Talking Through Their Hat

Thousands of fishermen have entered fishing contests, pointed with pride to their catch, described their battle with the "big one", the victory through skill. Fishermen, experienced in the sport, know that to snag a fish at the right minute, needs more than luck to pull it in. A knot in the line, a backlash, wrong timing, too much slack, not enough line, dozens of things can happen and you lose the fish, the bait, your pole, break the line. Ask any fisherman if he hasn't himself to blame for losing some big fish. You insult him if you say all there is to fishing is luck, that it is a lottery, that skill means nothing. He is incensed over the Post Office Department ruling that anyone entering a fishing contest is engaging in a lottery, that hauling in a "prize" is luck. It is against postal regulations for a newspaper or other publication, to publicize fishing contests, give the names of winners or in any way encourage the contest. To do any of these the paper risks loss of its mailing privilege.

From our experience, if there is one sport that requires skill, it is out-smarting a big bass. Why even perch have made us look silly. We've met up with fish that were probably on the honor roll in school. Most sportsmen think the Post Office Department could do better with taxpayers' money than taking time and funds to make such a ruling about fishing, perhaps devote more thought to a solution of deficits and increased postal rates and reduced postal service.

Washington News Letter

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

Washington, D. C., June 1st—Each day before the Legislative Calendar is called in the House of Representatives, Members are recognized to make one minute speeches. A dozen or more Congressmen made such speeches on yesterday. As one of the speakers, I made the following remarks:

"Mr. Speaker, several of our distinguished colleagues have just spoken of the meeting on yesterday in the Library of Congress at which the Secretary of State reported to us on foreign affairs. The objective of this meeting is highly commendable. Its purpose, as we all know, was to establish a closer relationship, a better understanding between Congress and the Department of State. However, the Secretary of State told us nothing new. All of us had learned through the press days before of all of the matters to which the Secretary made reference. All of us must have felt a sense of real utility insofar as the Congress having any actual voice in the making of foreign policy."

Some weeks ago I listened to the Secretary of State in a distinguished speech to the editors of the Nation. At that time he defined "total diplomacy". His often-used expression "total diplomacy" means, according to the Secretary of State, a comingling of both foreign and domestic affairs, our Nation's complete effort to win and preserve the peace. The Secretary well points out that domestic affairs and foreign affairs are so interwoven and interrelated as to be almost indistinguishable. On this point I think we can all agree.

However, since the foundation of this Government foreign policy has been left almost entirely to the President and the Secretary of State. Under the Constitution and practice foreign policy has been an executive function. Today we admit that foreign policy is just as important as domestic policy and that the line of demarcation between the two is practically nonexistent. Still we elect 531 Members of Congress who struggle the year around with domestic problems. At the same time we permit a Secretary of State the almost exclusive prerogative of making foreign policy.

In 1946 we created by law a Council of Economic Advisers and charged such Council with the duties of advising the President and the Congress on economic developments, trends, and problems. In 1947 pursuant to Public Law 253 we established the National Security Council and charged it with the duties of planning our country's mil-

itary security. By the same act we set up the National Security Resources Board and charged it with the duties of planning for industrial strength and mobilization.

Mr. Speaker, the base on which foreign policy is determined ought to be broadened. We should have in this country a Foreign Policy Commission. This commission should be headed by the Secretary of State and ought to include the chairman and ranking minority member of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House, and of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate, and of the Armed Services Committees of both House and Senate. It should also include not less than three civilians distinguished for their learning in matters of foreign policy. Also included should be the Secretary of Defense and other military experts. This commission could meet in secret, if need be. With such commission all matters of foreign policy should be frankly and fully discussed. The commission should at least be consulted by a Secretary of State before he commits this country to courses of action which might lead into war.

Mr. Speaker, we should not leave the matter of foreign policy to any single individual. We boast of our democracy and yet we, in effect, leave to one man the international relations of this Nation.

