THE FIGHT AGAINST GOOD FOOD

Just why any food-produced by the farmer or the be ridiculous. Suppose political groups should make a campaign against butter and try to outlaw it?

No one seems to "take up arms" against butter. Your Washington correspondent rises to remind you that 30 years ago there was as much difference between good butter and bad butter as you could imagine-and yet the dairy industry raised the rank and quality of good butthe quality of good, excellent margarine.

Thirty-two States have legalized the manufacture and sale of yellow margarine. Ohio took the matter to the polls and voted last November by 1,282,606 to 799,473 to legislate pre-colored margarine. Nine States have gone the same way in two years. There has been more tom foolery than common sense in the ways and methods by which the fight has been carried on to outlaw margarine, notwithstanding the fact that it is being used in the same manner as a food by the poor and the rich on their dining room table.

FOR SERVICE RENDERED

It used to be that a pension was a reward for long and faithful service to an occupation. A man retired in dignity into later life, his productive years over. When a bill became law that gave pensions to congressmen, it was or should have been, with this purpose in mind. But, when a former congressman serves a penitentiary sentence for defrauding the government during office, receives his pension during prison sentence and later for his entire life, the pension plan is wrong. If another congressman is sentenced to prison on a charge of fraud in office, serves his time and then later on his 62 birthday starts to receive the lifetime pension, the pension plan is wrong. We agree with the man who says the congressional pension law needs an amendment, that it be stipulated that no pension money from the federal treasury, in excess of contributions made by the individual concerned, be paid to any public official who is found guilty of violating his trust. This adds dignity to a reward for loyal and faithful service and renews our regard for the rightful purpose for which the pension idea was intended.





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

THE ANCIENT BOUNDARIES

The ancient landmark on marriage is that adultery is the ONLY cause giving the innocent person the right to remarry. (Matt. 19:3, 9). State Legislatures have by their own authority moved that divine marker.

Regarding boundaries of the Lord's Supper, Jesus said, "and I appoint unto you a kingdom, even as my Father appointed unto me, that ye may eat and drink at my table in the kingdom." (Luke 22:29, 30). Paul said, "For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye proclaim the Lord's death till he come." (I Cor. 11:26). Some churches rule out altogether the bread and fruit of the vine, showing disrespect for the bleeding body of Christ, others fail to partake steadfastly on the first day of the week, which is a removal of the ancient landmark.

Music in the worship is laid out by divine markers. Use of pianos, organs or orchestras in the worship is to go beyond that which is written. To say, "Mechanical music is a little thing to preach against," is as if to say, "Where Nadab and Abihu got the fire was a little matter." God does not see it that way or He would not have given us the New Testament for a guide.

Baptism, a burial in a watery grave, and a resurrection, is an ancient landmark, Romans 6:3, 7. Priests and preachers, NOT GOD, have removed that marker, saying a burial is unnecessary, that sprinkling will do, and some saying that a sinner is saved without even sprinkling.

We plead with all to go to the Bible and find the ancient landmarks and then abide with the boundaries set down by God.



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


