## Wichita Co. 4-H Clubs To Reorganize

Now that schools are opening for another year, it is time for 4-H Club meetings. A club will be organized in each school or community where there are enough boys who want to continue or start 4-H club work.

Meetings will be held once or twice a month, depending upon arrangements made with schools and wishes of the members.

Last year 383 boys were 4-H club members, and 10 clubs were organized. This year let's raise both of these numbers.

To become a 4-H member, a boy must be 10 years old by the end of 1950, or under 21 on January 1, 1950. Each member must carry one or more projects which may be picked from the following list: Beef calves, dairy animals, sheep, hogs, turkeys, chickens, ducks, rabbits, gardens, orchards, crops, or wildlife projects.

Besides being able to make money from projects, there are other advantages offered 4-H club members. Contests are open to all 4-H members that have as prizes all expense paid trips to National 4-H Club Congress, \$100 War Bonds, college scholarships, watches, and other small prizes.

From time to time special trips and contests are opened to 4-H members. Dairy calves, chickens, pigs, and rabbits are given to many 4-Hers for projects.

Not only are the above prizes offered, but members are taught better ways of farming and tending to livestock and poultry, thus preparing them as future leaders in agriculture.

In September or early October, new clubs will be formed, so if you are interested in becoming a 4-H member or keeping up your work, attend the 4-H meeting at your school when it is announced.

IOWA PARK, Texas, Sept. 8—As time draws near for the opening of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwestern Oil Exposition on Sept. 26, much enthusiasm is being shown in various departments of each division.

The entire program of shows in each division is being planned to attract attention throughout this section.

The agricultural department headed by T. J. Pace of Iowa Park, has added a grass display this year which will enable farmers and ranchers to identify all grasses grown in this area. Fred Parkey, work unit conservator of Willbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district, who heads the grass display stated that this promises to be one of the most remarkable of any in the fair.

Both irrigated and dry land products will be exhibited in the agricultural departments. Other area counties are cooperating in this division through their county agent.

Four-H Club boys in nine area counties will bring their top pigs to the show. Judging will be held at 2 p. m. on Saturday, October 1.

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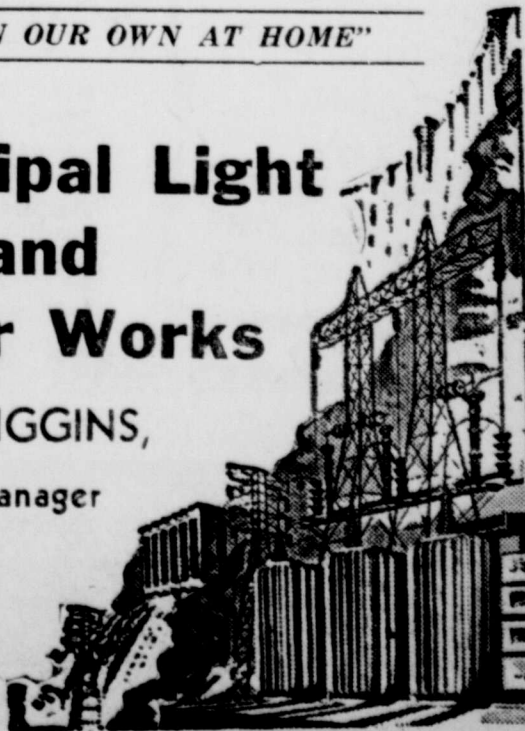

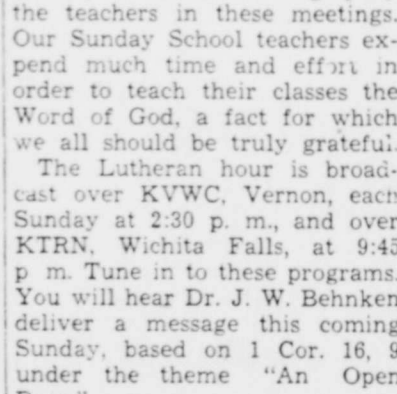

### The SNAPSHOT GUILD

### Use Ingenuity in Picturing Pets

SEVERAL weeks ago I happened to see a fine color picture of an election scene which had been made by one of the country's outstanding photographic studios. A line of people waiting to step into the voting booth were shown in a typical small town hall and the picture was full of homely touches which made it real: the picture of George Washington on the wall, the commuter with newspaper under his arm, a small kitten arching his back as one of the waiting voters scratched his neck.