While I do not have the honor to serve on the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House, I strongly recommend to them that something immediately be done to broaden the base upon which foreign policy is determined, and to give the American people a greater voice in the all important field of international relations."

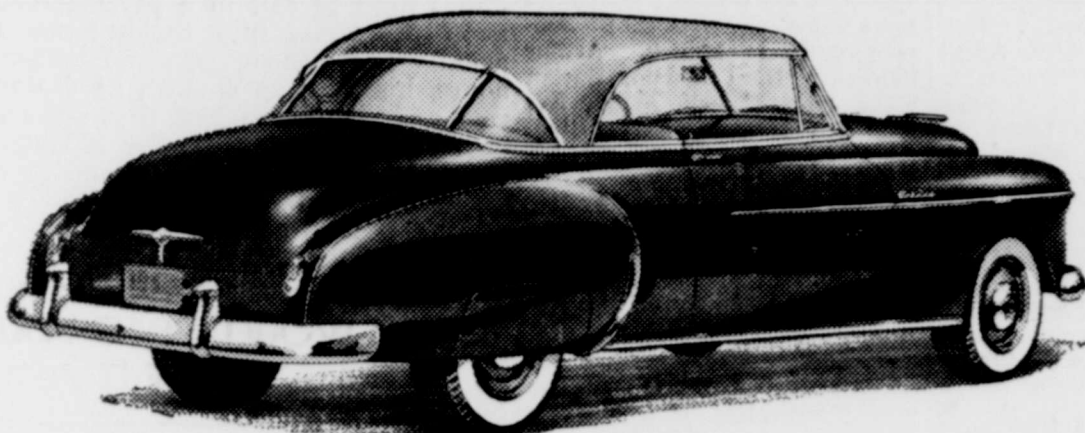

THE FAMILY DOCTOR

After hearing of the shortage of family doctors and the increasing number of medical specialists we were sort of worried about the old-time family type physician disappearing from the native scene. The new edition of the American Medical Association's directory reassures us this is not true. Over 72 thousand physicians today are in general practice, almost 23 thousand in general practice with some attention to a specialty. The family doctor used to be part of the family circle. You didn't have to call in a psychiatrist, to probe into childhood problems, into background. The family doctor usually knew the quirks and tendencies. He came at all hours, his fee was modest, he dealt with individuals and was understanding. Not that specialists aren't all of these things, but too often humans are turned off the assembly line as machines, and personalities aren't people but just statistics. As a fellow said the other day, "I'll take mine country style."

Why Is The Government Mismanged?

Former President Theodore Roosevelt wanted to reorganize the Executive Branch of the Government and switch 300,000 employees to places where they could do more work. Today the Government has almost 2,000,000 employees.

That's why former President Herbert Hoover was invited to study the problem of reorganizing the Government. In his reports submitted in 1949, the Hoover Commission recommended sweeping changes in Government structure, and outlined ways for the Government to save \$4 billion a year.

Congress and the President are fiddling with the Hoover reorganization plan. Congress approved several reorganization recommendations. About 20 per cent more of the reorganization suggestions have been submitted to Congress. Sorry to relate, that some of these plans did not appeal to the Senators and Representatives because they did not think they could make any votes for themselves in the next election.

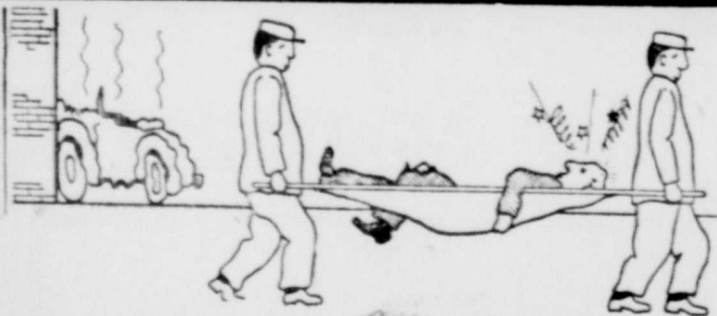

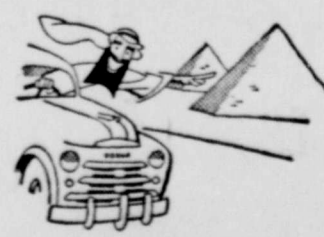

Single Law For Military Justice

A single law for the administration of military justice for the nation's Armed Forces, the first in American history, will become effective May 31, 1951, according to announcement today by Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of the Texas Military District.

