

money could be used. Tuesday City Manager P. A Wiggins came up the street all smiles. He was burdened with a large envelope containing \$33,000.00 worth of bonds which the City has been able to take up in the past two years from revenue derived from the Municipal Light Plant, and Water and Sewer Depts. By taking up these bonds the City will save something more than \$1,300 per year in interest. That is a sizeable amount which can be used to retire more bonds. Some day Burkburnett has hopes of getting out of debt again at the present rate of operations.

All interest on outstanding indebtedness is paid and the next payment due is in sight.

Building Plans for Mills & Fleming Are Announced

Mills and Fleming Independent Grain Co., owned by H. A. Mills and G. W. Gleming have announced their building plans on the corner of Avenue B and Main street. Last week announcement was made that the property on that corner had been bought by Mills, but ncomplete information failed mention that Fleming was in on the deal.

The old property, which consists of four low buildings held over from boom days, will be a decided improvement for that part of town when the new structure goes up. Plans now are to start tearing down and making way for the new modern building by March 1st. The 50x150 foot replacement will be of tile and brick construction covered with semi-circle type roof. The front, practically all plate glass, will give a very pleasing and inviting entrance to a modern and complete feed and seed establishment This step will fill a need long realized by farmers in this area. The new enterprize will fill the gap between Lawton, Okla., and Wichita Falls and Vernon and Wichita Falls. At present there is no such complete service in the immediate area. According to Mr. Fleming they will carry a complete line of every type field and garden seed needed by planters in this territory. THE PROPOSAL to which the refence was made is a veterans' pension bill to give servicemen of the last two wars a \$60 monthly pension when they reach age 60, plus disability payments. It is estimated this would cost almost two billion dollars the first year, with later outlays reaching multi-billion dollar levels.

Under this measure, sponsored by Mississippi's Rankin, a veteran need only to have served 90 days in either world war to qualify for a pension. The extra disability pay would range from \$20 to \$120 a month, with no proviso that the disability must have been incurred in service.

Veterans administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., said that while he was neither opposing nor favoring the legislation in his capacity as veterans' administrator, its magnitude must be weighed closely now to prevent unwarranted financial outlays in the future. He pointed out the cost burden might be so great as to endanger the entire veteran-

compensation program. PRESIDENT TRUMAN was on record with this statement: "The necessity for new or extended bene-

disabilities should be judged not solely from the standpoint of service in our armed forces, but in the light of existing social welfare programs available to all veterans and non-veterans alike."


Mr. Truman also said in his budget message: "The program of veterans' services and benefits should reflect the fundamental fact that our primary long-run obligation is to dependents of veterans deceased from service causes, and to veterans disabled in the service. At the same time, we should preserve and stress our basic objective of assisting the recipients of these benefits to be as nearly as possible selfreliant and self-supporting members of our society.'

All of which indicates that veterans of both world wars expecting pensions and disability allowances had best be prepared to wait awhile.

Jesus Multiplies Himself

A GOOD executive, Jesus multiplied his own personality. A recent book has shown how Harry Hopkins during World War II lived in the White House as Roosevelt's personal companion, having given up his own ambitions and living onby to carry out the ideas of his chief. fling or lace. Without Roosevelt, Hopkins would

have been little more than an inferior politician; and without Hopkins, many of Roosevelt's plans could not have been carried out. He enabled the president to be in two places at once. So it was with Jesus, as Mark tells us. Jesus wanted those twelve to be with him, and then to send them out.

He wanted these friends to know him as the crowds, and his enemies, never could know him. He wanted these men to absorb his ideas and ideals.





The pattern of the cut sponge thus will be transferred to the floor. For a spatter-dash effect, use a stick and a brush with a rather

long bristle. Dip the brush into the paint and wipe off the excess. Strike the brush ferrule against the stick so that the paint will come off in drops on the floor. (The floor should already be painted with the background color.) Try these methods first on pieces of boards to get the knack. See that the linoleum is absolutely clean and dry before you start to paint, no grease or wax.





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

January was the most costly month Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ever has known-\$10 million dollars damage from ice, sleet, floods, zero cold, wind. Winter's paralyzing blows brought the most costly disaster in company history, and also the most extensive.

From San Antonio and Pecos, through most of central and west Texas, diagonally across Oklahoma, southeastern Kansas, northwest Arkansas, and Missouri to Hannibal on the banks of the Mississippi River, new storms caused additional damage every few days. And floods in Arkansas washed out miles of long distance lines. The areas affected are shown on the map above.

These figures show the extent of the damage: 24,000 poles down, 36,000 crossarms broken; 4,800 long distance circuits knocked out; 53,000 telephones temporarily silent; 200 communities isolated for a time.

Service restored quickly

Two things made it possible to restore service quickly.

First, the diligence and skill of 4,200 telephone men. They came with their trucks and tools from all parts of our company territory and from other Bell System companies-Mountain States, Illinois Bell, Southern Bell.

Disregarding personal hardships and in the finest traditions of the business, these men worked from dawn to dark-from "can" to "can't" as Plant men say-seven days a week, under conditions that were always difficult. Sometimes they could scarcely walk on the ice crust, and their trucks were immovable on slippery highways. But, one

way or another, they got to where they were needed, and they got the job done.

Reason No. 2-the teamwork that characterizes Bell System service.

Western Electric Company, supply unit of the Bell System, marshaled its nation-wide resources. From Western's warehouses or outside suppliers in 45 communities scattered through 21 states, the materials moved, at once.

A steady stream of poles, crossarms, drop wire, cable, insulators, steel strand, tie wire-all the things the storms had smashed-flowed into the iced area. At no time was work held up by lack of supplies.

Wire shipments during the month were more than was required by Southwestern Bell in all of the fourth quarter of 1948 for normal purposes. In addition to wire, thousands of poles, crossarms, and tons of pole-line hardware were moved by truck, by express, and by air into the storm areas.

Equipment is standardized

In the Bell System telephone equipment is standardized. The parts that fit in Texas work equally well in Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, or anywhere else. Thus, even the construction gangs from the other companies found no equipment puzzles-and their own tools worked perfectly.

Bell System teamwork met the challenge of these storms. Most of the service has been restored. But permanent repairs, especially on toll lines, will take months to complete. For every wire damaged by the storm must be retied and "resagged" to meet Bell System standards be-fore the job will be finished.

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
