

From Jan. 1 to Sept. 30, 1948, receipts were \$13,125.58 a total of \$1,187.46 increase over last year. Increase in the month of September was \$275.08, with receipts totaling \$4,304.19 for Sept. 1949 compared to \$4,029.11 in Sept. 1948.



Church of Christ | A Community Loye C. Ruckman, Minister First and Ave. C. Is No Better Than Its Farm Land

A speech by Dr. Paul D. Sanders, a Richmond editor, was so sound and reasonable that Senator Robertson of Virginia inserted it in the Congressional Record. Dr. Sanders warned of evil days to come if this nation should make the mistakes made after World War I, allowing farmers to lose their purchasing

"The farm always has been and always will be the seedbed of the nation's population and it is the nation's responsibilty to preserve it," declared our editor-neighbor. But he asserted there are "evil signs on the economic horizon today, and powerful forces that would deny credit to low income families and knock the props from under economic prosperity.

He observed that "this grassroots prosperity will continue only so long as business and labor and government are willing to give the farmer a fair return for his labor.

He added: "I contend that prosperous agriculture is the key to sustained prosperity in this country."

Scarlet Fever Is Dangerous Disease Says Dr. Geo. Cox

Scarlet fever is one of the most disabling and dangerous diseases usually associated with childhood, although actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. While only six cases were reported in the state during the week ending September 24, it brought the year's total to 911 cases.

The Doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive red rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications may cause prolonged disability or death. The children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing lifelong invalidism or

"A child with any kind of a sore throat should be seen by family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment recommended will do much to alleviate discomfort and reduce the possibility of serious complications.

Dr. Cox stated that children under ten years of age are most susceptible, and that those persons who fail to contract scarlet fever until grown stand an excellent chance of never having the disease.





SOIL CONSERVATION **NEWS**

A county roadside ditch is now being sloped on the Wilbur Prechel farm on the Clara Conservation Group, this week. The work is being done by county equipment in Iowa Park Precinct of Commissioner E. E. Voyles. The roadside ditch will take care of water from terrace outlets from cultivated field of Mr. Prechel.

Land leveling is now in process on the Cliff Brogdon irrigated farm Southwest of Iowa Park. The work is being done by maintainer. New irrigation laterals have been constructed Wichita Falls; line, Ellis, Felgar, Ivey, Kolter, and borders are now being built. Length of borders are determined by soil type and the ability of the soil to absorb water. Mr. Brogdon plans to plant the area being leveled to alfalfa for hay and to alfalfa and Johnson grass for pasture. Is Mexico slaughtering our waterfowl? To find out, Albert M. Day, head of the Fish and Wildlife Service, late last year visited the region around Mexico City where gunning is heaviest. He reports: "We found hunting pressure that would be absolutely inconceivable to the average American duck hunter -because it is so light."

Day is convinced that much of the criticism that we in the United States level at the Mexicans is due to a difference in fundamental philosophy about waterfowl hunting. Here duck hunting is a cherished sport. Every waterfowl hunter in the United States contributes annu-The ally toward the management of this resource through purchase of the federal duck stamp. The duck hunters of this country have long been seasoned to regulation by the government. They have felt restraints and restrictions for more than 30 years.

In Mexico the situation is entirely different. Hunting is in the same status there as it was here 50 years ago. Equipment owned by population takes waterfowl for food pretty much wherever and whenever it can, the same as farm boys in many of our states consider it proper to take rabbits. Yet their methods are so crude and inefficient, and the wintering concentrations of birds are so widely scattered that the total take of birds is small. By the very nature of waterfowl habits combined with the use of ancient weapons, the kill by natives consists in large part of coots.

It is true that wild ducks are sold on the market in Mexico-but they probably wouldn't be sold in restaurants were it

Mexicans point out that Mexico sells 5,000 hunting licenses as compared to the 12 million in the United States. Of these only about 20 per cent are duck hunters. As for native hunting, we should go a bit slow in our criticism. Alaska and Canada both recognize the importance of waterfowl in filling the needs of a native population for food and clothing.

Mexican game officials and sportsmen are fully aware of their waterfowl situation and the problems involved in improving it. There is every reason to believe that the management of this important continental resource will become better.




