Opening of Preston Dairy Products Drew Over 1200

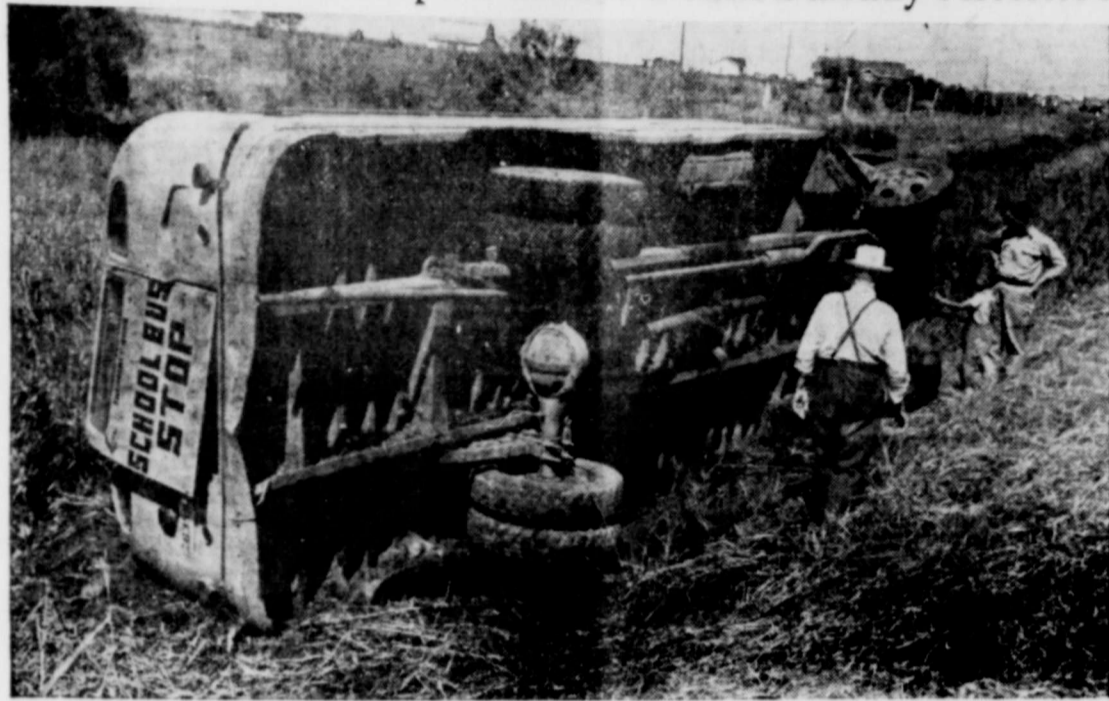

Nineteen Scouters Escape Possible Death Sunday Afternoon



Four boys and the driver miraculously escaped with only injuries Sunday afternoon when a converted school bus containing 19 members of an Electra Boy Scout troop overturned six miles west of here at the bridge just west of the J. M. (Doc) Goins ranch home.

The Scouts, all members of Electra Troop No. 40, were between the ages of 11 and 15. Three of the youths, two not seriously injured, were transferred to the Electra Hospital after emergency treatment at the Burkburnett Clinic by Dr. Philip A. Carpenter.

W. H. Lewis, the driver and Scoutmaster, who sustained a deep gash above the right eye, and bruised ribs. Gerry McDonald, 11, concussion and lacerations of the face and left arm and left knee. A report from Electra Tuesday stated that Gerry was still in a very serious condition.

Charles Golden, Jr., 12, left hip injury.

Jimmie Lee Youree, 11, left ankle sprained.

Charles Crow, Jr., 13, lacerations of left ear and left arm. After first aid treatment at the Burkburnett Clinic, the McDonald, Golden and Crow youths were transferred to Electra by Owens and Brumley ambulances.

The remainder of the injured were released after first aid treatment.

The accident occurred about 2:15 P. M., Sunday, approximately six miles west of here on the Burk-Vernon highway No. 240. The Scouts were en route to Perkins Scout Reservation, East of Burkburnett, for a week's camp.

The driver gave this description of the accident to investigating officers:

The left front tire blew out while the vehicle was making a slow S curve about 30 yards from a concrete bridge. Lewis related he tried to turn the steering wheel, but was unable

to do so. The bus missed the end of the bridge by inches, dived off a 12 foot embankment to clear 12 feet of water, turned on its left side and skidded to a stop in the bar ditch. Several of the boys were pulled from the vehicle by older Scouts who pried open the back emergency door, and administered first aid. The bus, although spilling gasoline, did not burn.

