A complete coordinated conservation plan has been worked sponsible leadership of a great body out between Stanley Williamson and the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District the past veek. Stanley is principally a dairy farmer and plans to plant own crops on all the cultivatd land. He plans to follow a year rotation in which onethird of the land will be planted to a legume each year. The pastures will be fenced and a otation system of grazing followed. Some land is being retired to pasture and will be seeded to Buffalo and Grama grass. Vetch and Rye are looking good on this farm at present. He plans to plant Chinese Red peas as a summer legume on approximately ten acres. Fish have been requested for his stock pond.

Gale Lowrance of the East Iowa Park Conservation Group is planning to plant Chinese Red peas when the weather condition permits. He plans to innoculate the seed before planting. Soon after grain harvest he plans to complete the terrace system on

encroached upon two basic fundamentals of our democratic progress: (1) The right of government to make appointments free of pressure, and (2) Freedom to work

Warning Sign

This action presents a real danger signal to the American public. It shows what can happen when irreof influence-American labor-goes on a rampage. The implications are alarming. If any one individual were powerful enough to dictate governmental appointments with threats of strikes, a new era of demagogues would indeed be at hand. Such power would be potentially disastrous.

The weapon of indiscriminate strikes is one which labor leaders alone control. Neither government nor management possesses such a power. The rank and file of labor, too, because of their organization, are subject to the orders of those leaders. Many labor leaders recognize this situation and act in a farsighted manner. However, the selfish actions of any one leader casts unfavorable reflections on the whole movement.

National Responsibility

No more loyal group of American citizens exists than the miners themselves. It is sad irony these people should suffer the brunt of the strike. According to the Associated Press, they will lose about \$68 million in wages during the two week layoff. This means \$68 million in food, clothing, and other essentials must be forfeited to the whims of one leader who was elected by workers to safeguard their interests.

This points up sharply the need for adequate labor legislation. With-An irrigation system is now out violating the rights of labor, we must draw clearly the line where those rights end and national responsibility begins. The average worker has everything to gain in such legislation. Labor must be accorded complete protection from irresponsibility-found within its own leadership, or elsewhere.

How's Britain Now?

Current news reports suggest that the British are still having a tough time, though things seem a little better with them lately. Actually, it is high time for signs of recovery. How much better off England would be right now-how much sooner she would have come out of the kinks if she had kept safe her traditional freedoms-that no one knows. But if the English mind and spirit come out of these dangerous experiences unscathed, it will surely be a miracle.

(There are those who will give more credit for improvements to the Marshall Plan and to the generosity of the American taxpayer than they will to Britain's labor government.) The sad thing about it is that the Englishman is still the worse off, having given up much of his heritage of freedom and liberty.

Mess of Pottage The swap has netted a poor mess of pottage indeed. England's experience is the lesson of the century for America. There was the dentist, for many forms to be filled out for the government and declared he could not do his work and the red-tape too.

What about small business? Take filling stations (petrol there). From a London newspaper: "After two years of deliberations, a committee of 13 men has reported to the government on the technical considerations which should govern the number, capacity, and distribution of petrol stations." Imagine! That is the result, when people hand over their individual initiative to govern-

How to Make Tea

Under the heading "First Warm the Teapot," an item in a British newspaper advises that the food ministry is sending out an expert who will visit restaurants in Tottenham and educate the restaurant staffs on the subject of how to make tea! As if by now, the English people have not learned to make tea.

Some of these seem a bit ridiculous. They are. Like the report of demands for "free" wigs having risen under socialized medicine to more than 200 a week-at a cost of more than \$4,000,000 yearly. It is reported also that "Application Order No. 2" will entitle hairless men and women to the nationalized wig cleaning and dressing service, once every two months. From cradle to grave,

How can we hope to have such a church today? Only by preaching Christ and Him crucified, as did the preachers and teachers of the apostolic century.

3. A PLEA FOR CONSECRATION TO CHRIST

In baptism we put on Christ. (Galatians 3:27). Baptism is not the end, but marks the beginning of the Christian life. Conversion involves a complete surrender of self and substance to Christ. (Luke 9:23; Matthew 10:38). Christianity is more than simply being a member of the church. The Christian must so live that Christ can be seen in him. (Matthew 5:14, 16; Philippians 2:15).

It is our earnest desire that all professed Christians shall be content with no name but Christian, no creed but the Christ, and no book but the Bible.