Knowing that shots such as this involve a good deal of careful preparation, I asked the man who made it how he managed to pose the kitten and get it to stay still until he had the picture just right... and was ready to shoot. "Easy," he told me, "we just rubbed a bit of catnip on the fingers of the man scratching his neck."

The point of this story is that tricks like this are often necessary if you're going to get successful shots of animals. And they are easy to bring about with a bit of ingenuity. When you plan your animal pictures, arrange some means of making certain that the animal's attention will be focused where you want it.

Experience proves that one of the

best times to picture any animal—whether around the house or at the zoo—is feeding time. They're naturally alert then. It's easy to get good pictures when an animal is eating and you're little worry that your subject will move suddenly.

A second good point to keep in mind in picturing animals and pets is that young animals always lend themselves to charming pictures. Like children, kittens, puppies, and bear cubs have their own appeal. While it takes patience to catch them in just the pose you want, the snaps are worth the effort.

And third, be sure to make close ups when shooting animals. Like people, a pet has personality and it can't be captured easily when you're 20 feet away from your picture subject. So move close in—say six to ten feet—where you can get a "big" image of the animal. You'll find that this helps a lot.

In fact, you'll find that most of the rules which hold for shots of people hold good for pictures of your pets or other animals. If you are seeking new camera subjects try them. You'll find fine snapshot material at the zoo, on a farm, or in the pets around your household.

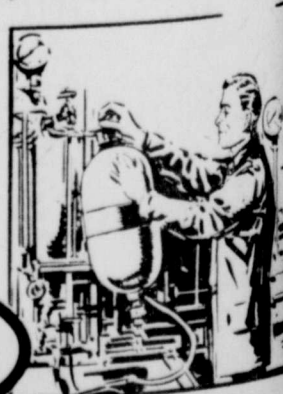
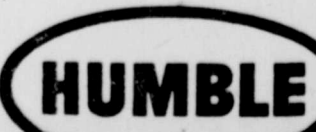

### Wise Builder Can Cut Cost, Keep Quality

Many persons building houses  
today are forced to modify their  
dream homes in order to achieve  
practical results they can afford,  
but they are warned against the  
false economy of sacrificing long-  
lasting quality for cheapness.

Because a home is expected to  
last a lifetime, proper construc-  
tion obviously is of paramount  
importance. However, proper con-  
struction need not mean the most  
expensive kind. Many inexpen-  
sive materials give excellent ser-  
vice.

Walter T. Anicks of Ann Arbor,  
Mich., a leading small homes  
architect, often recommends cin-  
der block as an economical mate-  
rial for sidewalls. He suggests that  
the blocks be painted white in  
harmony with a roof of solid or  
blended color.

For the roof, Donald L. Ceder-  
lund, Grand Rapids, Mich., de-  
signer and builder, says asphalt  
shingles are the "best bet." The  
most popular roofing material for  
American homes, asphalt shingles  
are relatively low in price. Ac-  
cording to the Bureau of Labor  
Statistics report for April, the  
wholesale price of asphalt strip  
shingles is only 5.7 percent above  
1926.

Producers of lumber point out  
that savings frequently can be  
made in this essential material,  
too. Top grades of lumber are not  
necessary everywhere in a house.  
Lower grades, with knotholes and  
irregular grain, often can be used  
in places where they will not be  
visible after the house is finished  
and where great strength is not  
needed. For example, No. 1 grade  
is not required for sheathing on  
the outside of studs in sidewalls.
