Many of you may not understand why this unit was bought by the TB Association, and what its great purpose is. Let us here explain:

You see, the Tuberculosis Association tries to educate people to have themselves X-rayed to FIND this dreadful disease, then after the survey is made their objective is to teach you how to CARE for yourself. You may say to yourself, "But, I'm healthy, nothing wrong with me." Some of the healthiest looking men and women in the world are walking around with the disease and don't know it, until they have had an X-ray. Trickiness, is one of TB's most vicious characteristics, and it is much better to KNOW how your health is than to wonder.

There are those who say, "I don't want to know if I have it." Well, maybe THEY don't want to know, but YOU and I do, because everyone who has not found out whether he or she is free of this disease is a potential carrier.

In these times of such unrest and stress on our bodies, it is very necessary that we take as good a care of our own selves as we can, so that we may be useful to ourselves and to our nation.

The mobile unit is gone now, but let us remember this coming Christmas when the TB drive for Christmas Seal sales comes forth that it is your duty and my duty to see that next year we have the same opportunity to check our health that we had this year . . . through the purchase of seals.

He found nothing new in nature as a naturalist, but he knew far more than many natural scientists of what to make of that which he saw about him. They may not be practical in today's problems, but he stings the complacent with such words as his "Conscience." We are lifted in walking with him by Walden pond.

A&P Will Resist Any Unwarranted Price Increases

NEW YORK, July 24.—The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, largest leading food distributor, moved against inflation today by pledging to "resist all unwarranted price rises with all our might."

The pledge was contained in one of the rare public statements issued by John A. Hartford, chairman of the 91-year-old food chain, who said that A&P "will co-operate unhesitatingly with our national government in the present crisis."

"We will make every effort to hold our inventories at the lowest point consistent with good service to our customers," he said, "because hoarding, whether by wholesalers, retailers or consumers, will cause higher prices."

"We will continue to maintain the lowest profit rate generally prevailing in the entire industry. Our net profit now is less than one cent on each dollar of sales." The current profit rate cited by Mr. Hartford was even lower than the profit of 1.15 per cent of consolidated net sales reported by the company for the fiscal year ended Feb. 28, 1950.

Mr. Hartford said a full statement of the company's policy in the current national emergency will appear over his signature in nationwide newspaper advertisements later this week.

In today's statement, Mr. Hartford pledged A&P to continue to strive for more efficient distribution and to fight any waste of food, time or money so as to narrow the spread between retail and wholesale prices.

"With our boys fighting in Korea," he said, "we believe that all citizens and all businesses, big and little, should devote themselves wholeheartedly to the public interest."

Mr. Hartford said he was mindful that the company's policy of low cost and low profit in the mass distribution of quality food currently was under attack in a suit brought by the anti-trust lawyers to destroy A&P. But, he emphasized, the "greater conflict in which our country is now engaged takes precedence over all else."

"We will strive always to do what is honest, fair, sincere and in the best interest of our country and our customers," he said. "And we promise that we will continue to do everything in our power to put more buying power in the consumer's food dollar, and more good food on the family dinner table."