Officers commented on the fact that the bus escaped landing in the shallow water in the drainage ditch because of the difference in height of the banks. The bank from which the bus approached is about 10 feet high, the opposite bank only about three feet.

Five ambulances, three from Owens and Brumley and two from Pearson were dispatched to the scene of the accident.

A number of the uninjured boys continued on to camp. The others joined them at camp Monday after spending the night at home in Electra.

Alan B. (Chick) Haley, chief assistant district attorney who is seeking promotion to the post of district attorney of Wichita County, issued his formal announcement Tuesday. District Attorney Clyde Filmore is not seeking reelection.

Haley, 33, was born in Lamar County but has been a resident of Wichita Falls more than 30 years. He is a member of the Floral Heights Methodist church.

He graduated from Wichita Falls Senior High School in 1934, from junior college here in 1936 and from the University of Texas Law School in 1940. The young Wichitan worked his way thru both Wichita Falls Junior College and the University.

He volunteered for military service before the outbreak of World War Two and served more than four years in the U. S. Navy, two of which were spent overseas in the Pacific theatre. In awarding Haley the navy's (Continued on page 4)

Time To Spray Pecan Trees Now

If you are troubled with Rosett or Die Back on your Pecan trees, now is the time to spray them.

Information given us by John Randles, Agriculture instructor at the High School, is to spray them with a solution of Zinc Sulfate, 2 tablespoons to a gallon of water. This treatment should be repeated every two weeks until three sprayings are complete.

This however is for only temporary relief. For permanent relief, a trench should be dug around the base of the tree, and Zinc Sulphate poured in and covered over.

CHICK CHATS

Protect Flock From Worminess

To keep your chickens free of severe damage caused by intestinal worms, follow a systematic control program for the rest of the growing season and after fall housing. Such a program should include regular cleaning of the poultry house or shelters, runs and equipment, plus the use of medicines which will remove the worm species from the infected birds.

Remove Filth

The frequent removal of filth will prevent worm infection in your flock by reducing the number of worm eggs present. Give your flock the benefits of a clean, sanitary home.

For such familiar worm species as large round worms and cezal worms there are dependable commercial medicines that may be given to the flock with good results. Many poultrymen follow the practice of administering a worm remover every month, mixing it in the flock's feed. This is done during the range period and also after fall housing.

Uniform Growth

Poultry raisers who follow a good worm control program find that it helps prevent damage from intestinal worms, thereby promoting uniform growth of the birds and encouraging higher egg production. Although they rarely cause mortality, intestinal worms are actually extremely costly. They cause decreased egg production, lower birds' resistance to infectious disease, and create cull chickens which are not fit for market.

In effect, worms cause slow starvation. Great numbers of them in a fowl's intestinal tract make it impossible for the bird's body to assimilate food as it should. The effect is most noticeable in young birds whose growing bodies demand full use of the feed they consume.

The Women's Society of Christian Service met at the First Methodist Church in a business session, Monday morning, June 12th.

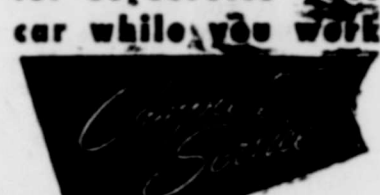

third highest decoration, the Legion of Merit, for outstanding service and performance of duty. Rear Admiral Alex Sharp cited the Wichitan's "initiative, perseverance and outstanding ability," during 18 Pacific campaigns. Further praise for his naval service came to Haley later from the chief of naval operations shortly before the Wichitan was honorably discharged in February, 1946.

Returning to Wichita Falls, Haley engaged in private law practice until appointed an assistant under District Attorney Elmer Parish in March, 1947. He has served as an assistant DA since that time.

When Clyde Fillmore took office as DA on Jan. 1, 1949, he appointed Haley his first assistant, a position he still holds.

Since then the office has seen a record number of cases filed and tried. During the three years Haley has been in office, there were more cases filed and tried than in any other period in the county's history. The county continually betters the prosecution record of many Texas counties which have larger populations.

Figures for 1949 have not yet been compiled and published, but in 1948, only four of the 254 Texas counties had more criminal cases tried before a jury than did Wichita. In those four counties are located the largest cities in the state—Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio.

