Who Opposes Socialized Medicine?

It is frequently argued that most of the opposition to either socialized medicine or government-controlled medicine originates within groups whose motives are entirely selfish, and who are completely without interest in the welfare of the masses of people.

That argument cannot withstand the light of fact. Current proposals for government medicine have met with the formal opposition of 15 state legislatures, and the amazing total of 10,000 national, state and local organizations. Among these are the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Bar Association, and the American Farm Bureau Federation.

To say that organizations of this character are inspired by the selfish considerations of a few people is to say the ridiculous. They represent millions of individuals, of all political faiths, and of all the economic levels. They agree on the issue of government medicine for one reason—their belief that it would reduce the quality of medical care, that it would place a tremendous and unnecessary burden on the taxpayers, and that the growth of our established system of medical care, along with the many voluntary insurance plans, offers the best available solution to our health problems.

Those who would socialize, or otherwise regiment the practice of medicine, work on the theory that if a roof leaks, the solution is to burn down the house. That there are gaps in our medical care system goes without saying—and doctors are among the first to realize this, and to take measures to close them. In recent years, enormous progress has been made. The future will bring greater progress still—if the hand of the politician can be kept off the back of the doctor.

Burkburnett FFA Show Projects At Texas-Okla. Fair

Several projects carried by the FFA chapter are showing at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Iowa Park this week.

Eugene Sloan, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Sloan, is showing a Hereford calf 5 months old in the Junior Livestock Division.

The projects are varied. They care for Duroc Jersey registered pigs, Rabbits, Poultry for egg production, and are feeding stocker calves of which they get much experience.

James Roderick, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Roderick, is showing a fine Duroc Jersey gilt to be entered in the Junior Gilt division. James received a gilt 5 months ago through the Sears-Roebuck Foundation for Livestock improvement program.

Several more boys have made arrangements to get pigs thru this program. They are: Donald Young, Kenneth Howard, Donald Mills and Eugene Sloan. We are expecting the Burkburnett chapter to show more and better livestock next year. The boys learn by doing. Many have some ambitious plan in starting their first project. Accurate records are kept on all projects.

Other projects showing at the Fair this year are: Duroc Jersey gilt, shown by Wayne Chambers and another Duroc gilt shown by Eddie Snyder. This does not mean that the Burkburnett chapter is neglecting the theoretic side of agriculture, the boys spend allotted time learning the latest agricultural methods from text books, newspapers and magazines. The freshman group and groups that haven't had Agriculture before, are learning the essentials of livestock, such as breeds and selection. Out of the group a livestock judging training team was selected.

The game was very close, for the most part being played between the 30 yard lines. T. B. Association Exhibits At Fair

The Wichita County Tuberculosis Association will have an exhibit at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair this week, according to an announcement by Miss Margaret Hall, Executive Secretary.

Prominent in the display of equipment on exhibition will be a "view box" showing four 11x17" X-ray films. The films will show different stages of tuberculosis as it affects the lungs.

A microscope, through which visitors may look at active tuberculosis germs on a slide—but arranged to prevent contagion—will also be exhibited.

The large view box and the microscope are being loaned for the exhibit by the Wichita Falls Cancer Society.

Also on exhibit, will be a portable pneumothorax machine or "gas box", used by chest physicians in treating tuberculosis by collapsing the lungs. This machine is being loaned by Dr. Wayne A. Reser, executive member of the Wichita Co. TB Association.

There will be on display a "single" view box, property of the Wichita Health Unit, thru which 4"x5" X-ray films—required of all food handlers—are diagnosed. To prevent the spread of tuberculosis in Wichita County, all persons who handle food are required to have periodic chest X-rays. This X-ray service is free. The X-ray machine was bought and paid for through the annual sale of Christmas Seals. The service is jointly financed by the Wichita County TB Association and the Wichita Health Unit.

Assorted free booklets and pamphlets on tuberculosis, as it affects various age and occupational groups, should hold an especial appeal to all P-T A groups and science and health teachers of the city and county. Miss Hall said. There will also be free booklets on cancer and mental hygiene.

Thirteen dramatic radio shows of 15 minutes each, in the form of wire recordings, will furnish special entertainment and education for those who visit the booth. The wire recorder is being loaned by the Joe Adair Electric Company.

Each evening during the week, physicians will be on hand to answer questions about tuberculosis and to explain the mechanisms and function of the

equipment on exhibit. These physicians will be: Dr. W. A. Reser, Dr. H. R. Bender, Dr. D. H. Allen and Dr. Bailey R. Collins.

Miss Hall extends a special invitation to residents of Burkburnett to visit the booth in the educational building.

