Austin Highlights

Austin, Texas, June 13—One of the bills passed by the legislature at this session and already signed by the Governor which the voters will undoubtedly want to know more about is the so-called secret ballot bill. This bill is the result of a lot of work by several organizations and was brought about by the fact that in many parts of Texas, principally South Texas, there has not been much secrecy about how people voted. It is thought that this condition ought to be remedied because it is believed that better government would result if people could vote their honest convictions without their vote being made public information.

A group of civic organizations after thorough discussion, wrote the new bill and caused it to be introduced in the Legislature. It was amended several times where improvements were needed and is now the law. It provides that each ballot shall have a detachable stub bearing the same number as the ballot itself. When the voter enters the polls the ballots are supposed to be spread face down on a table so that no one can see the numbers on same. The voter selects one, votes his choice, tears off the numbered stub, writes his name on the stub, and puts it in a separate sealed box from the ballot. This sealed box containing the stubs is the only source of identification as to who voted the ballot with that particular number. In case of an election contest the judge may order the stub box opened and a recount made after checking the stubs and the actual ballots. Otherwise, the stub box is not opened; and at the end of 60 days the district clerk will burn the stubs in the presence of the county judge.

This is certainly a new system in Texas. Several other states have followed a similar system for some years. Those who sponsored it in this state believe it will work satisfactorily. We all hope so.

Next I will explain a new fishing license law which certainly will interest many people. This new law provides that after September 1 all persons over 16 years of age using

artificial lures must have a \$1.65 license to fish anywhere, including their home county. All persons over 16 years of age using live bait only must have a \$1.65 license to fish outside the county of their residence. Persons using cut bait and worms only need not purchase a license.

Formerly persons fishing with artificial lures were the only ones required to have a license. The new law brings Texas into line with the fishing laws in most other states. The way it finally works out, if you buy a \$1.65 license, you can fish with any kind of bait anywhere in Texas. The special licenses at Possum Kingdom, Eagle Mountain Lake, etc., have been abolished. There is still a special license required at Lake Texhoma because that

does not lie entirely within Texas. Efforts are now being made to secure a cooperative agreement with Oklahoma to abolish this special license.

The license laws in Texas are more lenient to fishermen than

almost any other state. Sincerely yours, George Moffett

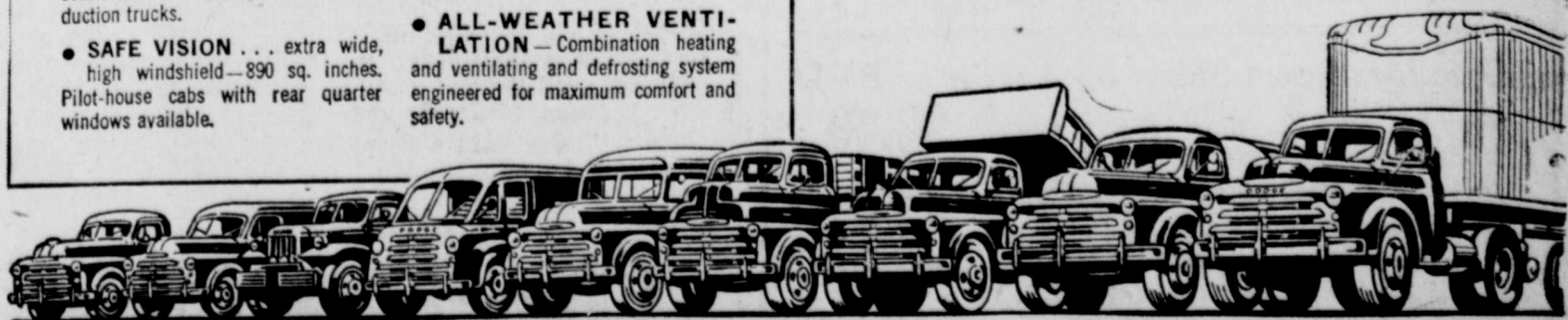

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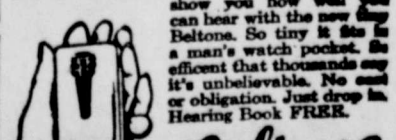

