Capt. Tony H. Kelly, the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. M. Kelly of Burk Burnett, was promoted from the rank of first lieutenant recently at Augsburg Military Post, information received today stated.

Kelly, Augsburg (Germany) Military Post motor maintenance officer, was presented last December a pair of binoculars by Brig. Gen. Clinton A. Pierce, post commanding general, for taking first place in the post organizational supply room competition.

The captain entered the service in September, 1938 at Ft. Bliss, Texas, and attended OCS at Ft. Benning, Ga., in 1942. In September 1942 Kelly served with the 65th Infantry Regiment for four months in Porto Rico, and then went to Panama with the 65th Infantry and remained there until September, 1945.

He was sent overseas to the European Command in May 1946 and joined the 88th Infantry Division (Blue Devils) in Italy. Since November 1947 Kelly has been assigned to Headquarters Detachment 7815 Station Complement Unit at Augsburg, Germany, in the post motor section. Capt. Kelly's wife, Erlene, is residing with him in Augsburg.

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Italian Boys' Towns

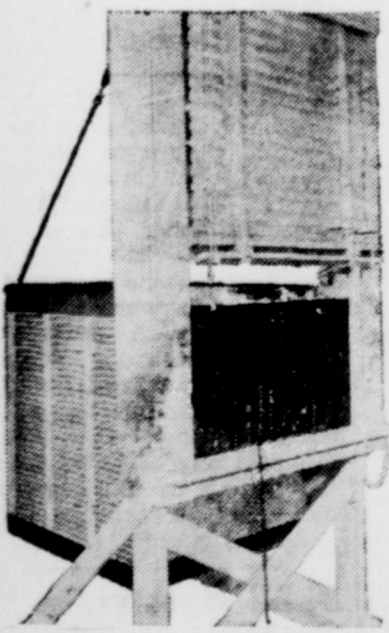
We well know what a Boys' Town means in our country, for the rehabilitation of youths. The movement has spread and found its day into Italy where seven Boys' Towns are operating and the eighth is under construction. These are provided with American donations and the funds are well spent. Already 22,000 street boys in Italy are finding homes there and learning trades. Figures show that 50,000 others, orphaned and homeless, are trying to enter the Boys' Towns. They are given instruction in arts and crafts, shoe-making, pottery, carpentry and so on. The Italian "Towns" are run on a democratic form of government. By building these homeless street urchins into enlightened, responsible, capable men whose influence will be felt in Italy, this country is but forging another link in the good will chain for America.

A Slow, Steady Trip

How fast does spring travel? Harsh March and April days make us feel she will never arrive in Burk Burnett. Spring moves north at about seventeen miles a day and her hours are pretty regular. Often we have watched growth here and found it takes a week to produce the same north of us a hundred miles. You must have about the same altitude in order to calculate this speed of spring, however. When spring reaches a hill or mountain, she climbs only 100 feet a day. In the valley she brings green grass, jonquils and violets, while the folks on the hill top must wait a day or two for this pleasure. You might envy the man on the hill who can watch the approach, see spring at work, her climb to his peak. He awaits her arrival with thanksgiving and the valley joins in his hymn of praise.

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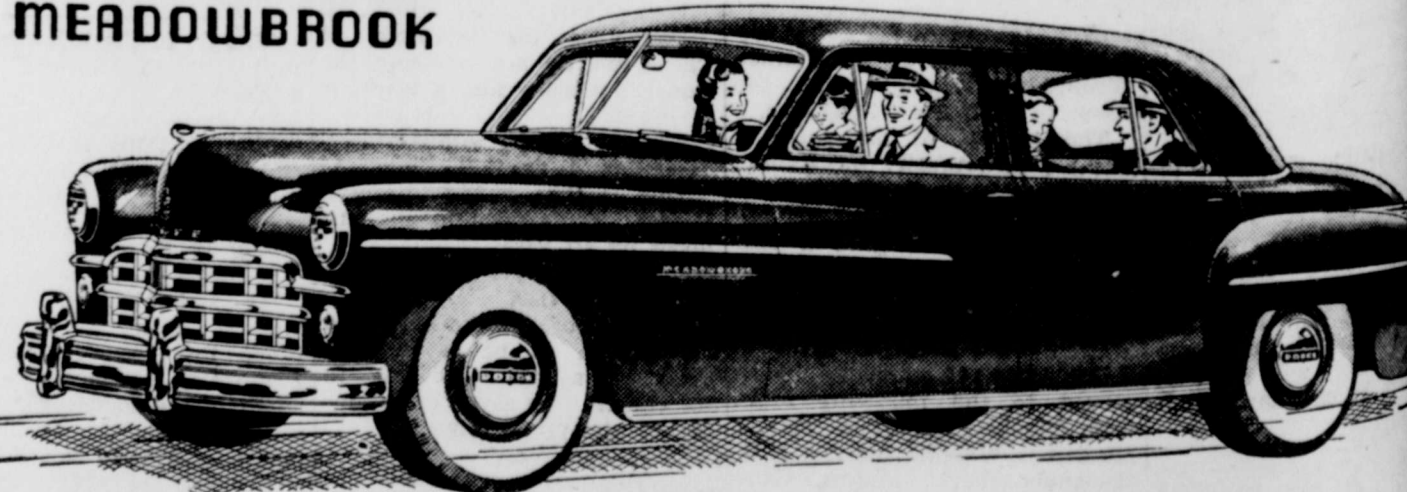

