## Area Farmers Get C. of C. Awards on Soil Conservation

Monday night at the Chamber of Commerce annual banquet, J. V. Brookshear, head of the Agriculture committee of the C. of C., made awards to area farmers on behalf of the local organization. Five awards were made. A \$100.00 E Bond was given to the best Oklahoma tenant farmer, the best owner-operator farmer, and like awards to Texas farmers. A plaque was given to the master farmer determined by reports from the Soil Conservation Service for this area.

More information was furnished on the Texas farmers, because the Soil Conservation district here has been organized longer than in the Southern part of Oklahoma.

In making the awards, Mr. Brookshear briefly reviewed the accomplishments of each farmer.

OKLAHOMA—

- W. M. YOUNG, Owner-Operator: Contour farming drilled crops, 300 acres. Contour chiseling cropland, 300 acres. Applied 10,000 pounds of superphosphate. Established a cover of winter legumes (Hairy Vetch), 2,500 pounds. Has 60 acres of sweet clover and bermuda grass pasture. All terracing needed on farm completed before 1949. F. W. THOMPSON, Tenant-Operator: Contour drilled crops, 64 acres. Contour chiseling cropland, 75 acres. Establishing a cover of winter legumes (Hairy Vetch) 100 pounds.

Mowing weeds in permanent pasture, 50 acres. All terracing needed on farm completed before 1949.

TEXAS—

WALTER KASPAR, Owner-Operator: Mr. Walter Kaspar, farming one mile west and 1 mile north of the Clara Community, is a fine example of landowner-operator, who is carrying out an excellent conservation program. He has reared a family on this 320 acre farm. His land is divided into approximately 70 acres of pasture and 265 acres in cultivation.

When the Soil Conservation District took Mr. Kaspar's farm under agreement in early 1948 he had already built 3 miles of terraces. These terraces did not function too well and were badly in need of adequately protected outlet channels.

Since then, he has completed 3.9 miles of additional terraces; constructed and vegetated four (4) terrace outlet channels, which service 5.5 miles of terraces; planted all of his land on the contour, following terraces as guides; plowed in such

During World War II, Smith served 32 months with the Coast Guard, and was overseas 22 months.

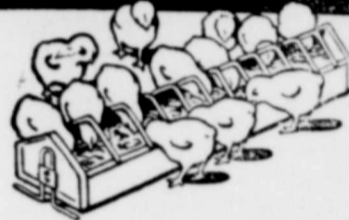

**Columbus Unlucky On Christmas Eve**

America's first Christmas was celebrated by Christopher Columbus. It happened on Christmas eve of the memorable year 1492.

Columbus was planning to observe the Feast of the Nativity with the Indian chieftain, Guacanagari, who ruled over the island of Haiti. Already he had received fine presents from the chief who he believed to be great Khan of Cipango, that fabulous realm of the Orient. Columbus mistakenly thought he had found.

But Columbus' plans went wrong. He was so tired from long watches while the Santa Maria cruised the island channels that he retired to his cabin for a nap. While he was sleeping, the next in command also decided to take a rest and went below. The helmsman, as tired as the others, decided that he deserved a rest as much as they and turned the tiller over to a cabin boy.

**Abandon Ship.**

The worst happened. Within a few minutes the Santa Maria was fast on a reef. The rolling surf drove the ship higher and higher upon the reef and opened her seams. Soon she fell over on her side and the water poured into her hull. Columbus and the crew were forced to seek refuge on his other ship, the Nina.

Early next morning Columbus sent word of the wreck to Chief Guacanagari. Promptly the chief sent a message to Columbus assuring him that he would give him all the assistance possible.

The noble chieftain was better than his word. He assembled a great flotilla of canoes and despatched them to the Santa Maria to bring all its valuables ashore. Amid the cargo the natives saw many things that made their eyes open wide with envy. Yet so strong was their friendship for the white men and so careful Guacanagari's supervision that not a single article was stolen.

