Insurance Policies Increased for Year 1948

The people of Texas had their life insurance policies increased for 1948. The Southwest Life Insurance Company to \$697,208,140, Ralph Wood of Dallas, announced in releasing the Company's 46th annual statement to policyholders. This was an increase of \$56,341,122.

A charge of assault with intent to murder was filed Monday against Herbert Ayers, 22-year-old Burkburnett Negro, in connection with the shooting of William Porch, 29, Negro of Burkburnett, in a cafe here Sunday afternoon.

Porch was reported in "fairly good" condition at Wichita General Hospital where he was brought for treatment of an abdominal wound. Physicians found the bullet entered Porch's abdomen, slanted upwards and emerged through the upper back region.

Deputy Sheriff George Willingham of Burkburnett turned Ayers over to Deputy Sheriff Martin Boyle who took him to Wichita Falls.

Rifle Victim's Rites Held Here Wed.

Final rites for J. B. (Jack) Gibbs, 52 year old Clara farmer who was killed accidentally while hunting rabbits Monday, were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday from the First Baptist Church.

Rev. J. R. Naylor, pastor of the Thrift Baptist Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. T. Lynn Stewart, pastor of the Burkburnett Baptist Church. Members of the American Legion accorded military honors to Gibbs, a World War One veteran. Interment was made in the Burkburnett cemetery under the direction of the Owens & Brumley Funeral Home.

Gibbs was found dead shortly after noon Monday by his wife who became alarmed when he did not return in time for lunch. She found him dead, entangled in a fence with a bullet wound in his right temple.

A verdict of death as the result of an accidental gunshot wound, was returned by F. E. Cruce, justice of the peace here. According to investigating officers, Gibbs apparently caught his foot in a loop of the fence wire while crossing it and tripped, the 22 rifle discharging as he fell.

A native of Vernon, Gibbs is survived by his widow; one son, Lewis Earl Gibbs; one daughter, Miss Darlene Gibbs; two brothers, R. N. Gibbs of DeQueen, Ark., and Ollie Gibbs of Santa Cruz, Calif.; and three sisters, Mrs. Homer Lynn of Kilgore; Mrs. Lillian Mire of San Diego, Calif., and Mrs. Peggie Mumford of Lawton, Okla.

A TRUE CHARACTER

On the birthday of George Washington, we might refresh our minds on his Farewell Address, which gives his principles of government and his earnest hope for a new nation. Less familiar to Americans but of interest and importance, was a speech delivered by Daniel Webster on another Feb. 22, in 1832. It was "The Character of Washington" and includes the following:

"The domestic policy of Washington found its polar star in the avowed objects of the Constitution itself. He sought so to administer that Constitution as to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, promote the general welfare and secure the blessings of liberty. These were objects interesting, in the highest degree, to the whole country, and his policy embraced the whole country.

"Among the earliest and most important duties was the organization of the government itself, the choice of his confidential advisers, and the various appointments to office. This duty, so important and delicate, was yet not difficult to him, for he had no sinister ends to accomplish, no clamorous partisans to gratify, no pledges to redeem, no objects to be regarded but simply the public good. It was a plain, straightforward matter, a mere honest choice of good men for the public service. His own singleness of purpose, his disinterested patriotism, were evinced by the manner in which he filled places of high trust."

This last paragraph seems to be an impossibility to follow in today's political picture. Promises, duties, obligations, pledges and gifts are so tied in with political commitments to individuals that we wonder whether even George Washington could straighten us out.

burnett husbands had better think twice before they speak. With 20 million housewives in the land, they can't all be wrong, though. Too many of them waste time and energy, losing time by placing working equipment in the wrong places, having to take needless steps by not storing things in convenient spots and close together. The average housewife walks 170 feet just making one bed, instead of planning a methodical, labor-saving manner of bed making. They do too many unnecessary things, like ironing sheets, towels, and pajamas and in wiping dishes that should be scalded and let drain. They can sit in a rocking chair and pare potatoes, have stools for ironing and at the kitchen work bench. Too many housewives don't just stick to their jobs but permit interruptions to delay their work. Whether it is the telephone, radio, children or salesmen. Before our Burkburnett Homemakers take issue with the editor of all of these points, please bear in mind it wasn't our idea in the first place, but that of an industrial engineer and lecturer on work simplification.

CHICK CHATS

GOOD MANAGING GOES WITH CHICKS

As you plan your poultry raising activities for the year ahead keep these thoughts in mind:

Good management and poor chicks taken together, usually produce only fair returns. Poor management and good chicks will probably return only mediocre profits or possibly a net loss. But good management combined with good chicks almost always will produce superior results, giving extra eggs, extra profits, and better flock health.

Selection of high quality chicks in the beginning is a matter of great importance, but sound management is equally vital. There are several simple, yet often forgotten rules of management to follow in raising chicks. Here are a few examples.

Make necessary repairs on brooder houses well in advance of the time you expect your chicks. Eliminate any drafts from building defects and make the houses against the cold.

Thoroughly clean and disinfect all previously used houses and equipment. Use a good disinfectant with a high phenol coefficient. Shape away dirt and scrub interiors and equipment with hot water and soap.

Always start your brooder stoves well in advance of the day you get your chicks. Test them, make any needed repairs, and heat the houses to aid the disinfecting.

Use a deep, absorbent litter on the floors. This type of litter has generally proven best for use by most poultry raisers.

