A BIRTHDAY

On July 12, 1817, in Concord, Massachusetts, was born Henry David Thoreau, a nature writer who "saw beauty in ashes," who believed that "every man will be a poet if he can" and, if not a poet, then he will be a "man of science." Thoreau was a poet who has brought us closer to a purely natural way of thinking, of living. He found nothing new in nature as a naturalist, but he knew far more than many natural scientists of what to make of that which he saw about him. His works are read with satisfaction and pleasure, gentle and steady words, roughhewn and difficult at times. They may not be practical in today's problems, but he stings the complacent with such works as his "Conscience." We are lifted in walking with him by Walden pond.

TEN YEARS FROM NOW

If school population increases more than one-fourth in the next ten years, based on the national birthrate increase from 1933 to 1947, we really will have an educational problem. The National Association for Education advises giving teachers a starting salary of at least \$2,700 a year, up to \$5,000; a single salary basis for elementary, junior or senior high school; that we will have to spend \$10 billion in the next ten years on adequate school build-
