

More telephone service is in Telephone Company's construction program here, according to C. Kirby, district manager the company.

The telephone system here will be expanded through the addition of more poles and caules to the outside relephone network, to be erected this

and east sections of the city. Kirby explained.

One of the principal areas to be served by the new additions is the south and southeast areas, lying roughly between the Wichita Falls highway and the new Oklahoma cut-off road. Kirby said.

The new cable extensions also will enlarge present talephone facilities throughout the south section lying west of the

To the northeast, still more added in the vicinity of the Oklahoma highway (U. S. 277 281) to bring telephone connections to residents in that

The planned expansion of will require the erection of 175 new poles and the stringing of miles of wire.

"It's a big job, requiring large amounts of materials manpower, and money," Rirby said, but it is part of our program to meet the continuing demand burnett.

As evidence of the city's growth, the district manager pointed out that there are now more than 1,000 telephones in

service here, or more than double the number in service before the war, when there were only about 370 here. More than 400 have been added since the

A & P Contends Anti-Trust Lawyers Are Wrong Again

Inflammatory and damaging allegations made in a suit against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., at Dallas, Texas, were so baseless that the Federal Judge "threw the Anti-trust lawyers and their case right out of his court," the company will say in advertisements this week end. The advertisement scheduled for publication in 2,500 newspapers throughout the nation, was the third in a series discussing former court cases where Federal Judges found that was no evidence against the company and administered stinging rebukes to the Anti-Trust lawyers. In the Dallas anti-trust suit, the ad states the anti-trust lawyers "made practically the same allegations they are making today" in their current suit to break up the 90 year old food store chain. Federal Judge W. H. Atwell, the ad states, ruled that the Dallas case "should not even be tried" because the indictment "contained inflammatory statements he would not allow to be presented to a jury.'

"If I thought I was presiding over a court and that I might have to sentence some person because he was a great big fellow, or because he was a lilliputian, I would feel like resigning," the ad quotes Judge Atwell. "God knows we don't want it ever to occur in America that the size is going to determine whether a man is guilty or innocent."

Judge Atwell, the ad also says, told the anti-trust lawyers "if the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial.

Saptioned "The third time the anti-trust lawyers were wrong," the advertisement reviews two other actions— The Washington, D. C., bread case and the Wilson, N. C., Potato case-in which Federal Judges found no evidence to support "Damaging" charges brought by anti-trust lawyers against A. &

The anti-trust lawyers are "still determined to destroy A. & P.", the ad continues, but it adds-"Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A. & P. destroyed." The ad cites how supplies, unions, competitors, news papers through editorials and people "in all walks of life" have rallied to A. & P.'s sup-

"The housewives of this nation, whose patronage has made this company big, are buying from us in increasing numbers and increasing volume," the ad says. "Apparently most Americans do not want to let the anti-trust lawyers in Washington blow the whistle on any businessman who does a better and more efficient job and grows big

- "I might say that I never tried a case in my life where a greater effort, more work, more investigation had been done, combing almost with a fine-tooth comb to gather evidence, as was done in this case.
- "But, as was said a long time ago, you can't make brick without straw, and you can't make a case without facts."

So here were two cases in which the anti-trust lawyers made seriously damaging charges against A&P, in which the judge decided that there were no facts to support those charges.





The state's present financial shortage has been brought about partly because of a decrease in the demand for crude oil. In the fiscal year of 1946, the tax on crude oil alone brought \$37,000,000 into the state treasury. 1949 it brought \$87,000,000, a fifty million dollar difference. In 1950, the revenue from the crude oil tax will be much less than in 1949 because of smaller demand for Texas crude oil. Foreign oil is being imported into our country in great quantities and nationwide conditions are such that not as much crude oil is being consumed as was the case one year ago. These two factors (imports of crude oil and decreased consumption) will bring about a decrease in the state's revenues and are partly responsible for the necessity of raising new taxes. One proposed method of securing the needed revenue, is to increase the tax on cigarettes a penny a package. Texas now collects three cents per package. All of our neighboring states now have at least a four cent tax on cigarettes and some have eight.
