## C. of C. Directors Had Breakfast Tuesday Morning

Tuesday morning fifteen directors of the Chamber of Commerce met at Town Hall for an early breakfast and business session, with President Paul Browning in charge.

Upon recommendation of the finance committee, directors present voted unanimously to ask the membership for increases in dues up to 100 per cent, which would enable the organization to hire extra outside help in expanding the work of the local Chamber. A check of approximately one-fourth of the membership by the finance committee showed 98 per cent willing to raise their dues, some as much as 300 per cent for a more active program of work.

The finance and membership drive will now get into full swing. "This is the year for Burkburnett" was echoed many times during the breakfast hour. There is more enthusiasm about the Chamber of Commerce now than at any time in many, many years. The opportunity to accomplish many programs of advancement is here. ## Annual Junior Steer Show At Electra Feb. 11th

Harlan Mills, local member of the Wichita County 4-H Calf Show committee, announced this week that the annual Wichita County Junior Steer Show will be held in Electra on February 11 in the National Guard Armory, Burkburnett, Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, and Electra will cooperate in sponsoring this event as they did in 1949.

The day will start with the weighing in of the calves beginning at 8:00 A. M. and all the calves must be weighed in and bedded down in the barn at 10:00 A. M. The boys have from 10:00 until 12:00 to get the calves groomed properly for the afternoon showing. At 12 the exhibitors will be given a noon meal followed at 1:00 P. M. by the Junior Judging Contest. This contest is open to all 4-H and FFA teams of this area. At 2:00 P. M., the Junior Class of Steers will be judged and the Senior Steer judging will follow at 2:45 P. M.

The grand event of the day will start at 3:30 when the two top steers of the junior class will compete with the two top senior steers for the Grand and Reserve Champion. At 3:45 the Judge, Jimmy Rice, will pick out the top ten steers which will go to the District Show at Wichita Falls. Auctioneer J. R. Ray has volunteered his services for the auction of the steers not eligible for the District show at 4:00 P. M.

Prizes for junior and senior steers are, 1st, \$125.00; 2nd, \$100.00; 3rd, \$75.00, and 4th, \$50.00. In addition, Grand Champion gets \$10.00 and the Reserve Champion gets \$5.00.

The 40th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America will be observed Feb. 6 to 12 in every part of the nation by more than 2,300,000 boys and adult leaders. "Strengthen Liberty" is the birthday theme. The Boy Scouts' "Crusade to Strengthen the Arm of Liberty" continues through 1950.

During Boy Scout Week, Units will hold "Crusade Night" meetings when 1949 Crusade Awards will be presented. Representing the 12 Scout Regions, 12 outstanding Boy Scouts will make a "Report to the Nation" at Washington, D.C., where the Movement was incorporated Feb. 8, 1910. They will also take part in an impressive ceremony at Independence Hall in Philadelphia.

The highlight of 1950 will be the Second National Jamboree which will see 40,000 Scouts and Leaders camping together at Valley Forge, Pa., from June 30 to July 6, including Scouts of other lands.

Since 1910 more than 16,500,000 boys and men have been identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

## WHAT DO YOU OWN

None in this area deny that Americans enjoy the highest standard of living in the world. We are grateful for the good things but not boastful. It is just a fact, a statement. How much better off are we, materially? The Federal Reserve Board, through the University of Michigan Research Center, sent out trained questioners for answers from all kinds of people in all walks of life. Here are some of our "comforts":

Even where heads of family were under 25 years, about 3 in every 5 families have an auto. One in 20 families, have two.

Four in every five families possessed something worth \$500.00 or more as bank accounts, government bonds, life insurance, real estate or securities, interest in a business or a 1949-1949 auto.

Stock in corporations is owned by about 1 in 12 families. One in 24 families has stock worth more than \$1,000. One in 50 families has stock worth more than \$5,000. Three in every 4 families have at least one member carrying life insurance. When incomes are under \$1,000, 1 in 2 families have insurance. Two of every 5 families with life insurance pay premiums averaging more than \$100 a year.

