



Clark Gresham has accepted chairmanship of the Red Cross drive in Burkburnett, which will be launched March 1st.

Every year Red Cross helps more and more people throughout the United States. In 1949, in North Dakota alone, 12 disasters called for Red Cross rebuilding or repair of some 232 homes. IN TEXAS, in the same period, 1,395 disaster-damaged or wrecked dwellings were replaced after 89 fires, tornadoes, explosions, or other catastrophes. Thousands of dollars more were spent for emergency care, medical bills, re-training in new obs of those whose injuries prevented them from resuming their former crafts and trades. Biggest item in the work, however, is rebuilding and repair which accounts for better than one-fourth of every dollar budgeted for disaster relief.

The work has increased enormously in cost since the Red Cross began picking up the pieces after the great Michigan forest fires of 1881. In those days, day laborers worked for about 50 cents a day. Milk sold in cities for five cents per quart. Early in this century Red Cross records show the average cost of repairing a flood-damaged home at \$600 per house. For the past decade or so, the same repairs hover between \$1,600 and \$1,800 per home

"It is part of my responsibility as Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces to see to it that our country is able to defend itself against any possible aggressor. Accordingly, I have directed the Atomic Commission to continue its work on all forms of atomic weapons, including the so-called hydrogen or super-bomb.