**Christmas Banquet.**

After the last article had been brought ashore, Guacanagari had another plan. His guests had missed Christmas, but there was no reason why Columbus and the men should not enjoy the finest banquet he and his followers could provide.

There was game from the woods, lobster and fish from the sea; and all sorts of tropical fruits and vegetables. A thousand natives danced in Columbus' honor after the feasting and the climax of the ceremonies came when the chief brought out a coronet of gold and placed it upon Columbus' head. There were also presents of gold for the crew. In the journal which he was keeping for Ferdinand and Isabella, Columbus wrote: "These people love their neighbors as themselves; their discourse is ever sweet and gentle, and accompanied by a smile. I swear to your majesties, there is not in the world a better nation or land."

**Secret Gifts Left By St. Nicholas**

The story of how St. Nicholas became associated with secret gift-giving, and even today comes covertly at night to leave his presents, is one of the most important in the history of his life.

Once upon a time there was a man with three daughters, all of them wishing to marry, but with no dowry forthcoming. Sorry, indeed, was their plight. Their father had about decided to sell them as slaves, but the good St. Nicholas heard of it, and filling a purse with gold, went quietly by night to their home. Seeing a window open, he threw in the bag of gold and then stole away in the night. This money enabled the eldest daughter to marry. A second and a third time St. Nicholas made the trip and finally all three daughters were married.

After the saint's third trip, the girls' father, who had been watching to see who brought the gifts, ran after St. Nicholas and thanked him for his kindness. St. Nicholas made him promise not to divulge his gift-giving and after that he always deposited his presents so secretly that no one ever saw him. Yet people knew, somehow, that it was he who brought gifts during the night, and so whenever they found a package mysteriously delivered they instantly exclaimed, "St. Nicholas has brought it!"

1. Will range livestock take more salt if it is placed near water?

Research workers of the Soil Conservation Service in Texas report that cattle eat nearly twice as much salt when it is distributed at several places in a pasture as when all the salt is placed near the watering trough.

2. How can onion flavor in milk be prevented?

If weedy pastures are used, return the milking herd to the barnyard or dry lot several hours before milking.

3. How does the birth weight of pigs correlate with the health, vigor and livability of pigs farrowed?

Experience at the Ralston Purina Research Farm proves that the birth weight of pigs is an excellent indication of vigor and livability. Of pigs weighing one and one-half pounds at birth, only 13% were alive at weaning time. Of pigs weighing three pounds or more at birth, 77%-85% were weaned.

