The worst happened. Within a few minutes the Santa Maria was fast on a reef. The rolling surf. drove the ship higher and higher upon the reef and opened her seams. oon she fell over on her side and the water poured into her hull. Columbus and the crew were forced to seek refuge on his other ship, the Nina.


Early next morning Columbus sent word of the wreck to Chief Guacanagari. Promptly the chief sent a message to Columbus assuring him that he would give him all the assistance possible.

In this day, however, it is desirable to have bird dogs of two calibers: the well broken, retrieving animal of medium or short range but well paced to suit the walking hunter; and the well broken pointer or setter, fast and long ranged for the mounted hunter, that handles well to voice and whistle.

There are still some areas left in the United States where prime quail shooting may be had, and the bag limits are lowered to such a point that a day's quail shooting can often be had from the rise of two or three coveys.