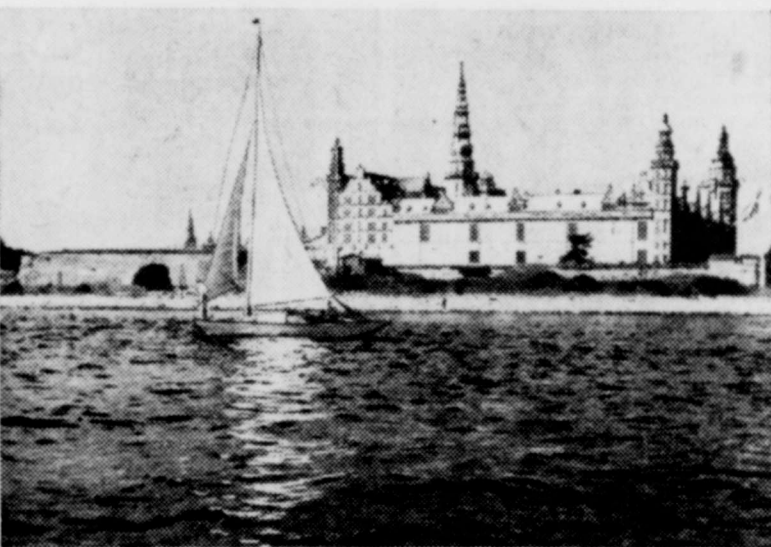

GOD IS NOT THE AUTHOR OF CONFUSION - 1 Cor. 14:33

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." (II Tim. 3:16, 17). Since all scripture is given of God and there is no confusion therein, it is the height of folly to try to put one passage from the Bible in opposition to another. All scripture is like a vast jigsaw puzzle in that each part when employed in proper relation to all other parts fits into the picture easily, without being forced and without distortion, and when all such parts are interlocked they present the completed picture in all its beauty and unity of composition. Thus grace, which is God's part, is not antagonistic to faith, which is man's part; and works, without which faith is dead (Jas. 2:17), is certainly not in discord with the rest of the picture but is vital to it.

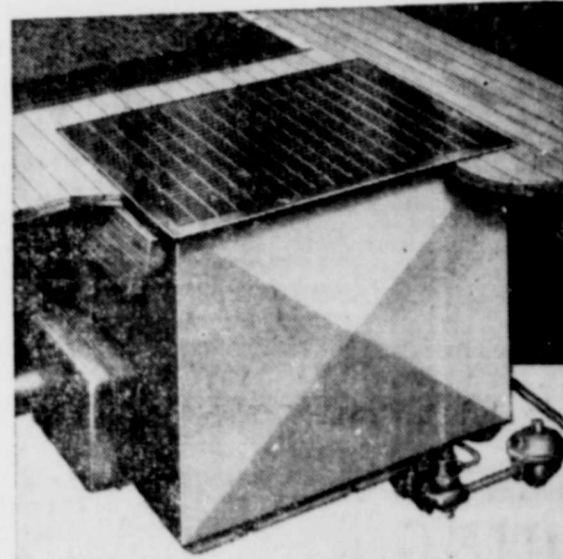

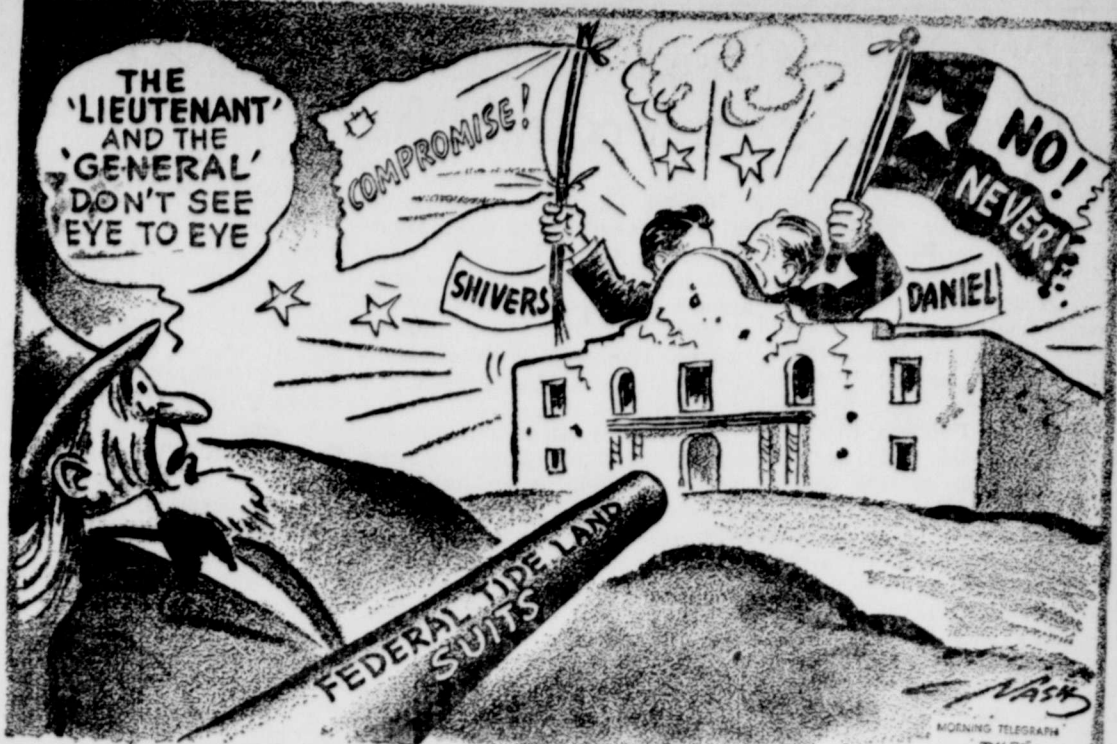

Insects Cost Texas Farmers \$61,000,000

George G. Chance, chairman of the Texas unit of the National Cotton Council, said today that Texas cotton farmers may have been able to profit an additional \$61,368,000 if insects had not reduced the state's 1948-49 cotton yield approximately 7 per cent.