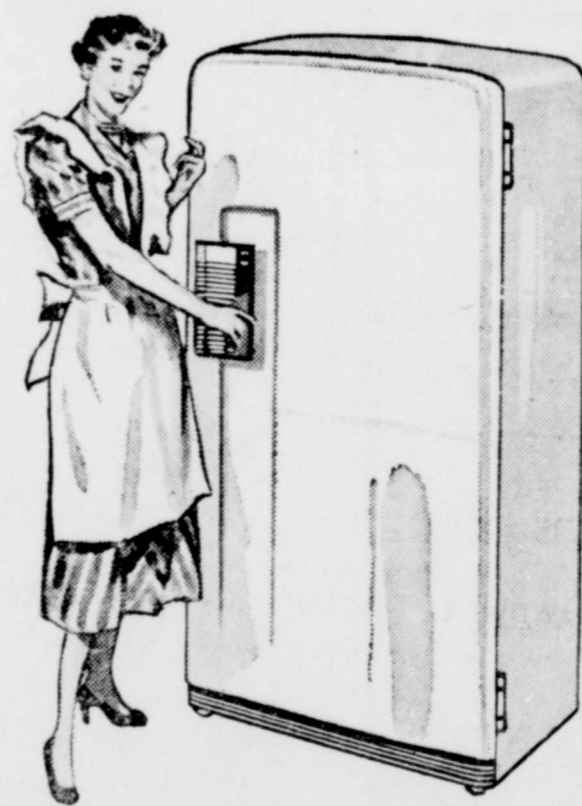

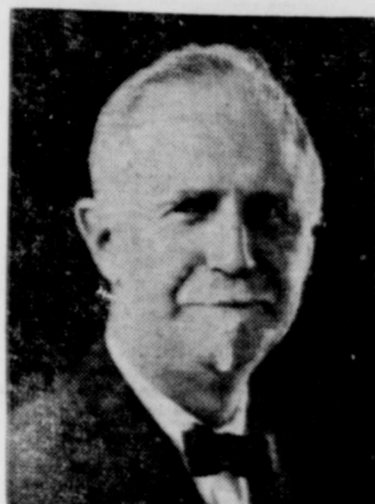

Only this year he has been active in the establishment of still another medium of service to the public, the Gravity Research Foundation, located at New Boston, New Hampshire.