One-half of all families had indebtedness but only one-fourth of families debts run over \$500.

There is much more to the list but this gives us an idea of what we own, in a small part.

The Red Cross is NOT a social formation. It is a delegation of men and women working in the name of mankind. It should be free of bigotry, functioning for the good of all. Those who voted against having the convention, need not have attended. That is their privilege. But such intolerance sullies the honorable work and humanitarian projects for which the Red Cross stands.

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## AUSTIN Highlights

By Senator "Cotton" George Moffett

The Governor has called a special session of the Texas Legislature to meet on January 31, 1950. This is the first special session in nearly nine years. The state constitution provides that a special session must be limited to thirty days, and may consider only the subjects submitted to it by the Governor.

The urgent need for new buildings and additional doctors and nurses at the state's hospitals for the mentally ill, and other eleemosynary institutions has created an emergency which caused the Governor to call this special session. Furthermore the late Governor Jester vetoed the appropriations for the maintenance and support of the above mentioned state institutions for the second year of the present biennium. Consequently, after next September there would be no salaries for supplies for the people who work in these institutions, nor food and care for the unfortunate people who reside there. Therefore, the Governor had no other choice than to call the special session.

There are approximately 25 thousand people in the state's 25 eleemosynary institutions. About 4 thousand more are on the waiting list, some of whom are in jail. The number has increased greatly in the past ten years because the population of Texas has grown rapidly during that period, which automatically brings an increase in the number of mentally ill.

No buildings were built during the war period because of the shortage and high cost of building materials, but justice to those unfortunate people clearly demands now that the state should construct additional buildings and employ additional doctors and nurses to treat and properly take care of these thousands of mentally ill people, some of whom can be returned to private life as useful citizens if given proper care and treatment. I would appreciate any expression of opinion from you about this entire subject.

As heretofore mentioned, it is hoped that people in this part of Texas will pay their poll tax and thus maintain an influential voice in the government of our state. The population of South Texas is increasing faster than that of North Texas, which makes it more desirable than ever that every person in our area, who can possibly do so, pay their poll tax and vote at every opportunity.

# Chamber Commerce Standing Committees 1950

## President Says: This Is The Year To Work

**Rheumatic Fever Is Child Enemy**

Rheumatic fever causes more deaths than any other disease in children of school age, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The first attack usually occurs in children at the age when they are in the first and second grade and recurrences are most common up to the age when children are leaving high school. The insidious onset of so many cases during the school year suggests that teachers and others in daily contact with school children should be aware of early signs and symptoms which may mean acute rheumatic fever.

Dr. Cox said, "There should be more and improved examinations of school children by physicians with time enough for the nurse or teacher and parents to plan with the physician for any needed medical attention."

"School absence due to illness or vague disorders, if investigated, may disclose early cases of rheumatic fever. The teachers need to be more alert to visible signs and symptoms suggestive of substandard health. Among these signs and symptoms which should bring children to the attention of teacher or parent are: Failure to gain weight, pallor, poor appetite, fatigue, frequent colds and sore throats, scarlet fever or any known streptococcal infection, unexplained nosebleeds, unexplained fever, pain in arms, legs and joints, unusual restlessness, history of previous rheumatic fever, behavior changes, decreasing achievements in school by a child who has previously done well.

"Children reported by the teacher as showing evidence of substandard health should be medically reviewed by the physician and needed medical care arranged for such children as soon as possible."

When those dainty white nylon blouses first came out much of the lace trimming was cotton. After many washings cotton is apt to turn yellow while nylon remains snow white. Fortunately this contrast can be eliminated by tinting the blouse a pretty pastel with all purpose dye. As a matter of fact everyone will remark about your lovely new blouse.

Table lamps used only for decoration can be any size and shape you wish. But those used for reading purposes should be high enough to shed a wide circle of light on the reading matter. To get the most possible light use a slanting shade with white inside.

Don't try to separate bacon slices when they're cold. They tear and look most unattractive. Just place the desired amount in a skillet in one piece. As the bacon cooks the slices separate very easily.