More criminal cases were tried before juries in Wichita County than in many counties containing such larger cities as El Paso, Austin, Corpus Christi, Amarillo, Lubbock, Beaumont and Waco. McLennan County (Waco) had less than one-third as many cases tried as did Wichita.

Haley served as prosecutor in scores of the cases tried during his three years in office, including several murder trials which drew state-wide attention.

But while Haley has maintained vigorous prosecution of habitual criminals and defendants in cases of a more serious nature he has at the same time followed a policy of leniency and assistance to youthful first offenders.

This assistance is made possible by state laws providing for suspended sentences or probation for deserving persons. By this method many young men and women have become useful citizens rather than hardened criminals. Haley assures the public that by a continuation of this policy, he can give the same aid to future citizens of Wichita County.

During the time he has been in the district attorney's office he has had a great deal of experience in handling wayward husbands who deserted their wives or children. He has worked tirelessly toward reuniting those husbands and wives or in securing funds to support the neglected women and children, thus warding off much juvenile delinquency caused by broken homes. Wife and child desertion have greatly increased in recent years and have required an increasingly large share of the time and energy of the district attorney's staff.

It is a rare instance in many counties when a man actually is sentenced to the penitentiary for wife and child desertion, but 11

Wichita County citizens during the past 18 months were convicted of those crimes. Realizing the fundamental importance and value of proper home environment, Haley will continue a concerted effort to help deserted families.

In announcing his candidacy in the district attorney race for the 30th judicial district of Texas, Haley made this statement:

"It has been the policy of Clyde Fillmore to prosecute people for violation of the law regardless of their station in life. Prosecution has been done fairly and impartially in every detail. I have co-operated wholeheartedly with Mr. Fillmore in a manner in which he has conducted the affairs of the district attorney's office. I pledge you that if I am elected to the post I will do my deadlevel best to uphold and continue the high standard of prosecution which Mr. Fillmore has maintained; that the door to the district attorney's office shall always be open to persons desiring assistance, regardless of race, creed or color.

"The importance attached to the office of district attorney in this state cannot be over-emphasized. He is the man responsible for the prosecution of all felony crimes committed within his jurisdiction. Therefore it is imperative that a man be elected who is vigorous enough to maintain the office and who has the proven trial

court experience necessary to try cases against the top attorneys of the state.

"I feel that the more than three years of experience gained under Mr. Parish and Mr. Fillmore have been valuable and that they qualify me for this office. I began work in the office in 1947 as the lowest paid assistant and have worked up to the position of first assistant district attorney. I now ask the people to promote me to the post

of district attorney."

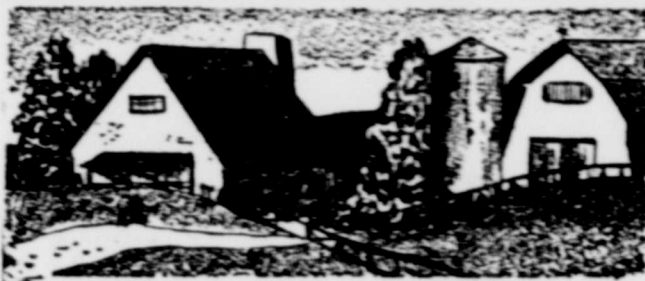

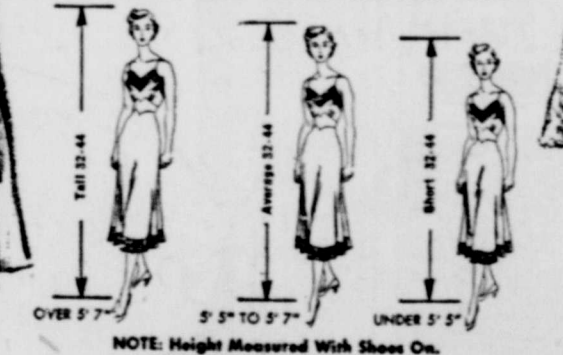

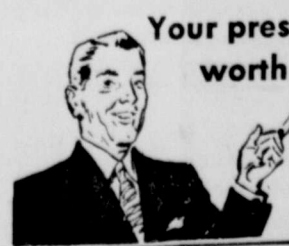

Shivers stated. "I will emphasize facts and record of accomplishment, instead of easy promises, and will address myself to all the people of Texas rather than to any special group."

The Governor said he considers economy to be the State's top problem. "And that means economy of money, of our soil and of our water resources," he added.

He expressed thanks to "the thousands of individual Texans who have already told me that they will support me in this election."

