The second rule which today's pletures portray can be summarized briefly by stating that action toward or away from the camera may be stopped with nominal shutter speeds. Action which is "across" the camera axis requires faster shutters.

The picture of the boat, made with a box camera, is sharp despite the fact that the shutter speed was only about 1/40 second. This is because the boat was headed straight toward the lens of the camera and because the picture was snapped when the boat was still some distance away. Motion appears to be less at a distance than at close range, as you've probably noticed in watching cars whiz down a road.

So don't hesitate to try pictures of sports, regardless of the type of camera you use. Alertness, ability. and careful planning will help you to get good pictures. You'll find that the more shots you make and the more familiar you become with these shots, the better your results -John van Guilder



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

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

farm Southwest of Iowa Park. These irrigation laterals are constructed or elevated mostly above natural ground to insure good head of water. County equipment of Commissioner E. E. Voyles is doing the construction work. Elevated irrigation lateral ditches are now being constructed on the Hardin College farm. The work is being done by equipment owned by the irrigation district. Most of the land that is now being leveled, bordered, and prepared for irrigation will be planted to alfalfa or legumes and grass mix this fall. Legumes are the best crop that can be grown on land to increase the permeability or water intake of the soil. Most of the land has formed a hard pan from plowing approximately the same depth year after year. Legumes with their large taproot help break this hard pan. Some farmers are using a large pan breaker to break this hard pan before planting legumes and then planning on legumes from then on to keep the soil in a more loose friable condition.

Some farmers have burned off wheat stubble after wheat harvest. From results of tests this is not a recommended conservation practice. A mulch of wheat straw on or near the surface of soil retards wind erosion in Fall or early Spring, and the straw also helps hold moisture. Straw on surface of soil helps control water erosion. The more organic matter a soil has the more capable it is of holding water, and organic matter can only be added to the soil by decayed vegetation or animal