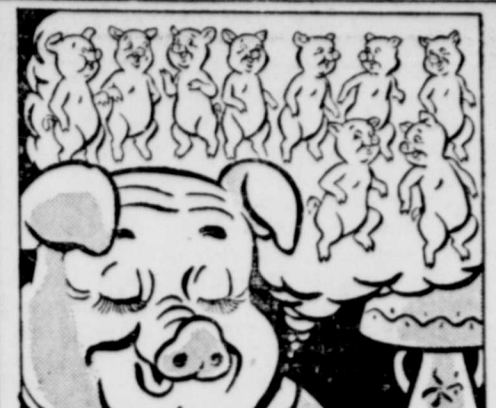

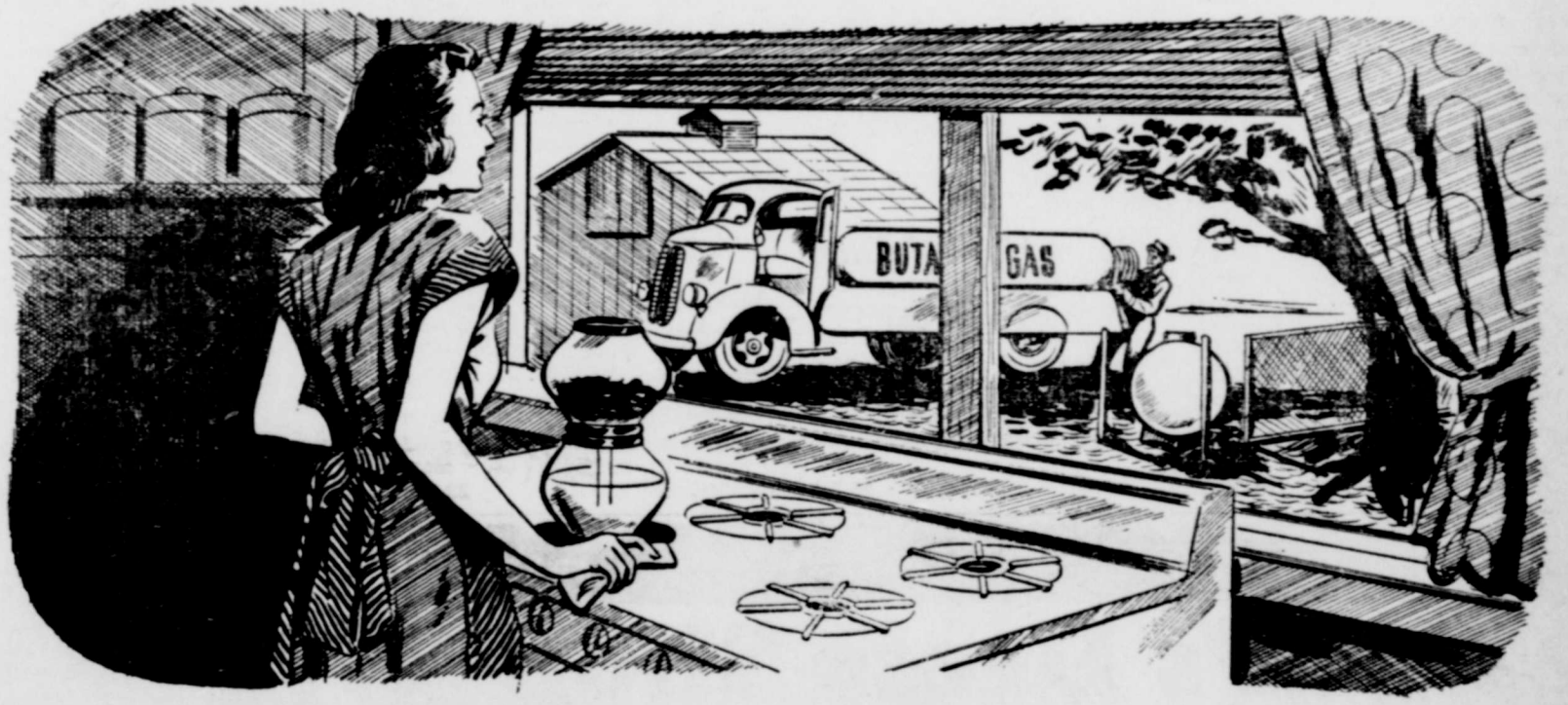

**THE BOBWHITE QUAIL**

America's most beloved wing-target and table delicacy is struggling to maintain its supremacy in most of the fifteen gun-eligible states where we find the bobwhite quail. The sportsman's methods of gunning the bobwhite are for most points the same as they were when your grandad broke his setters and pointers to handle the quail. There was a time, tho, when quail were so plentiful that in some regions the hunter didn't really need a shooting dog.

In this day, however, it is desirable to have bird dogs of two calibers: the well broken, retrieving animal of medium or short range but well paced to suit the walking hunter; and the well broken pointer or setter, fast and long ranged for the mounted hunter, that handles well to voice and whistle.

There are still some areas left in the United States where prime quail shooting may be had, and the bag limits are lowered to such a point that a day's quail shooting can often be had from the rise of two or three coveys.

a manner as to leave all stubble and crop residues in the top two or three inches of the soil; deferred and rotated his grazing on his pastures in order to improve the cover of grass and to encourage the reseeding of desirable grasses; rebuilt the spillway on his farm pond in order to control gullying, and provide natural cover for the encouragement of wildlife, and has completely established his crop rotation system on all cultivated acreage.

Though Mr. Kaspar has been a cotton farmer, he has established a three year rotation providing for corn, legumes, and either grain sorghum or small grain overseeded with hubam clover. During the past two years he has grown approximately 265 acres of legumes. He prefers Austrian Winter Peas and Vetch. In addition he grows alfalfa and clovers.

Not only has he established his planned practices but he is constantly maintaining those practices. The Kaspars believe in a live-at-home farm philosophy as can readily be seen by the large laying flock, the hog herd, and the cattle which he raises. Through them he markets much of the crop which he grows. By this system he is increasing the fertility of his soils by returning all manure to the soil.

NORB ZIMMERMAN, Tenant-Operator:

Mr. Norb Zimmerman and family came to Texas from Oklahoma in 1942. He lived 3 yrs. on the Mat Riley farm North of Burkburnett, then moved to the Van Lesley farm in 1945. Mr. and Mrs. Zimmerman live on this farm now. He has two children, and they are both married and gone from home.

Mr. Zimmerman operates the 169 acre farm belonging to Mr. Van Lesley of Wichita Falls. This farm had been allowed to run down for many years. Gullies were cutting the farm into three separate fields. Two of these gullies were so deep that a person standing upright in them could not be seen from a distance of three hundred feet.

Norb was one of the first farmers to contact the Iowa Park office of the Soil Conservation District for assistance after it was opened in 1946. He alone, was responsible for a number of his neighbors' requests for assistance from this office. He was the sixth agreement written in Wichita County.