ble by cooperation with the Federal program of aid for School Cafeterias. One of the best things offered in the local school system is the hot lunches at the School Cafeteria. Every student is welcome at the Cafeteria, whether they can pay for their meals or not. There is absolutely no discrimination between those who pay and those who can not pay. All get the same attention and each tray is served as nearly alike as human hands can serve them. Now to find some of the bad impressions—The kitchen is too small and inadequately equipped. The dining room, which in reality is the grade school auditorium, is also too small to handle the crowd. The tables and chairs are too large for the small tots. There is no place for high school students to put their wraps in winter months. They come two blocks to eat and just have to stack wraps on tables, chairs or the floor. If the auditorium is needed all the tables and chairs must be cleared from the floor and stacked; there is no place to put them. Then too, food odors from the kitchen linger on, and those in the kitchen cleaning up after a meal or preparing for the rush in the morning, will distract from any gathering in the auditorium. The need for more and better Cafeteria facilities is very evident after one short visit during any lunch hour. Despite the many handicaps under which the program operates here, those in charge are doing a wonderful job, indeed. Mrs. Leo Foster, Cafeteria supervisor, attends to all buying of food and plans all menus. Mrs. Rainey Wilkerson is supervisor of the kitchen. Her assistants are: Mrs. Mamie Bryant, Mrs. F. H. Hood, Mrs. Myrtle Hennis, Mrs. Buna Uelton and Miss Sally Dickson. Miss Taylor, State Dept. of Education, Lunch Room Division, was a visitor at the Cafe-

teria last Friday and turned in a favorable report after thoroughly checking everything.

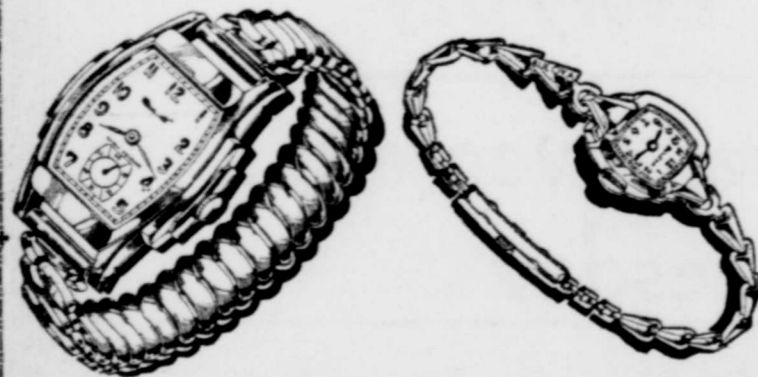

It's Your Business

Who owns America's industry? It's easy to say who owns the hot-dog stand down the street or the candy store on the corner. But, you say, "big" business is different. You're right, it is different. The chief difference is that most large firms are "corporations" which are owned by many people rather than just one or two persons. Maybe the hot-dog man and the candy store owner—maybe even you—own these big businesses. That's very likely, for the people of America do own them.

Sometimes you'll find a fellow who is afraid of that word corporation. Mostly, that is because he does not understand what it means. The modern corporation is built around this idea: many people working together can sometimes do things in a better way than just one or two can do them alone. You see, it takes a lot of money for an automobile factory or an oil refinery. But we have to have them, even if they do cost millions of dollars to build. Then who'll build them?

Risk and Venture
There is hardly anybody who would want to lay down ten or twenty million dollars for a new industrial venture. Few have that much money, and fewer still would want to risk that much at a time.

But there are many of us who would like to invest a little, hoping for a small return on our money. This may be done through the corporation. It obtains a charter from the state, which permits it to seek capital by inviting people to take shares of stock. Money thus put up by "stockholders" is used to build factories, to gather in machinery and materials, and to handle payrolls until earnings come in. If managed well, the company may pay dividends to those who put up their money.

Money Working
There are perhaps 500,000 corporations in America. Some of them are small. Others are equipped and financed by thousands of people for the purpose of doing big jobs well. Anyone who buys stocks or bonds is a direct investor. There are perhaps 20 million such persons, and they hardly could be called "battered capitalists."

