Vetch is now in bloom and the prospect for a good seed crop is very promising at this time. Some of those planning to harvest seed are W. O. Prechel, Henry Vaughn, N. J. Zimmerman, V. I. Seiler and John Story

Native grass pastures are looking good at this time of year. It has been found that the best time of year to stock a pasture heavy is from early spring to June 15th.
