MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day may be observed by some with poor spirit, afraid to face today's issues squarely, fearing that international dispute is a step closer to open warfare, that even a casual glance, not a complete, careful study, is needed to provide fresh proof of disorder and hot-heads, that simple, human problems are in the minority, that all has been for nought with our present safety endangered. In memory we relive the past wars, the armistices, reparations, death rolls. There are hearts that still ache over lost ones who served for a cause that today looks like a lost cause. What a waste, you say.

In keeping with the recent conflict, plans are announced by the Defense Department for the selection of an unidentified service man of World War II on May 26, 1951, who subsequently will be buried in Arlington National Cemetery, a companion in death with the Unknown Soldier of World War I. Six unidentified bodies from five overseas theatres and the Alaskan Service Command, will be brought to the U. S. All branches of the Armed Services will be represented. The idea of interring an unknown soldier originated at the end of the First World War. England had its "Unknown Warrior", France its "soldat inconnu", buried beneath the Arc de Triomphe. The tomb is guarded by a perpetual flame which was not even extinguished during the German occupation. Other European capitals have these reminders of a war that was to end all wars. We too must not extinguish the flames that guard these unknown dead, in every land. We do not want to place a third unknown soldier, though in honored glory, beside the other two, in Arlington. This is our Memorial Day prayer.

One man's opinion is that the cheers for the Fourth of July will almost be downed by those for yellow margarine as it is liberated from Federal taxation on July 1. Then, for the first time in 64 years American homemakers will have the opportunity to buy tax-free yellow margarine—a product which doctors and nutritionists have long since declared to be on a health-giving par with butter.

Although Federal taxation will end on July 1 and yellow margarine will be available in 32 states, 16 states continue to prohibit its sale by means of individually imposed taxes. Surely consumers in those 16 states will not hesitate to go to bat for the removal of those bans. It is not human nature to sit back and relax while your neighbor enjoys privileges you yourself do not have, and that is just the situation in those 16 states.

YOU SHOULD WORRY!

We have a debt that is almost \$2,000 for every man, woman and child in the country. Our debt is almost double the COMBINED national debts of England, France, Italy and all nations to whom we give aid. We have loaned \$260 billion to countries who have a less per capita debt that we have here. They owe less than we but borrow from us to produce goods at lower cost than we can, then sell those goods to us. They provide, with the profits, a lower living standard than ours. We loan Canada \$300 million and then Canada refused to buy anything from us that she could buy in England. It isn't that we won't lend, but we often wonder where it all ends. And, could we borrow money from any of these countries, it another wonder.

