



Was It Just a Lucky Shot?

It is true that once-in-a-lifetime shots are sometimes the result of the photographer's happening to be in just the right place at just the right time when just the right things happen. However, all that that gives him is outstanding or unusual subject material. And it takes a lot more than that to produce a truly

The photographer who makes the "lucky" shot has to have, first of all, the ability to recognize the picture has to know how to make a good isn't recognized, there won't be a "lucky" shot. Equally obvious is the fact that underexposure, overexposure, poor focusing, and camera shake are certain to keep a picture from being thought of as a good.
