## Clark Gresham Leads the Ticket For Commissioners



Clark Gresham, one of the three candidates elected in Tuesday's voting for City Commissioners, lead the ticket by receiving a total of 165 votes. The balloting was relatively light, compared to total number of voters eligible to cast a ballot, but a little above the total number of votes cast in City Commissioner elections in the past. Only 273 ballots were cast in Tuesday's election.

Gresham is a new man coming on to the Commission. Gene Robertson, another new man to the board was also elected in the Tuesday voting.

Harry Dodson was the only incumbent returned to the Commission.

H. D. Smith and Harold Van Loh, incumbents, were nosed out by Gresham and Robertson.

## COUNTING NOSES

There will be many who do not like the personal questions asked in the census taking. The census is of vital importance, many of our basic rights as citizens, laws that we preserve, are based on the census. Community rights, in many cases are measured by the number of people in a community. Representation in Congress and the Senate is based on the census. We should want to be counted, should see to it that no one is overlooked. If but one-half the population in an area of 200 thousand, are counted, that area gets but one-half the representation to which it is entitled. This holds true in the allotting of state taxes collected. The census figures in dollars and cents for returns, too. Growth means additional court judges, representation in the State Legislature, more money from state revenue.

There are questions concerning income that might have been left out. Such questions cause criticism and suspicion and do damage to the purpose of census taking. But, because the census question is included, it should not destroy the process. We should co-operate with the census taker, make a job as pleasant as possible and NOT blame him for ASKING. He didn't compile the list, you know.

It is difficult to criticize our Government. But, politics never were as bad as today. We don't need more Democrats or more Republicans.

## HURTING THEMSELVES

What effect the striking coal miners have had on the marketing of the product, is apparent to people in the building trades. There is a strong tendency of new home owners to look to other heating facilities besides coal, as well as householders and industries to reconvert to other fuel using equipment. When there is a practical choice, the coal industry suffers. Coal shortages due to strikes, even leading to national emergencies, doesn't help to develop and expand the coal market. Such conditions makes the user wary. Reducing rather than expanding, the miners are putting themselves out of more work and more money. This goes for mine operators as well. Certainly the user isn't to blame for figuring cost, service and practicality.

## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Hunger causes wars, strikes families, cities, counties, and results in death to men and causes. Arrivals from North China tell of great suffering where farm families around Peiping, are eating tree bark and grass, for food. Travelers relate of an increasing mass starvation in eleven of the most densely populated provinces in China. The estimate of over-all deaths from starvation in China, this spring, is ten million. Last summer the Yangtze valley had its worst flood in 18 years and damaged crops have resulted in present suffering. In some areas, farmers are eating the seed rice that should be planted for next summer's crops. Chinese Communists are indirectly admitting the disaster, attempting to fight it. Communism may "lose face" in provinces where hungry, starving people care more for food than for isms.

## Don't Fly Kites Near Electric Wires

An appeal to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires was issued today by Jim Ady, Texas Electric Service Company manager. He warned that few youngsters realize the dangers that the innocent pastime of kite flying can cause.

"Over the nation, many accidents occur each year because children get their kites tangled in power lines," Mr. Ady said. "The chief hazard is the use of kites with wire or other metal frame, or with using wire to fly the kite instead of cotton string. Such kites or wire string act as conductors of electricity when contact is made with a power line. Even plain cotton string can be dangerous if it is wet, as it also will carry an electric current. The best idea, regardless of how the kite is built or what kind of string is used, is to fly it in open spaces where there are no wires."

"If a kite gets tangled in wires, don't try to get it down by climbing a pole or using a long stick. Call the electric company and a lineman will come out and rescue the kite if it can be saved. Our linemen are glad to cooperate with the kite flyers."

Soft Water System Cuts Home Expense

Equipment for softening hard water cuts household operating expenses and provides longer life for pipes and drains, says American Builder magazine. "It is estimated that the cost of hard water averages from \$75 to \$125 a year, depending on the hardness of the water and the size of the family," the magazine says. The New York State Department of Health is quoted as saying, "The life of clothes washed in hard water is shortened 20 to 40 percent." "Probably the most widely used water-softening systems are those which employ the zeolite process," American Builder says. "Zeolite, a white, durable chemical, is contained in a water-softener tank which may be installed in the home water system. "Zeolite has an affinity for calcium and magnesium, the minerals which make water hard. The minerals are absorbed by the zeolite as the water passes through the tank."

