

Looking at it in another way: A flock of 40 per cent production requires 9 days to fill a case of eggs, while consuming 234 lbs. of feed; a flock in 70 per cent production fills a case in 5.1 days and eats only 163.2 pounds of feed.





## **Truman Begins Busiest Four Years;** GOP Wins First Senate Vote Test; Bevin Offers Critics Olive Branch

INAUGURATION:

Brief Interlude

President Truman could lay valid claim to the title 'busiest man in the world." The inaugural behind him, the nation's chief executive was up to his neck in problems, both foreign and domestic.

ON THE HOME FRONT, there was a little matter of having congress impliment Democratic campaign pledges and provide funds for the continuing armament expansion. Abroad, with this nation committed to the gargantuan task of saving the world from communism, the problem was equally monumental.

But for awhile, on January 20, Harry Truman, Missouri farm boy who rose to the presidency of the United States, once by succession, currently on his own vote-getting prowess, relaxed, basked in public adulation, may even have forgotten the tremendous pressure under which he labored.

ORIGINALLY PLANNED as a more or less sedate affair, with this atmosphere desired by Truman, the inauguration, instead, was turned into one of the most lavish and spectacular since Andrew Jackson rode into the top spot.

Packed and jammed, Washington gave a hero's welcome to the World War I artillery captain. Truman buttons, Truman pictures, Truman banners were greatly in evidence and the President, seeing these and the vast multitudes, must have wondered if there were anyone at all who voted against him in the November election.

BUT THE INTERMISSION from duty was brief. The parade, the swearing in ceremonies, the round of gala capital affairs that night, and the next day, Harry Truman was again on the job.

Peace has been his rallying cry. Its importance marked all his utterances. Now he was buckled down to the job of trying to preserve it. Men of good will everywhere in the world were wishing him success.

## **Teaching Religion**

of the Sunday School, in a sense. During his childhood he would go to the synagogue school weekdays and especially on Sabbaths; we know that by the time he was grown it was his "custom" to attend synagogue service.

And in every Jewish community the synagogue was the place where for two hundred years and more, children and youth and older people had been taught the Word of God.

If Christians today are faithful to Christ's example, we also will keep at the job of teaching our religion to every child within our reach.



#### January Storms Cause \$7,500,000 Telephone Damage

Damage totaling more than \$7,500,000 was suffered by Southwestern Bell Telephone sleet storms which struck parts of Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas in January, the company reported to-

It was the most widespread and costly storm damage in company's history.

The first major storm occurr-10, in a region extending from near El Paso- northward across second severe blow hit the week of January 24 and embraced an area from south of Dallas and Fort Worth into Oklahoma, northwest Arkansas and southwest Missouri.

In addition, several smaller areas were affected by ice and sleet storms, by flood, and by tornado, during January.

Ice was the major cause of damage. Rain and sleet froze to telephone poles and lines until sheer weight of ice caused wires to snap and poles to topple. Wind also caused heavy damage to ice-laden poles and wires.

The first storm disaster isolated 180 communities from long distance telephone service by knocking out 2,600 long distance circuits. In addition, at one time about 20,000 telephones were out of service. Nearly 10,000 telephone poles and 16,-000 crossarms on long distance lines were broken or toppled by

Most service had been restored when the second blow struck two weeks later. All but 200 so have material available on long distance circuits had been these plans. restored to service, for example, and most of the 10,000 poles re-