The Uniform Code of Military Justice, signed by President Truman May 6, will apply to the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard. All members of Reserve components when on active duty will be subject to provisions of the code.

When effective, the new law will replace the articles of war, under which the Army and Air Force court martial systems

operate, the articles of government of the Navy, which apply to both Navy and the Marine Corps, and the disciplinary laws of the Coast Guard.

It might have been sheer luck that led the photographer to glance Sonny's way just as he registered an "oops, what have I done?" expression—but good picture-taking know-how enabled him to make the shot.

Was It Just a Lucky Shot?

ALL too frequently we hear a really good picture described as "just a lucky shot." But sometimes I wonder if there is such a thing. I believe that good picture taking is 99.9 per cent a matter of following through on know-how. It is true that once-in-a-lifetime shots are sometimes the result of the photographer's happening to be in just the right place at just the right time when just the right things happen. However, all that gives him is outstanding or unusual subject material. And it takes a lot more than that to produce a truly good picture. The photographer who makes the "lucky" shot has to have, first of all, the ability to recognize the picture situation when he sees it. Then, he has to know how to make a good picture. Obviously, if the picture isn't recognized, there won't be a "lucky" shot. Equally obvious is the fact that underexposure, overexposure, poor focusing, and camera shake are certain to keep a picture from being thought of as a good, "lucky" shot. Luck hasn't a thing to do with

these vital factors. Well, maybe once you might accidentally hit on the right exposure, speed, etc., but you certainly can't depend on it. The maker of the "lucky" shot figures them on the basis of a know-how that through repeated use becomes a habit. Even being on the spot when the "lucky" shot happens is as likely as not to be a matter of planning. Many of them are a result of the photographer's waiting, poised to shoot, until just the right second before tripping the shutter. So if you would make a "lucky" shot, don't resort to carrying a rabbit's foot, four-leaf clover, or horseshoe everytime you take the camera out. Concentrate on carrying with you a confident knowledge of what your camera will do, the basic exposures, a sense of distance, recognition of the fact that the camera sees only what you can see through the view finder, and a steady hand for holding the camera. Thus aided and abetted, your luck may be pretty good. —John van Gulder

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

A group of fourteen farmers cooperating with the Altus Oklahoma Soil Conservation Work Unit, and Soil Conservation personnel, toured the Wichita Irrigated Valley recently. The tour was conducted by James W. Park, Work Unit Conservationist at Iowa Park, L. E. Brooks, director of the Valley Experiment Station, and Fred Parkey, manager of the Wichita County Water Improvement Districts Nos. 1 and 2. Most interest appeared to be shown on the possibilities of