When you want something special in the potato line, prepare them this way: Cook and mash the needed amount. Add enough hot milk to make them light and fluffy. Then whip in a half-cup real mayonnaise, a little minced onion, chopped parsley and salt. Turn into lightly greased casserole. Then bake in a hot oven 25 to 30 minutes.

Many, many families in Europe are still destitute of food and clothing. Yet Post Office officials say that mailing of private relief packages overseas is running 30% below last year. Could it be that we're forgetting?

When your engagement ring and wedding band lose their lustre and need cleaning, dip them in and out of a solution of lukewarm water, strong soap and a little ammonia. When they look clean run cold water over them.

Ever bake a potato for the prescribed length of time and find it still hard? The potato's at fault. Not you. Some spuds are best for frying, some for boiling or baking. The grocer may be packaging them for just these special purposes soon.

You'll recall that last Spring the House of Representatives passed by a large majority a bill to remove the discriminatory taxes on yellow margarine. The Senate is expected to vote upon this bill early in January. If you think the 10c Federal tax on yellow margarine is unfair or if you're tired of coloring your own margarine, by all means write your Senators and tell them so.

Blame Old Man Weather on the fact that citrus fruit prices are high. Unusually cold weather and hurricanes have cut the production in half.

Taking off your shoes immediately when they become wet does more than prevent a cold. It saves the shape of your shoes. After they dry give them two coats of the oil/shinola. That helps soften the leather as well as bring back the fresh new look.

Remember that veiling has more of a function than just a hat trimming. It can be a flattering cosmetic aid or an interesting color accent. Beige and pale pink veiling in fine mesh gives a creamy glow to the skin. Shocking pink or tangerine makes an all-black costume even more sophisticated.

You do use a paper bag when flouring chicken, salting French Fries and sugaring doughnuts, don't you? It is not only the easiest and most economical way but costs more evenly. For those who've never tried it, just put a little flour, sugar or salt in a paper bag. Drop in a few pieces of food at a time and shake well.



1. Are acorns poisonous to cattle? The acorns are less poisonous than the leaves. If eaten in large quantities, both might cause symptoms of a digestive disorder, poor appetite, and gradual loss of weight. There is no effective treatment. Recognition of the cause and removal of animals from woodland pastures will usually result in complete recovery.

2. When may turkeys be vaccinated for fowl pox? The vaccination is easily given when the birds are removed from the brooder house when they are between six to ten weeks of age.

3. Should dairy heifers be bred according to age or according to body size? Experiments at the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm show that body size should determine when heifers should be bred. After many years of work on this, the Ralston Purina recommendations, by breeds, are as follows:

- Jerseys . . . . . 500 lbs.
Guernseys . . . . . 550 lbs.
Holsteins . . . . . 750 lbs.
Brown Swiss . . . . . 750 lbs.
Ayrshires . . . . . 650 lbs.

Blue Birds and Camp Fire Girls Selling Candy

A Mint 'O Money for the hope of all the Blue Birds and Camp Fire Girls in Burk Burnett as they began their annual Candy Sale on Wednesday, February 1st. It will last through February 14th. The Candy Mints are attractively packaged in a Camp Fire box. There are 20 rolls in each box in an assortment of flavors, spearmint, clove, winter green, and peppermint. It is expected that 10,000 boxes will be sold in the North Central Texas Area Council and that will be 200,000 individual rolls of candy mints!