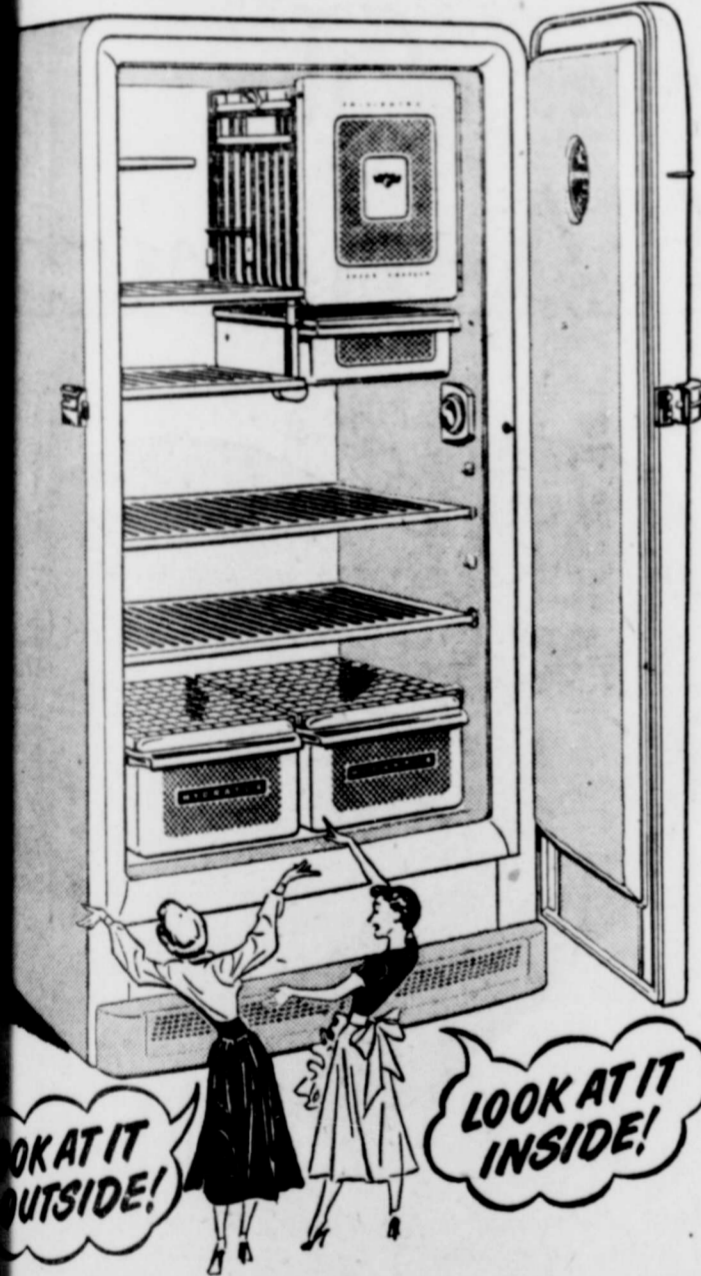

**36,000 Telephone People Will Get Raises This Year**



Under existing contracts, which the company has offered to continue, 36,000, or three out of every four telephone people, will get raises this year. Averaged over all employees, these raises will amount to \$2 a week per employee.

Unlike most industries where an employee must wait for a vacancy to get a higher-paid job, telephone people receive regular, scheduled raises from the day they start until they reach the top rate for their jobs.

Basic wage rate increases have more than kept pace with increased costs of living. Since January, 1941, telephone wages have gone up 94 per cent... while the cost of living has increased only 66 per cent in the same period.

The company's Benefit and Pension Plan, long recognized as one of the best, was improved in November to provide pensions of at least \$100 a month, including social security, at age 65 after 20 years' service. Actually, many employees will get substantially more.

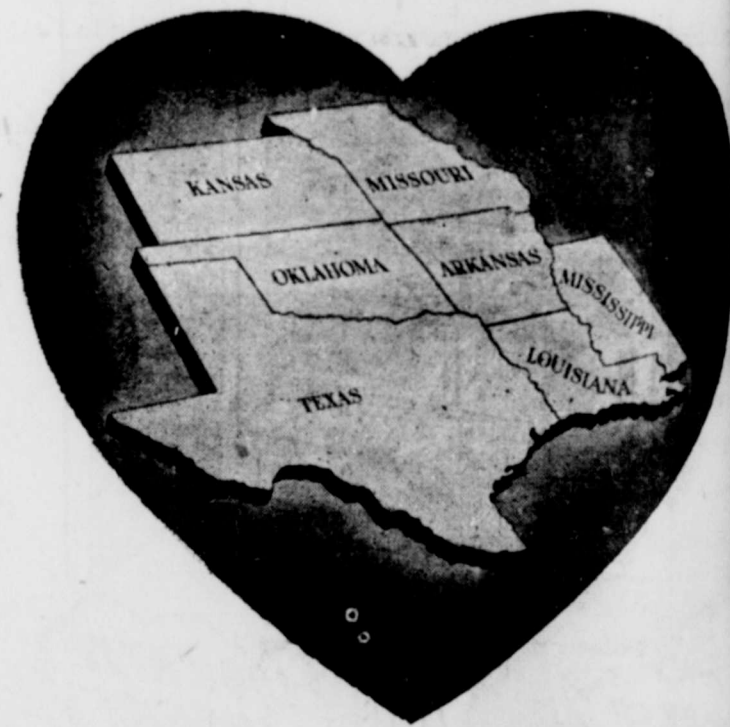

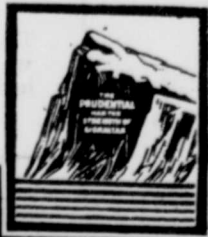
