





The idea of tax-supported technical colleges, offering higher education at a cost which the sons of all economic classes could afford and teaching men how to make better livings in such ordinary fields as agriculture and industry, grew out of the American Revolution. Thomas Jefferson was one of the first to see that the old type of college, in the ivory tower tradition, could not serve the needs of the newly-created democracy. It was not enough, he said, to educate the sons of wealth for the professions of medicine, the ministry, teaching and literature. Men needed more practical training, and it must be available to the sons of all economic groups. "The true function of education in a Democracy," he declared in one famous speech, "is to cull from every kind and condition of our people that true aristocracy of talent and virtue." It was on this philosophy that the A. and M. College of Texas was founded, a hundred years later



Many poultrymen will prefer the other course, that of culling the poor producers immede - Bonds - Notary | iately upon noticing that their laying record is not up to par This is a sure method for avoiding unnecessary feed waste; but on the other hand, it is always possible that some of the birds which are culled might otherwise have developed into good layers.

Watch for Markings Spotting poor laying birds is not necessarily a difficult task. There are several tell tale markings to look for when cull-

ing, and some of them are often quite distinct. The vent of a non layer is shrunken, dry and yellow in contrast to the good producer's expanded, moist, and faded vent.

The loafing bird's comb and wattles are shrunken and scaly. The layer's comb and wattles are large, waxy, and red.

Color tells the story of egg production in yellow-skinned breeds. The beak, shanks, vent, and eye ring of a good layer are faded, often bleached. When the bird ceases to lay, this coloring reappears.

Plug casters have been told over and over to keep their reel handles up, not sidewise when casting, but I'll wager less than a tenth of those you see fishing do it. So let's stop and figure out why this is so important.

First, a casting reel spins much more smoothly and freely with the spool sort of balanced on the tail pivot. It just won't run right with the handles sidewise, the pillars and spool horizontal.

Then, with the reel handles sidewise, the guides are on top of the rod. As the line goes out it slaps the rod and when wet, clings and jerks on it. But what happens with the guides on one side, as they must be with the reel handles up? Why the bow of the line downward between the guides can touch nothing but air. So it flows out

smoothly, easily. Now for the most important reason. What do you do when you cast with the spool horizontal? Why you're throwing the rod out with the thumb of your casting hand-you just