The Mints will sell for \$1.00 per box and the profits will be divided three ways. Five cents on each box will go into the Camp Fire or Blue Bird group treasury; ten cents on each box will go into the treasury of the leaders' association to send group leaders to training institutes and to finance their association projects, such as the Dad-Daughter box suppers, the Mother-Daughter teas, etc. The remainder of the money will go into the building fund which has been set up to build a permanent camp for all the girls of North Texas. In addition, the girls may earn prizes for selling the Mints. 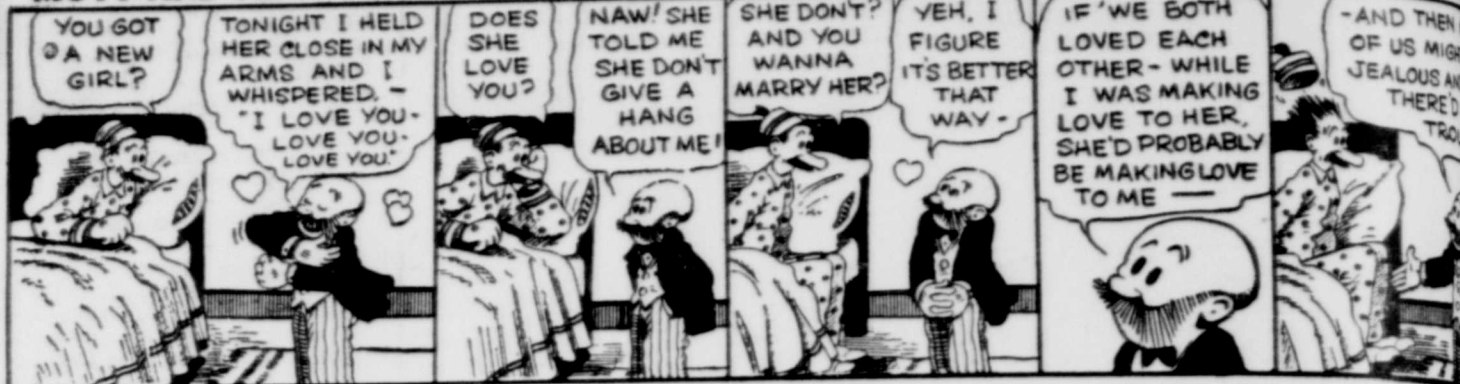

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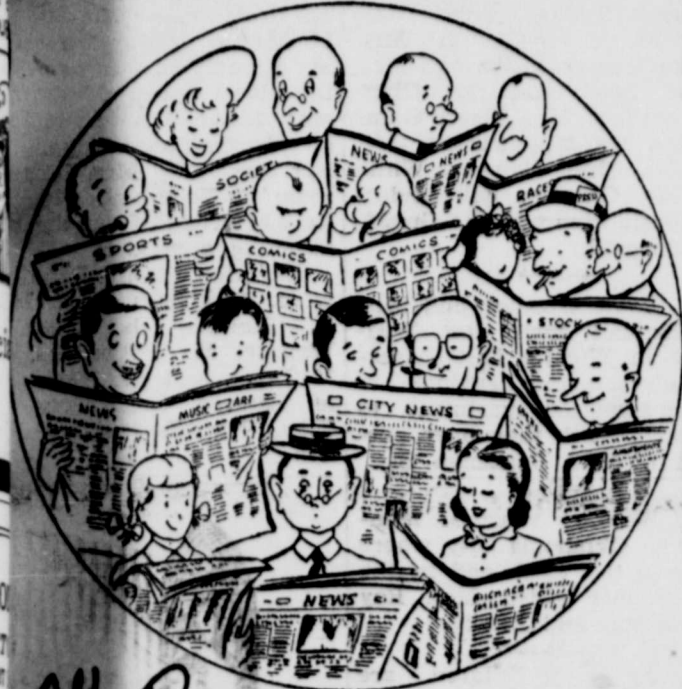

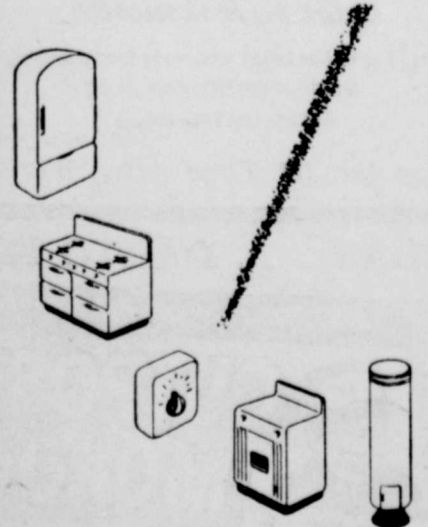