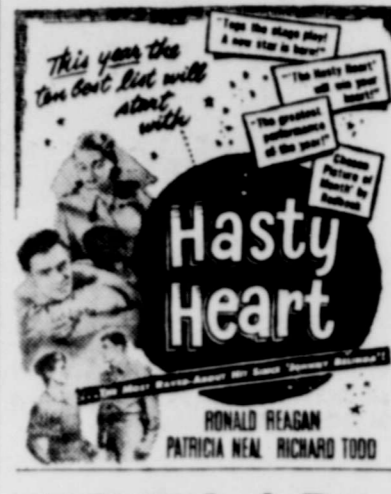

Shrine. I am a past president of the Blackstone Club. I invite your investigation of my character, reputation and willingness to work.

The office of District Attorney carries with it the responsibility of the life, liberty and property rights of all of the people of this County. The District Attorney himself is entrusted by the people with a vast amount of discretion in the prosecution of crime.

May I submit that my legal training, and experience, combined with mature judgment, amply qualify me for this office.

Obviously your prosecuting officers cannot enforce the law alone. They must have the help of the people as a whole, and each individual connected with the law enforcing agencies, of which there are many. From my prior experience, I know that I can co-operate with the law enforcement officers of this district. I believe that they could and would co-operate with me as your District Attorney in enforcing the law.

In the ordinary felony case, the complaint is first presented to the District Attorney's office, by him presented to the Grand Jury, and, if an indictment is returned, then the case must be presented to the Trial Court, usually with a jury trial. The defendant then has the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin. If a Federal Question is involved, an appeal then lies to the Supreme Court of the United States. If an error is made at any step during this procedure, the case will then be reversed, and must be tried again.

Since the District Attorney is familiar with the case long before the same is heard by the trial court, I consider it his duty to prepare a proposed jury. Then, when the testimony is closed, the Trial Court can hear defense exceptions, submit the defensive charges relied upon by the accused, and the case is ready for argument to the jury. When the entire responsibility of preparing the Court's charge is left with the Judge, the result is intolerable delay while the jury is locked up with nothing to do but wait. This procedure is not an original idea at all, but has been successfully used elsewhere, and if used in this County would eliminate a lot of wasted time and expense, without hindering justice in the least.

Criminal Laws are made for two purposes: first, to reform the guilty offender; second, to discourage the commission of crime. The suspended sentence law (except in murder cases) and the law which allows the probation of sentence in certain cases by the Court are each

good laws. This is particularly true with reference to the youthful first offender. I believe that in a proper case it is to the best interest of the people to help reform a youthful offender by giving him another chance under these laws. With the hardened, anti-social, habitual offender, there is only one alternative: give him a prompt, fair trial, and if guilty ask that he be placed in confinement where he can not harm society.

There are not only classes of criminals, but degrees of crime. I believe in putting first things first. The cases involving the most serious offenders should be placed at the head of the list on the trial docket and vigorously prosecuted. Crimes of violence are less likely to occur, if the prospective offender knows with certainty that he will be speedily prosecuted and punished. The best protection for your property is the conviction and punishment of the latest offenders in this class of offenses.

We, as citizens of this community, owe it to ourselves and our children, to make our County as decent and safe a place to live as possible. There are some ten thousand boys at Sheppard Air Base of the average age of about eighteen years. We owe these boys the duty of providing them a community where they can find recreation of the kind that they left at home. As your District Attorney I would do my best toward these objectives.

In addition to legal training and ability, combined with experience, the office of District Attorney requires the services of a man whose temperament is suited to this work. I can take this office with an open mind, without malice towards anyone; I am not indebted to any individual, lawyer, or law firm in making this race, who would ever ask a favor. I have no one to punish, nor do I have any favors to grant. In administering the duties of the office I would be guided only by the laws of the State of Texas, and the dictates of my own conscience.

Many individuals come to the District Attorney with their problems. Some of them are personal, but the vast majority are of a nature in which the people are interested. These persons are entitled to the advice from a mature, experienced counselor. These cases include questions involving Juvenile problems, wife and child desertion, protection of property and property rights, protection of the person against violence, prevention of crime, recommendations to the Board of Pardons and Paroles, and many others. I believe that my years as a practicing attorney well qualify me to advise and counsel in these matters, and, if proper, to take the necessary action to give valuable service to the people.

The door to my office will always be open to the people of this District, without regards to their financial condition, social position, prestige, race, color or creed. If entrusted with this office, I, in turn, will give the best that I have in the interest of the people of this District.
