## The Way That Is Sate

In the midst of the chaos and confusion that the honest seeker of the truth finds himself, he desires to know the safe course to pursue in religion. He is not interested in the way that might be right, but the one that is infallibly safe. Our Savior has told us that we must enter the narrow gate and walk the straightened way in order to be saved (Matt. 7:13, 14). An important reason for being cautious that no mistake be made in finding the right way is that each person is to make but one trip. We travel the pathway of life but once, and if our course has been the wrong one when we get to the end of life's journey, it will be too late to correct our mistake.

Because many do not know which way to turn in the realm of religion it is imperative that we find a solution to a few of our religious problems. What is the safe po-

sition in regard to these?

1. THE BIBLE. What are we to believe about the Bible? This question has divided people into two groups, one believing that it is the work of man, and the other that it is the revelation of God. Which of these views should we accept? Which one is the safe position? Let us consider the man who maintains that the Bible is the work of man. He lives his life, does what he thinks is right; but there is always facing him a doubt, the possibility that he is wrong. The Bible which he refuses to accept teaches that there is a judgment and a hereafter. Then this man dies. What then, when he finds that the Bible is true? What has he gained? Nothing, but he has lost everything; he must suffer eternal punishment. But now, what about the man who accepts the Bible as God's revelation? He lives in this life, is at least as happy as the first man considered, and he makes at least an equal contribution to the society in which he lives. However, even in this life he is different from the first man. Before him is assurance and security. He knows full well that even if the Bible were false, he has lost nothing in accepting its principles. But if the Bible is true, then what? He has lost nothing, but he has gained everything-eternal happiness with God. The man who accepts the Bible as God's revelation, then, has everything to gain, nothing to lose. This person is safe. He who rejects the Bible as the revelation of God has everything to lose and nothing to