Baby chicks often do not catch onto drinking and eating

right at the start. As you take them from the box and place them beneath the hover, dip the beak of each into the water. Place feed on egg-cake flats for first few days.

These are merely a few of the management pointers which your hatcheryman can give you. Ask him for advice and follow it carefully to raise good chicks.

Ideal World

Lesson for February 27, 1949

ANY MAN with a revolutionary new idea has to try to explain it. Jesus was no exception. As a young teacher of religion, he had to answer the question which older teachers were bound to put to him: If your teaching is new, how can it be true? And if it is true, what can be new about it? This was a fair question. The Sermon on the Mount is Jesus' answer to it. The main theme of that sermon is the kingdom of God, an ancient phrase but with new meanings as Jesus used it. We can say "The Ideal World" and mean just the same thing.

The Right People
JESUS EMPHASIZES, above all, the kind of people who belong to God's Ideal World. This would be surprising to some modern planners. Communists think that if you can once get a world in which every one has enough to eat and drink and wear, a world where nobody is poor (or everybody is as poor as everybody else, which is all the same thing), you will have the perfect world. Jesus would know this is nonsense.

But the fact is that even after you got your perfect social system, with perfect politics and perfect distribution of wealth, even a perfect climate and soil, you would still be nowhere near the Ideal World unless you improved your people.

The wrong kind of people will spoil the best kind of system. So we find Jesus talking not about systems but about people.

Is This You?

WHAT WE call the "beatitudes" (Matt. 5:7-12) is Jesus' eight point program for the citizens of the Ideal World. The right people are happy people, to begin with. (The word translated "Blessed" is a regular Greek word for "happy.") But the main difference between different kinds of people is not that some want to be happy while others do not; rather it is that they are made happy by different kinds of things.

Jesus' ideal people are humble, not proud; they see their sins and are sorry for them; they are "meek"—that is, they are not in a hurry to demand their own rights; they do not merely admire goodness, they are positively hungry for it; they are merciful, not careless or cruel; they are pure in heart and not only in speech and act; they are not mere peace-wishers or peace-lovers (who isn't?) but peace-makers; they are people who are brave enough to do what is right not only when it is comfortable and popular but even when it brings them slander and suffering.

Salt
DO YOU really want an ideal world? The best way to begin is to learn how to be a citizen of such a world. Jesus used two interesting simple words to describe the kind of people he means. You are salt, he said,—you are light. Salt and light are old-fashioned things but they have never gone out of date. No one has invented a good substitute for either one.

So there is no substitute for a really good Christian. Living, here and now, like citizens of the ideal world to come, Christians are both salt and light.

Salt because they give a taste to otherwise flat or bitter life. Salt because they keep human society from going rotten. This world is in a bad enough mess as it is; but what it would be if all the Christians were removed from it at once, one hates to think.

Light
AND LIGHT! Like salt, light ought not to be too noticeable. A glaring light is bad on the eyes, as too much salt is bad on the tongue. So a Christian is not supposed to rub his goodness in on other people, so to speak. He is as indispensable as salt in bread—and should be as inconspicuous. But light, like salt, if it is any good has to be applied directly. A strong light concealed in a steel tube does no good. Swishing the glass end of the salt-cellar around in the soup gives it no flavor. The salt must get into the soup, the light must touch what it sees.

Soil CONSERVATION News

Approximately 1 mile of terraces has been run on E. E. Clack farm of West Burk Conservation Group this week. The terraces on this farm will not only stop water erosion but will also insure a good storage of water in the sandy soil. Clack is controlling wind erosion on his farm by good cover of early wheat and Austrian peas and leaving of corn stalks on land plowed to corn. Other conservation practices being carried out on this farm are contour cultivation, stubble mulching of crop land, planting of Emerald Clover and Austrian Winter peas in crop rotation, construction of water way or terrace outlet channel and seeding to Weeping Love Grass.

Tom Pirtle who is working a portion of the Mat Riley farm in West Burk Conservation Group harvested over 3,000 lbs. of excellent re-cleaned Hubam Clover seed the past summer on 40 acres. The above is besides second run seed, he intends to use himself. He intends to permit the Hubam to volunteer on same land this year and harvest the seed or cut for hay, then follow with planting of Alfalfa this fall if agreeable with landlords. He believes the nitrogen added to soil by growing of Hubam,

will greatly increase growth and yield of alfalfa.

A 4,000 yards stock pond has been staked out this week on the Foster Ranch of Clara. A good stock pond 12 to 15 feet deep will insure year around supply of water. Stock ponds help in the distribution of grazing over the grass land. The best drainage area for stock pond is one that has good thick cover of grass and one in which the farmer or rancher has practiced taking half and leaving half of grass.

J. D. Ashton, Cooperator of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District plans to fertilize with phosphate and chicken manure, the two recently constructed ponds, and to stock them with fish. One pond will be stocked with combination of Brem and Bass, and the other with combination of Channel Cat, Bass and Brem. The ponds will be fertilized periodically throughout the year. From his fertilized ponds he expects to catch nice eatable fish, one year from time of stocking. His ponds will cover surface area of 1-3 and 1 acre and will be 13 to 16 feet deep. Besides providing good water for livestock, he expects some good fishing and eating.

District Supervisors received applications for Assistance on 1 farm of 62.5 acres the past week.
