Clean-up, Paint-up Campaign Gets Underway Monday 25th

Citizens Urged to Cooperate Fully In Campaign

One of the most thorough clean-up campaigns ever undertaken in Burk Burnett will begin Monday, April 25th. There are many reasons for such a campaign. First consideration is from the standpoint of health. Everyone knows filthy, unsanitary conditions do not contribute to the good health of members of a community. The next consideration may be fire hazards. And then, some folks just naturally have pride about the appearances of their premises and want to keep them clean and attractive.

Everyone living in Burk Burnett can help with the clean-up campaign. Everyone is asked to help. Business men are asked to clean up the down-town section. Home owners, and renters too, are asked to take of the residential section. Even the little boys and girls can join in the campaign by helping around their homes.

Free Trash Pick-up

City officials Monday night decided to go all out in helping to make the campaign a success. All trash and rubbish piled in alleys, or accessible places near the street will be hauled away free for one month beginning Monday, April 25th. When you have cleaned up all the trash you can find, pile it in the alley or other convenient place, then call the City Hall, 180 for a truck. To speed the work along, place all cans, etc., in a box or other container. If you have no such container, pile in neat stacks all trash you wish hauled away. The truck may not get to your house the same day you call, but it will be around just as soon as possible.

Don't Wait 'Till Last Week

If you wait until the last week of the campaign to get your trash ready, the City truck may not get to you. When the month is up, or after May 21st, you will have to make your own arrangements for disposing of the trash from your premises. It is a physical impossibility to pick up all trash in a few days. So, those who call in early will be assured of this free service. The free service positively will not be extended beyond May 21.

For any of the reasons mentioned above, clean up your premises. Make Burk Burnett a healthful place, as well as a clean and beautiful one.

26.90 Top Price Paid for Fat Calf At Burk Livestock Sales Barn Saturday

Last Saturday was one of the biggest and most successful sales ever held at the Burk Burnett Livestock Sales Barn. A top price of 26.90 was paid for a fat calf, which topped the market price quite a bit. Top prices each and every week is one of the reasons why the local barn is a favorite with farmers and ranchers in this area. Last Saturday there was livestock here from Paris, Texas, as well as Southern Oklahoma and Northern Texas.

The total number of livestock handled locally last week was more than 400. Cattle, hogs, horses and goats were sold in the ring, with bidding spirited throughout the sale.

Another reason for popularity of the local barn is its convenient arrangement which permits stock to be handled quickly and

safely. It is one of the fastest moving sales to be found anywhere. Stock goes through the ring at the rate of about 150 head per hour. There is no delay because stock handlers, scales man, auctioneer, and everyone connected with the enterprise knows his duties and keeps everything running at a smooth, fast clip.

Sales are held every Saturday, beginning promptly at 1:30 P. M. Everybody is invited to the sales. It doesn't matter whether you are a buyer, seller, or just plain spectator, come along.

Commission charge at the barn is lower than at most barns, another reason for folks liking to come to Burk Burnett.

THE CAUSE FOR DOGS

Every dog lover will listen to an appeal from a dog owner. There are about 20 million licensed dogs in this country and that makes a lot of dog owners. A recent plea for the pooch is given a hearing. The complaint is that most hotels refuse to take in dogs, air and steamship lines don't make dogs welcome, buses and street cars won't carry them. It means that traveling is made difficult for the people who want to take their dog along with them. Some of these folks contend that such inconsideration of canines will hurt the business of hotels and public carriers. Well, they may have a point here, or can 20 million people be wrong?

THE ATLANTIC PACT

We hear, read and talk of the North Atlantic Pact and yet some are not too familiar with its meaning. Diplomatic words sometimes confuse us. Boiled down, the preamble of the Pact is comprehensive. It says: "The parties of this treaty are determined to safeguard the freedom, common heritage, and civilization of their peoples". It contains about 1,000 words contained in 14 articles. Twelve nations have signed, promising allied intervention to resist attack. The North Atlantic Pact includes Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, United States,

Canada, Norway, Denmark, Iceland, Italy and Portugal. Total area of regions covered by the defense alliance is about 2,600,000 square miles and the population about 290,000,000. Soviet Russia and satellites cover about 8,900,000 square miles and a population of about 285,000,000.