About half of all corporation dividends go to persons with annual incomes under \$10,000. But whether they be called rich or poor, those who invest money in corporations are very important to all of us. Their investments help make jobs and create payrolls.

The People Own
In America, not two or three families nor a favorite political clique nor even the government, but the people own the tools of production. Anyone of us may invest in corporations. Besides direct investors, anyone who pays for life insurance or has bank savings should be interested in the welfare of corporations.

That is true because insurance companies and banks invest in various industrial enterprises the money they receive from you. In this additional way, ownership of corporations is spread throughout the land. Management, labor, investors—all work together to make business and industry hum with production. Everyone benefits. This is the miracle of America's free enterprise.

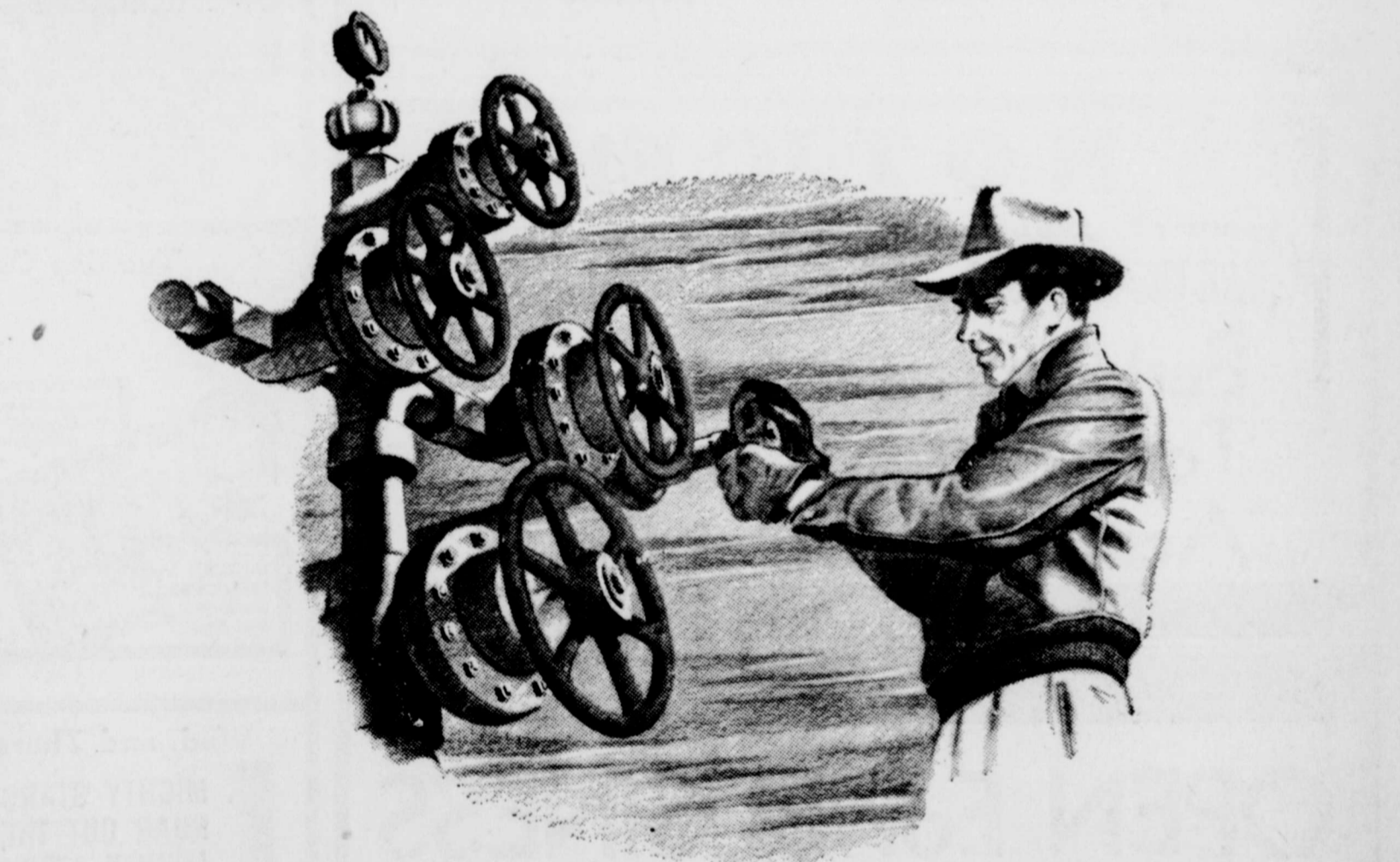