Symphony Season Opens In Wichita

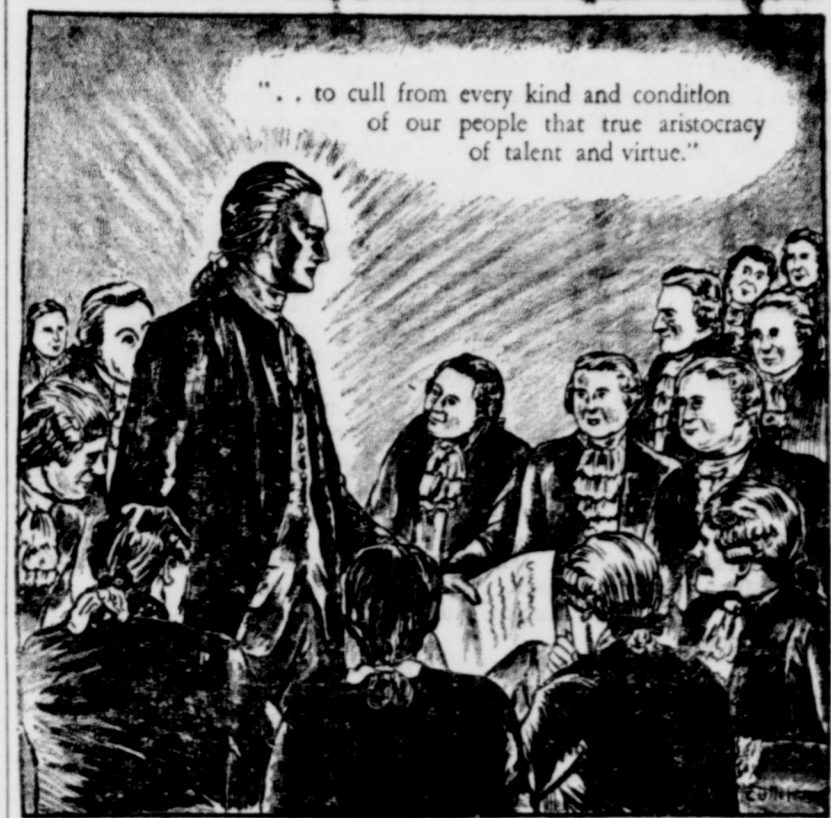
Wichita Falls, Texas, Oct. 2—Symphony season opens in Wichita Falls Oct. 16 when the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra presents its first concert. The Wichita Falls Symphony Society is seeking from Oct. 2 thru Oct. 16 the enrollment of 3,500 members. This year is the third full season for the orchestra since reorganization in January, 1948.

Designed to become a Wichita Falls area institution, the orchestra draws increasingly upon surrounding communities not only for instrumental talent, but also for audience membership. Such plans anticipate a constant development of instrumental talent in Midwestern University, both faculty and student, as a strong nucleus for the symphony orchestra. Outstanding in the university musical faculty are Frederic Balazs, teacher of violin and appreciation, and musical director-conductor of the symphony orchestra; and Dr. Erno Daniel, professor of piano, and associate director of the orchestra.

Membership of 3,500 is sought for the Memorial Auditorium, which seats 3,200 persons, with the idea that a maximum attendance will be registered for each concert. Low membership fees, granting attendance to all concerts of the season, are made possible by the building's large seating capacity. These elements combine to make the orchestra's concerts available to the largest number of listeners.

Four concerts for this season already have been scheduled, with a fifth planned tentatively—depending measurably upon enrollment of maximum membership. For the Oct. 16 opener, Balazs will conduct Tchaikowsky's "Romeo and Juliet" overture, Sibelius "The Swam of Tuolene," Honegger's famous "No. 248", a descriptive novelty, and others. Miss Olive Irene Hallmark, lyric soprano, will be soloist. For the past 3 years she has been starred with numerous musical events of

Our first state college—Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year

The idea of tax-supported technical colleges, offering higher education at a cost which the sons of all economic classes could afford and teaching men how to make better livings in such ordinary fields as agriculture and industry, grew out of the American Revolution. Thomas Jefferson was one of the first to see that the old type of college, in the ivory tower tradition, could not serve the needs of the newly-created democracy. It was not enough, he said, to educate the sons of wealth for the professions of medicine, the ministry, teaching and literature. Men needed more practical training, and it must be available to the sons of all economic groups. "The true function of education in a Democracy," he declared in one famous speech, "is to cull from every kind and condition of our people that true aristocracy of talent and virtue." It was on this philosophy that the A. and M. College of Texas was founded, a hundred years later.