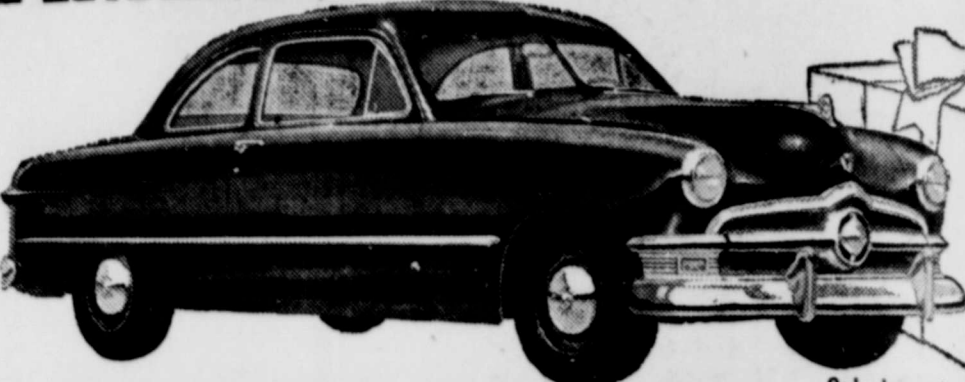

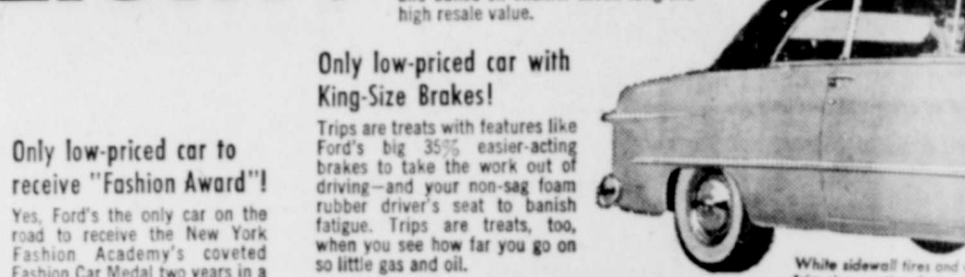

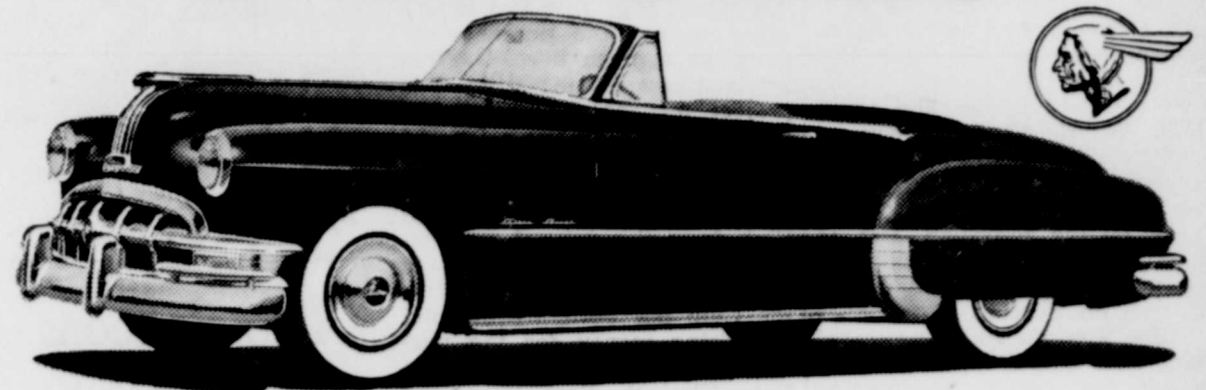

Separate Pullets And Cockerels

As soon as the sex can be distinguished, the cockerels should be separated from the pullets. This is particularly true of Leghorns and other fast-growing breeds, because they develop sexually early and begin annoying the pullets.

Remove the male birds and place them in a separate enclosure, finishing them off as broilers. Retain only those cockerels needed for breeding purposes.

Removal of the males gives pullets additional room and eliminates crowding at the feed troughs. The birds will do better as a result, and the poultryman will realize a saving in feed costs.

Keep Good Breeders

Cockerels for breeding purposes should be selected when they are broiler size. Look for birds with the best body growth, good vigor, rapid feathering, moderate comb development, and well pigmented shanks. Retain cockerels that are free of standard disqualifications and have no body deformities. Eliminate the runts and slow-feathering birds.

About three times as many cockerels should be selected as are needed for breeding purposes, as it is usually necessary to discard many birds because of defects before they are fully grown. The end ratio for medium and heavy breeds should be only one male for every 15 females. For Leghorns and other light breeds the ratio should be about one rooster to every 20 hens.

Care of Males

The breeding cockerels should have a grass range by themselves the same as the pullets, with all the necessary equipment and shelters. If only a few cockerels are kept as breeders, they may be allowed to run with the pullets.

When your pullet flock begins laying, do not house males and females together until the production of hatching eggs is started. It is best to produce market eggs which are infertile.

Before placing males with females in the same house, inspect the cockerels carefully again, making sure you keep only the best male birds. Get rid of any birds which show poor vitality and lack of development.

FARM FACTS

Grow Those Hogs For Greatest Profits

By J. M. Wear, Jr.

It is not the price of hogs nor the price of feed that is the great concern of hog producers—it's how much money that is left after the hogs are sold and the costs of production have been paid. Other than the number of pigs per sow, probably the greatest factor influencing hog profits is how good a start pigs get.

Market day comes sooner for pigs that get off to a fast start. Pigs in good health make efficient use of their feed and if provided a balanced ration rich in proteins, minerals and vitamins, they are on the right road to market and should return the farmer a satisfactory profit.

Spring pigs, as do fall pigs, need dry comfortable sleeping quarters, free from draft, filth and dust. Move the sows and litters to clean pasture as soon as the weather will permit after the pigs are two weeks old. The importance of good pasture cannot be overemphasized as a factor in a profitable hog program. In addition to saving feed, pasture induces pigs to remain in the sunshine to be supplied with Vitamin D and permits the use of parasite-free, sanitary ground.

Not more than three or four sows and litters should be placed in one lot. It is desirable that all pigs in one group be about the same age, and there should be ample shelter to avoid crowding.

Self-feeders with grain and a balanced supplement in separate compartments should be placed close to shade and fresh clean water. This type of feeding reduces labor costs, gives more rapid growth and development and permits early fall marketing, which is an important factor in producing a good profit with the spring pig crop.