He began his establishment of practices in 1946. Since that time he has built 6 miles of terraces. Among the other practices carried out by Mr. Zimmerman are: 128 acres contour planting with terraces as guides; 128 acres of plowing in order to leave the crop residue on the surface of the soil; 13 acres of pasture which he has grazed in such a manner as to allow the desirable grasses to reseed; construction of 2,800 feet of terrace outlet channel, which serves as an outlet for 6 miles of terraces; and the construction of 5 mile of diversion terrace.

His crop rotation is a four year rotation of corn, cotton, legume, and either small grain or grain sorghum. He has chosen Vetch as his principal legume. Twelve acres of Vetch in 1946 returned him \$52.00 per acre as a seed crop.

Norb has planted Vetch every year as a cover crop and a soil improving crop. He has increased his wheat yields from an average of 14 bushels per acre to 20 bushels per acre. Mr. Zimmerman likes to plant oats in, as a nurse crop, with his Vetch. This makes it easier to separate the seed.

This year, Mr. Zimmerman has 35 acres in Vetch and 10 acres in alfalfa, which is planted on land that was planted to Vetch last year. He is changing his cropping system from row crops to small grains and legumes. By using his fields in his grazing system he has greatly improved his buffalo and grama grass pasture.

Throughout the past four years Norb has received the encouragement and cooperation of Mr. Van Lesley. This co-operation has resulted in the execution of a conservation plan which has proved beneficial to both. This could well be a model for other landlord-tenant relationships.

In addition to operating this farm, he has constructed an estimated 50 miles of terraces for other farmers of the community.

O. WILBUR PRECHEL, Owner-Operator—MASTER FARMER:

Mr. O. W. Prechel is truly a master conservation farmer. Though an old timer so far as knowledge of his soil, crops and livestock are concerned, he is a young farmer and his applica-

tion of conservation practices and principles. Young, in that he has only been doing them for fifteen or twenty years. Look around in his community and you find conservation is being applied on nearly all the farms.

Wilbur Prechel operates a farm which years ago was, on the downgrade. It is hilly, rolling and easily eroded soil. Terracing was started many years ago. At that time there was a gully some six or eight feet deep and impossible to cross. Today, thanks to many years' efforts farming goes on right across the old gullies. Some 6.5 miles of terraces have been built to control the water erosion. Though most farmers detest and fear bermuda grass, Mr. Prechel uses it to good advantage in his terrace outlets to control the erosion at that point.

Having an old cultivated field which was badly eroded and that should not be in cultivation, Mr. Prechel decided to put it in pasture. He contour furrowed, rotated his grazing, mowed to control weeds, built stock ponds, and terraced the cultivated land above them. By applying all practices, he has developed an excellent pasture.

Among the other practices which he has carried out are: contour farming following as guide lines terraces, grown 264 acres of legumes since May, 1948; plowed 266 acres in such a manner as to leave crop residues in surface soil; rotated his grazing and mowed in order to promote reseeding of his best grasses on 125 acres; seeded one acre of range to grass; encouraged wildlife by allowing areas to seed for food and cover as well as having a good fish management program in his five stock ponds; constructed five stock water and better distribution of grazing; built 2 mile of diversion terrace to control excess drainage; installed a farm water system using water from stock pond as a source of supply, and constructed five terrace outlet channels to provide good outlets for his terraces.

In addition he has donated additional right-of-way to the county for them to construct roadside ditch which is not nearly as easily eroded. He will establish a vegetative cover for this channel instead of having a deep narrow ditch; the ditch is a broad, flat, channel.

Mr. Prechel's good conservation program has resulted in increased yields on all his crops. Much of this yield is utilized as livestock feed. Among other things he grows an orchard, Hereford hogs, beef cattle and poultry. This enables him to return to the soil as manure practically all the nutrients removed by the crops.
