You can even split infinitives, under certain circumstances. Use 'anybody else's, OK, can instead of may, 'whose' in place of 'of which'. Add jitters, jive, juke, strip tease, rain check, disc jockey, double talk, cold shoulder, to your corrected list. The main thing is to make thoughts clear and judge the sort of grammar fitting to your audience. We've been making errors in grammar for years and now we've lived long enough to see some of our mistakes are now accepted by English savants. Goody.