CAN WE REACH BOTTOM

As countries go, Americans feel themselves inhabitants of a new land. Endowed with nature's gifts of water, wildlife, forests, soils and minerals, we accept the grants of natural resources and seldom consider that the future might find us lacking in them. WASHINGTON

Congressman Ed Gossett recessed last night on Monday April 18.

The first thing to come up on the reconvening of the House is the repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act. The repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act is sought through the Administration's bill which is known as the Thomas-Lesinski bill. Mr. John Lesinski of Detroit, Michigan, is the Chairman of the House Committee on Education and Labor from which this bill is reported. The Senate bill is authored by Senator Elbert Thomas of Utah.

Labor is now making their last big assault on what some erroneously term "the slave labor bill" Mr. William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor, and Mr. Phillip Murray, President of the C. I. O., have sent orders to all of their unions all over the United States to have meeting with their Congressman while said Congressman is at home during this Easter recess, and to put the pressure on him for the support of the Thomas-Lesinski bill. I predict that such bill will not be passed; that the Taft-Hartley Act will not be repealed or substantially weakened.

There will be some changes in the closed shop provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act. Non-communist affidavits will be required of both employers and em-

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employees, and other minor changes will be made.

Speaking of Communists, those who think we have nothing to fear from communists and radicals within our own country, should read the list of organizations branded as Communist fronts by the Department of Justice and by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. These organizations always have pious, high-sounding titles. The Attorney General's list of subversive organizations includes such names as: American League Against War and Fascism; American Patriots, Inc.; American Peace Mobilization; American Youth Congress; National Federation for Constitutional Liberties; National Negro Congress; American Youth for Democracy; Civil Rights Congress; and its affiliated organizations, including Civil Rights Congress for Texas. Others listed by the House Committee, and I believe marked by the Justice Department, includes: American Youth for a Free World; American Youth for Democracy; American Student Union; American League for Peace and Democracy; Council of Young Southerners; Institute for American Democracy; National Committee to Win the Peace; National Lawyers Guild; and hundreds of others.

Thus, we have numerous packs of organized wolves masquerading in sheep's clothing. When you add to these organizations many others with good intentions but wrong objectives, we have every cause to be on the alert and to remember that liberty can be destroyed under the name of liberty.

In today's mail, I have a letter from Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., Negro Congressman from New York City, advising that the Committee on Education and Labor, of which he is a member, will begin hearings on H. R. 21 on May 2. H. R. 21 is the new title for the so-called Fair Employment Practices Commission. Mr. Powell states the purpose of this legislation to be the abolition of discrimination in employment. In the same mail with Powell's letter, I received one from an engineer in Philadelphia, saying—"In America this matter of race, color and creed received short consideration until the communist, seeking a source for discord, used it to cover their purpose by creating confusion." The FEPC law of New York, prohibits any employer from inquiring of an applicant for a job, his parentage, place of birth, length of time in the United States, whether alien or citizen, or other questions which would delve into his past.

The FEPC and other so-called Civil Rights bills are enthusiastically supported by every communist organization and by every radical organization in the country. Many intellectuals, high ranking journalists, radio commentators, and entertainers belong to these groups and continuously feed their propaganda to the American public. Except for the political pressure they can bring to bear, they would not get any consideration from the Congress. However, because of their political power, especially in the large picotat states, they have been able to write much of their program into the platform of both the Democratic and Republican parties. They constitute a real threat to the best things in our American way of life.

