Washington News Letter

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

We got our Tidelands bill out

of the Judiciary Committee this week by a vote of 16 to 10. Texans may grow tired of hearing many millions of dollars of revenue for the State of Texas but more importantly involves a principle of government. If the Federal Government can take our so-called Tidelands w thout compensation, then the Federal Government can take anything that belongs to a State or an individual without compensamust decide the Tidelands controversy. There is only one way in which to decide the issue and that is in behalf of the States. I am confident that sooner or later Congress will pass a law that will reaffirm State ownership of everything within the original boundaries of the States. It has been my responsibility to put together the bill which the Judiciary Committee has now reported and I am further charged with the Committee Report. When a Committee reports a bill to the ment of its terms and objectives and the reasons for the Committee action. My report on this 100 pages, outlining the contro-

act favorably upon the bill. The repercussions to the Presdent's veto of the gas bilt, generally referred to as the Kerr bill, is still reverbrating around the Capitol corridors. 

CHICK CHATS

By Clark Gresham

Now that your birds are getting outside frequently, fol-lowing several months of heavy egg production, it's a good idea to take care of some "springtime" chores.

At this time of year, you are no doubt pretty busy getting your new batch of baby chicks off-to a good start. And this is certainly time well spent. But, Mondays at 8:00 at as a precautionary measure, do the Masonic Hall. not become so concerned with those chicks that you neglect the layers. They need your attention too.

In the first place, you should take a look at the poultry house. After a season of confinement, you can see for yourself that the laying house needs a thorough cleaning and a good airing out. And the sooner this is done, the better. A stuffy, undesirable, even when birds are out most of the day.

Clean Flock Quarters So start by cleaning the poultry premises, and give special attention to the flock quarters. Scrape the floors and walls, clean roosts and the droppings' boards, and give the house a complete sweepdown. Do a thorough job and follow up by using a reliable disinfectant.

are some additional pointers helpful to poultry raisers this time of year:

If the birds are being allowed out of the house now, it may be a good plan to keep them shut in during a good part of the morning so that they will do most of their laying before they venture out-of-doors. This will help keep eggs cleaner.

Gather Eggs Often Continue to gather eggs frequently. If eggs are gathered three times daily, they will be cleaner. In addition, the sooner they are placed in a cool storage place, the better will be their condition for marketing.

Always strive to cull the nonlayers. After the period of heavy laying, some of the birds will have used up much of their laying reserve. Remove these birds from the flock to make more room for the high-producing birds.

If an all-pullet flock is kept, the poultry raiser should plan to sell the adult layers in time to give the laying house a 2 or 3 month airing before housing the new pullets next fall.


