Smith died Saturday afternoon in a Wichita Falls Hospital after suffering a heart attack in his home early that morning.

Born Jan. 27, 1868, in Missisippi, Smith came to Texas with his parents in 1879 and settled in Wise County at Pleasant Valley. where Smith's father, who had served with the Confederate army, taught the first school established in the community.

Thomas Leo Boyd Died Tuesday

Thomas Leo Boyd, 57, outstanding Burkburnett citizen, merchant, civic leader and philanthropist of this city, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Tuesday night about 10:30.

Boyd, one of the county's most important financial leaders and frequently a director of charity and other community drives, succumbed to a heart ailment. He was admitted to the hospital Tuesday morning about 7 o'clock. His condition became steadily worse throughout the

Serving in almost all civic campaigns, Mr. Boyd was 1945 president of the Chamber of Commerce, having been on the board of directors of that organization for a number of years. He was currently chairman of the Red Cross campaign in Burkburnett. An ardent Methodist, he was a member of the Board of Stewards of the church here and taught a successful Sunday School class for many

Mr. Boyd, a native of Taylor, Texas, came to Burkburnett in 1919 after he had served in the U. S. armed forces during the first World War. He and his brothers established several general merchandise and grocery stores in this area, in Burkburnett, in the oil fields and in Thrift. These stores were combined into the huge Boyd Bros. store in 1932. It has become one of the outstanding mercantile establishments of this region.

Survivors include the widow, two daughters, Dorothy Boyd of Burkburnett, and Mrs. Caroline Greer of Wichita Falls, a sister, Mrs. Ethel Hartman of Austin, Texas; two brothers, Jimmy and Charlie Boyd of Burkburnett. 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