Mr. Chance, in announcing initiation of a campaign by the Cotton Council to reduce damage to cotton by pests during 1949, said last year's losses in Texas amounted to an average of 4.1 cents per pound of lint harvested, and that insects had claimed one out of ten bales produced.

"Pests last year kept out of production approximately 359,833 bales of cotton and an estimated 147,000 tons of cottonseed. Based on average prices, this lint would have brought farmers of the state some \$50,740,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of \$10,628,000," the Council spokesman added.

"Recommendations on how best to control cotton pests in Texas already have been issued. This information, which may be obtained from county agents or vocational agriculture workers, tells farmers how to apply potent insecticides which will control effectively such pests as the boll weevil, bollworm, pink bollworm, cotton aphid, fleahopper, thrips and others."

Mr. Chance explained that though the percentage of cotton damaged by insects throughout the Cotton Belt last year was the second lowest since 1924, an estimated 6.6 per cent of the crop, valued at approximately \$202,264,000 was destroyed.

He observed further that a mild winter in many Cotton Belt States favored a high survival of cotton pests, and said that the Cotton Council is warning cotton farmers that unless effective insect control measures are taken, damage to this year's crop may run much higher than that incurred in 1948.

Wichita County Farm Bureau News

By Mrs. John Wesley

Mr. Loys Barbour has returned from Austin after several weeks absence. He reports on latest news of the storage situation by saying that one last Thursday, June 2nd, after an appeal from President J. Walter Hammond of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation to President Harry Truman, the Congress finally enacted Commodity Credit Corporation Bill into law which will give CCC the right to storage for all commodities on which support prices are in effect. This bill only needs President Truman's signature to become law. This piece of legislation should have been enacted at the beginning of this session of Congress so CCC could have been in position to handle this year's wheat

crop.

"There is a tendency on the part of grain dealers to withhold storage in order to force the price down," says Mr. Barbour and "the grain dealers say there is no storage space available, but they are able to take care of all wheat which the farmers are willing to sell at \$1.50 per bushel, which is 37c per bushel less than Government support price of \$1.87 per bushel."

Further proof is the following information from the "Trade Journal" put out by the elevator people which quotes storage capacity as of May 21, 1949 for Dallas at 7,150,000 with 3,413,000 bushels of grain stored in elevators, which leaves unfilled storage of 3,737,000 bushels in Dallas. In Fort Worth, accord-

ing to the Trade Journal, there is storage capacity of 23,975,000 bushels, with only 9,373,000 bu. of grain in storage, which leaves unfilled storage space of 15,602,000 bu.

"I trust the grain trade people will reverse their attitude and furnish farmers storage so they can realize at least support prices for their grain," says Mr. Barbour.

Agreed Judgment For \$4,250 Entered

An agreed judgment of \$4,250 was entered in the 30th District Court of Judge Frank Icard Wednesday for Miss Planteau Jones, 19 of Burkburnett, and her father, F. M. Jones, against Tucker Oil Company.

A jury which heard the case in April was dismissed after it failed to agree on compensation in the suit after answering more than 60 issues of a charge.

The suit was filed by Jones in behalf of his daughter after an accident last October 9 in Burkburnett where she was struck by a pickup truck of Tucker Oil Company driven by J. W. Hodges. The girl suffered crushed bones in both legs below the knees, which necessitated repairs with plates and screws, and a broken lower jaw.

The plaintiffs were represented by Irvin J. Vogel and George Smoot. Oil Company attorneys were Marvin R. Pierce, Paul Bandy, Luther Hoffman and Walter Nelson, Jr.

Report on H.B. 59 By Loys Barbour

Mr. Loys Barbour, who is chairman of the Texas Farm Bureau's Rural Road Committee, makes the following report on the McClellan Bill, H. B. No. 59. He says that it will not be brought up on the floor of the Texas House of Representatives again during this session. The

committee decided it would be of no avail to push the McClellan Road Bill through the House when there was no possible chance of passing it through the Senate at this late date in the session.

Progress on this type legislation is very gratifying to the Farm Bureau members as this was the first tax bill to be reported out of the committee on Taxation and Revenue in eight years. When the McClellan Bill was before the House on April 11 it was recommitted to the committee on Taxation and Revenue. On the following day, April 12, the Farm Bureau was successful in getting a motion before the Legislature to reconsider the vote by which the McClellan Bill was recommitted to the committee on Taxation and Revenue. The motion failed to carry by a vote of 70 to 70.

Barbour stated that on this vote Deno Tufares voted for the farmers' interest, while Vernon McDaniels and Leslie King voted in favor of the Gas Indus-

tries. "I regret that two of our Representatives voted for the multi-million dollar out-of-state pipeline interests, instead of a program which was agreed on by all groups interested in rural roads for farm people," said Barbour.

However, the McClellan Bill was again reported favorably from the committee on Taxation and Revenue, but due to this delaying action there was not time enough left during this session for action in the Senate. The Farm Bureau is already making plans to continue their fight to get the farmer out of the mud at the next session of the Legislature.
