Christ as a Teacher. The officers came to the chief priests and Pharisees and said: "Never man so spake." It is very important that the successful teacher should have a perfect example in teaching the Word of God. There are souls to save. The Gospel is God's power to save. Teachers of the Gospel of Christ have a perfect model of a teacher in Christ, the Son of God. He spoke with authority. When Jesus finished the Sermon on the Mount, the multitudes were astonished at His teaching: for he taught them as one having authority, and not as their scribes. The New Testament is the source of our authority. This is accepting the Word of God without addition, without subtraction, and without modification. This is safe.

God gave Christ a work to do, and He did it willingly. (Jno. 7:16; 5:30). Jesus loved the will of God for the truth's sake and souls. (Mark 6:34). Teaching and preaching for the truth's sake and souls is Christlike. Men are led by motive. Preaching for the sake of souls is a high motive. Let us remember there are souls to save.

Jesus was a fearless teacher. "Ye hypocrites, well did Isaiah prophesy of you, saying, This people honoreth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain do they worship me, teaching as their doctrines the precepts of men." (Matt. 15:1-9). Read Matthew 23 and note the number of times Christ said: "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites!" "Woe unto you, ye blind guides!" It is true that He taught with loving-kindness and compassion, and He also was a fearless and faithful teacher. He was definite. He drew lines and took a definite stand for truth and righteousness. The people knew where He stood in His preaching. He is our example. "But if any man hath not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of His." 2




