant "political and economic" support to the tiny repub-

lic. The Indonesian minister had further asked serious consideration of U. S. cutting off of Marshallplan aid to the Netherlands because of the Butch action in the East Indies. The Dutch announcement on the

Federal narcotic agents could take a breather-there were fewer dope addicts in the United States.

Three experts, writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association, declared there are only 48,000 narcotic addicts in the nation now, and most of them are men. These experts declared that the number of drug users has dwindled from between 150,000 to 200,000 in 1914 to about 48,000 at the last count.

Drug addiction is a symptom of a basic underlying personality maladjustment, according to the experts, and victims fall into five general classes. These are, in the order of their numerical importance: THOSE WHO become accidentally addicted while taking drugs for illness; those who take drugs to relieve psychoneurotic symptoms; psychopathic persons who learn through association with other addicts; persons with real mental illness who feel better while taking drugs, and a minor group with "be-havior or character" disorders.

> Yet what these men did recall and record is enough to reveal a matchless Person. A fifth Gospel might enlarge our knowledge of Jesus; but it would not greatly change it. Jesus never wrote a book, not even a leter so far as we know: vet such words of his as were remembered have influenced the world.

Jesus' entire public ministry lasted a shorter time than it takes to go through college; yet what he did has had a deeper effect on the world than the work of any university graduate in history. Jesus started no corporation, no formal organization; yet out of his fellowship have grown the greatest institutions in the world.

Why They Remembered THE STORY of Jesus was remembered and recorded by his followers partly because they could not help it. They could not forget him and did not want to forget him. One thing is true of all those who lovingly cherished these memories of the Master: they loved and adored him.

No unbeliever ever wrote a Gospel. Pilate wrote no life of Christ. Even if Judas had lived, he could not have written one. Our Gospels were written by men of faith, for the purpose of calling out faith in others. 'These things were written that ye may believe that Jesus is the Son of God" (John 20: 31).

In one sense of the word we could write a better Gospel now, for today 19 centuries of Christian experience are behind us, and those centuries are full of the doings of Christ through his church. The four Gospels tell us of what Jesus did in Galilee. But now we can tell the story of what Christ has done in Africa and Greenland and Australia and America. Reading the Gospels is interesting, it is important; but the reading has not hit the bull's-eye if it leave you, the reader, merely better informed than you were.

Q. Is the telephone company operating the Burkburnett exchange at a loss?

A. Yes. During the last half of 1947, expenses of operating the Burkburnett exchange were \$5,718 higher than revenues collected for service here.

Q. How about telephone costs? Are they up much?

A. Yes. The cost of everything that goes into furnishing service is higher. Copper is up 105 per cent. Lead is up 240 per cent more than in 1940. A 35-pine pole that cost \$6.30 in 1940 now costs us \$18.11.

Q. How much is the telephone payroll up?

A. The telephone payroll in Burkburnett is almost eight times as high as it was seven years ago. The growth of Burkburnett has made it necessary that we hire more people to handle the larger volume of calls, and in addition wage rates have gone up.

Q. How long have Burkburnett's telephone rates been in effect?

A. Present rates for telephone service here were established in 1933. At that time Burkburnett had 250 telephones as compared with 950 today. The scope and value of the service has increased greatly in the past 15 years with no increase in rates.

Q. With so much more business, isn't the company's revenue much higher than it was a few years ago?

A. Telephone revenues have increased, to be sure, but expenses have increased much faster. Since 1941, local telephone revenues have increased 184 per cent, but expenses during the same period have gone up 530 per cent. Despite the fact that we have 700 more telephones than in 1933, and are handling a greater volume of calls than ever, the telephone system here is being operated each month at a loss.

Rates established 15 years ago will not bring in enough revenue to pay present costs of furnishing service.

fecting the quality of the service. Through these economies and advances in the telephone art we have been able to furnish more and more telephone service here without increasing rates. The telephone company is proud of its record of not having increased rates during these 15 years, although the number of telephones here is almost four times as large, and the cost of virtually everything that goes into the furnishing of service has risen sharply.

Q. What does the rate increase amount to?

A. Briefly, for residence customers, the new rates represent an increase of less than two cents a day. Business telephones will cost about four cents a day more. Rural business and residential service will cost less than two cents a day more than at present.

Charges for various auxiliary telephone services will be increased in relation to higher costs of furnishing them.

Q. What are the telephone company's expansion plans for Burkburnett?

A. The telephone company will continue to enlarge the telephone system here as rapidly as possible to provide telephones for 120 families who are now waiting for service.

The telephone company is at work on an expansion and improvement program for last year and this. Included in the program are 100 more subscribers lines, which will be put into service this year. This is in addition to a project completed here last June which

added two local switchboard positions and 220 additional subscribers lines.

A project to expand the network of outside lines and cables throughout Burkburnett is scheduled for last year and this. Some of the new lines already are in service.

Two new long distance circuits to Granfield, Oklahoma, and Wichita Falls are being added to help speed Burkburnett's increasing volume of long distance calls.