permanent grass pastures under irrigated conditions. Permanent pastures were visited on the Rufus King, the Shem Cunningham, and the L. J. Lane farms. Also a visit of the Texas Experiment Station, one mile Southeast of Iowa Park, where grass plots were checked and a plot of Madrid clover checked. Most of the grass mixtures seeded to permanent pasture consisted of perennial rye, alta fescue, orchard, and alfalfa. The pastures are making excellent growth and appear to have good possibilities for permanent pasture in the irrigated valley. Land leveling activities in the Wilbarger - Wichita Soil Conservation District have been going full swing. Several co-operators have completed supply ditches and are planning to level their land at a later date. There is approximately 400 acres in the process of being leveled at present. G. C. Jones, a district co-operator, 2 miles South of Iowa Park, has completed leveling 35 acres; Jimmie Parker, 4 mi. Southeast of Iowa Park has completed leveling 12 acres; J. J. Jones, East of Wichita Falls on Eastland Lane has leveled 4 acres; and C. R. Morgan on Eastland Lane, has leveled 4 acres. Cooperators who have land in the process of being leveled are W. T. Jones on Pecan Road East of Wichita Falls, 25 acres; Malabar Farm, 125 acres; Munger Farm Company, Kamay, 80 acres; Ed F. Riley, Old Petrolia Road, 40 acres; Fred Wise, 4 miles Southeast of Iowa Park, 40 acres; V. G. Barnhart, four miles Southeast of Iowa Park, 10 acres; Elbert Lemons, Wichita Valley Farms, 15 acres; and Solon R. Featherstone, Valley View, 18 acres. Fred Wise, who operates the Dr. L. A. Crawford farm, V. G. Barnhart, and John H. Entrekkin, in the Wichita Valley Farms, have just completed a 4,750-foot community supply ditch. Gale Lowrance, 2 miles East of Iowa Park, has just completed a half mile of Terrace. Throughout the District the Winter and Spring covers have shown considerable growth since the rain. Several plantings of Madrid clover have come up to a good stand following the rains.

SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

If your steel fishing rod needs a new paint job, there are several preliminary steps you can take whether you intend to paint by brush or by spray. First, sand down the old finish with emery paper of the type used by auto painters. Keep it wet at all times. Use medium emery paper at first, then fine. Keep working until the finish is perfectly smooth. If the finish is badly damaged you should sand down to bare metal.

Then wash the rod carefully and dry it. From now on avoid touching the rod with the fingers for the slight amount of natural oil in the hands may keep the new finish from adhering on it properly. If the rod does get oil on it, wash it off well with high-test gasoline before painting it.

Now look to the guides and tip top. If the guide windings are of silk and in bad condition, it is best to remove the guides, first measuring from the butt to each one so they can be wound back in the same position. Silk guides in good condition should be masked and varnished after the painting. On many steel rods the guides are wound on with a fine, soft wire soldered into place. If one of these needs replacing, it is best to return the rod to the factory.

If the rod is not valuable enough to warrant this, you can try it yourself. Remember not to get the soldering iron or the rod any hotter than is necessary to make the solder run. Under no circumstances try to run solder on a rod with a blow torch.

Removing an old tip top and soldering on a new one is not too risky since the rod is not likely to break at the extreme tip. But use no more heat than is absolutely necessary. And be sure that the hollow end of the rod is completely sealed with solder; otherwise, moisture is certain to get in and cause rust.

Incidentally, don't try to have a broken solid steel rod welded. It simply cannot be done satisfactorily, even by the rod maker.

No special instructions are necessary for the man who intends to use a brush for painting. When the rod is to be sprayed, mask the guides, ferrules and all other parts on which paint is not wanted. More than one coat of most auto finishes will be needed, with a rubbing down of each coat, including the last.

When the finish is hard, wax and polish it with a good floor or auto wax. Frequent waxings afterwards help preserve the finish. Some anglers like to varnish occasionally over the lacquer to prevent weathering; wash the rod well with gasoline or soap and water before doing that.

Caring For The Birds On Range

The health and laying potential of your growing birds are dependent to a considerable extent on how well you care for them during the growing period.

If your young flock is on the range, you will want to give the future pullets every possible chance to develop and grow as they should.

Provide Good Range

Give your range flock a clean plot of well drained soil with a balance between sunny and shady spots. It is best to use different ranges from year to year, if possible, so that the ground is not contaminated by flocks of the past.

Have enough shelter space. And make sure the shelters are well ventilated and sturdy enough to give protection against bad weather.

Birds Need Shade Too

Provide plenty of life's essentials for the birds—water, feed, sun and shade. If trees do not grow on your range, you may want to try sun-flowers.
