



CombineKinds Of Lighting, **Engineer Says**

Too little fluorescent lighting often is worse than none at all, says O. D. Westerberg of the electrical engineering department of Northwestern University. Writing in American Builder magazine, he explains that usually no kitchen or laundry is too small for two 40-watt fluorescent tubes in shielded fixtures.

Westerberg says, "In new homes or in existing residences where kitchens are being modernized, efficient lighting should be given as much consideration

He says that when two 40-watt for the kitchen sink and counter areas, necessary illumination for the engineer adds.

"Warmth in the home is suggested by combining incandescent recessed sources with long, slen-der, fluorescent tubes," Wester-berg writes. "Combining these

A built-in cabinet for bathroom scales is a convenience, especially for a small bathroom where floor space is limited. In presenting



this idea, American Builder mag-azine points out that although the scales can be pushed completely out of the way they are always available for immediate use.

The cabinet is located between wall studs. The door is hinged at the bottom with continuous piano hinge. A bar handle (concealed in the drawing) extends across the full width of the door at its top. Old Dwellings **Usually Need** Plan Changes

A fully satisfactory job of re-modeling an old house often en-tails major floor plan changes because old dwellings ordinarily have small living rooms, inade-quate closet and storage space, and poor kitchen arrangements.

Partitions between rooms should be inspected to determine which ones could be removed without difficulty and which ones are bearing walls helping support the weight of the house. A first story wall usually is a bearing wall if it is directly underneath a wall on the second floor. on the second floor.

Removal of a bearing wall is more expensive than taking out a simple partition. A steel beam to support the weight usually must be installed. If an opening such as a large doorway or an archway is cut in a bearing wall, the load can be held up by a beam resting on posts at the sides of

Frequently, the most inexpensive way to emhance the appearance of the exterior of a house is to use color. A home can be painted in such a way that the best features are emphasized while attention is detracted from

less pleasing parts.

If the roof line is ungraceful, the trim along the edge of the roof should be painted an inconspicuous color, and dark asphalt shingles should be selected for reroofing. To draw attention to an attractive roof line, pick brighter asphalt shingles. By drawing the eye upward, a lightcolored roof also will make a house seem taller.

If the proportions of a house are pleasing, its outline can be accentuated by painting the trim in strong contrast to the sidewalls.






Chambers Death Was Not Suicide

Who killed Charles Harrison Chambers?

That was the question confronting Wise County officials Tuesday night following a court of inquiry conducted at Alvord by Justice of the Peace S. D.

Morris ruled officially that Chambers' death was murder and not suicide. The verdict was that Chambers, 61 year old Alvord farmer, "met death at the hands of a person or persons unknown.'


Chambers was found unconscious and critically wounded at his farm in the Pella community, six miles north of Alvord, the night of Feb. 28. He died a short time later in a Bowie hospital without regaining consciousness.

Tuesday's investigation de termined that Chambers could not have killed himself.

"Either one of the two bullets fired into his neck would have rendered him incapable of working the magazine to reload the gun and fire the second shot," Morris said after the nearing

One of the bullets passed through Chambers' neck and out of his body. The second odged in his brain. Dr. W. T. Inabnett, county health officer, testified also that Chambers' jaw was broken in two places, either by a fall or by a blow from a heavy instrument.

Mr. Chambers was a former employee for the Magnolia Petroleum Company and made his home at Thrift from 1925 to 1929. He was the father of Mrs. Gordie Ferrell of Burkburnett, and Horace Chambers of Kermit. A brother, Bill Chambers, resides in Burkburnett, on the

Photofloods can open a whole new realm of indoor picture subjects for you.

Indoor Pictures by Photoflood

NDOOR picture taking these days | Usually you will find that the best seems to be getting almost as position is slightly above camera ng outdoors. As you know, indoor lent pictures can be taken this way ictures can be taken in a number f different ways-by photoflash, by iffused daylight, by ordinary room ghts, and, last but not least, by hotoflood lamps. These photoflood lamps are really

handy items to have around. They're pretty much like ordinary household lamps, except that they burn many times brighter. And with this brilliant light you can take all kinds of pictures around the house-pictures of the family, party pictures, room interiors, table tops, and innumerable others.

Picture taking with photofloods is amazingly easy. Some types have reflectors built right into the bulb. Screw them into a floor or bridge lamp, point them at the subject, and you're all set. Or better yet, get one of the inexpensive, clamp-lights at any electrical shop or department store. These can be fastened to a convenient chair and can direct your photoflood light in any desired

When you start out to make a picture of someone, experiment first with just one light. Move it around until you find the spot where it is joyable snapshoeting for a long time. the most pleasing on the subject.

pular as summertime snapshoot- level and off a bit to one side. Excel--with just one bulb. Add a second light if you wish,

but keep that first light as your modeling light. By this I mean keep the second light a bit farther from the subject and on the opposite side of the camera. In this way, the first light functions as the key and the second as a fill-in light to soften the shadows. Additional lights can be added as you see fit; but, as I said, the lighting doesn't have to be elaborate to get a good picture. The exposure depends mainly on

lamp-to-subject distance, of course; and with the proper setup, actual snapshot exposures can be madeeven with simple box cameras. It's best to have an exposure table, or one of those handy pocket exposure guides for use in setting the camera

Seldom will you need more than three of these bulbs; and, since a 15-ampere fused household circuit can take up to six of the No. 1 bulbs or three of the No. 2's, there's little chance of blowing fuses. Three bulbs should be sufficient to give you en-