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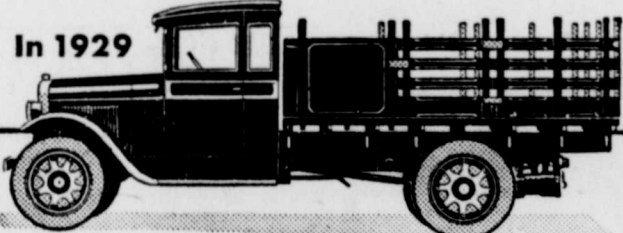
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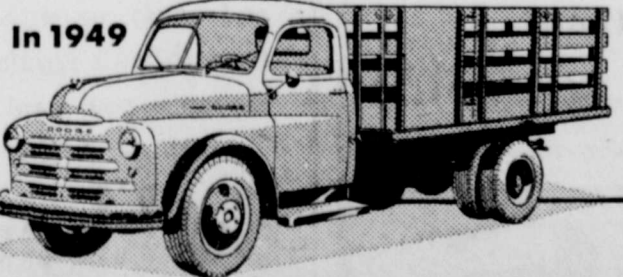

A Dangerous Tax

There's talk in Washington of a \$4 billion tax increase. If Congress permits this new siphoning of income and savings from the people into the federal treasury, the results can be dangerous for the whole nation. This is fact, regardless of whether or not the President and his administration would be cramped in spending a proposed \$42 billion budget.

Of course, like our Senator McClellan told homefolks recently: Mr. Truman's program means that taxes can go only one way - up, up, up. Senator Fulbright, our other distinguished senator, tried to ease the misgivings of the economy-minded by pointing out that saving federal money and reducing taxes is a question of "what you are willing to give up." That is a problem, all right. Too many of us have the attitude of the well known politician, who said he had never voted for a tax bill nor against an appropriations bill.

Justify Spending
If we manage to fool ourselves into thinking the other fellow is going to have to pay for the handouts, we then show no enthusiasm about economy. Citizens and congressmen alike, too often see economy as a fine thing when it's not close to home, but work like mad for all the government "aid" they can get - for themselves.

One thing is wrong with the question our Senator asked about what we would give up. It puts the burden of proof on the citizen who would economize! That proof belongs elsewhere. Every bureaucrat who demands funds should explain and justify the expenditure of every dollar!

Wherein lies the danger to the nation in heavier taxes at this time? It is proposed that the burden of a \$4 billion tax increase be placed upon corporations and businesses. This might look to some like an easy way to shift the tax load onto somebody else. Actually, a tax that is shouldered by business is still borne by the people - because people buy the products of corporations that are owned by people.

Don't Kill Incentive
At present the nation's business corporations pay a 38 per cent tax on income. Earnings distributed to owners may get taxed up to 92 per cent. (Other taxes, also, are levied upon corporations.) Tremendous sums, therefore, are handed to Uncle Sam by industry. But right now, the nation's economists are agreed that America's industry must have huge amounts of additional capital for growth and for expansion. There's danger, if instead these billions must be poured into Washington.

Any industrial plant that is not able to spend money continually for expansion or for newer, better equipment is a corporation moving toward failure. An amount roughly equal to the President's proposed budget of \$42 billion is the least we ought to put this year into our industrial plant. If America is to have the industrial strength it should have, if jobs are to remain plentiful, and if wages are to be high - then we had better have a care about penalizing our industry. America can lose out by exacting too much "take" from business.

Unless industry is allowed to expand, modernize, and meet today's needs, there'll be nothing at all to tax one of these days. When taxes take what would be invested, and when incentive to invest is killed - the country will go into reverse. Another \$4 billion in taxes on corporations would be most unwise.

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When the Federal Government builds "public housing" it uses the same materials and the same men private industry is using now to build 5 homes a minute every eight-hour working day.

If the government takes men and material away from a home being built for your neighbor, it stops your neighbor from building his house.

If the government takes your tax money to build a house for your brother (public housing) it doesn't add a single house to the present supply. For, it must tear down your brother's old house to justify its spending of your tax money.

But if your neighbor has a good house and builds a new one, there would be two houses - one for your neighbor and one for your brother.

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
