Half-Time Feature Announced

During the half-time activities of the Burkburnett-Crowell game Friday night, Nov. 3rd at Bulldog Stadium, Miss Barbara Vaughn will be crowned Football Queen of the 1950-1951 season. She is the beautiful daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Vaughn and is a member of the Freshman class.

The game is called for 8:00 P. M.

Barbara was chosen queen by popular vote of the football boys in a recent election. Her attendants were selected in the same manner.

The Burkburnett High school Band under the direction of Mr. Max Stalaland will play the "fanfare" as the Queen's party enters the Northwest gate. The Queen, Miss Barbara Vaughn, will enter riding on top of a red convertible furnished by Tom Britton Motors. Her attendants will follow in a chartreuse convertible furnished by Pete Dunn. They will circle the field and be met on the 20 yard line by their escorts. While the band is playing the "Coronation March."

Barbara will be escorted by Lee Keen. Her attendants, Fredna Howard, by Cleo Askins; Joyce Stewart, by Edwin Draper; Billyjane Smith, by Martin Leimer; and Carol Campbell by Edward Taylor. The Coronation party will proceed down to the fifty yard line where Lee Keen will place a football helmet on the Queen's head and present her with an arm bouquet of Hallowe'en mums. Each attendant will be given a mum corsage.

As the Queen and her attendants leave the field the band will play "Peg Of My Heart."

The group will retire to the sideline bench on the 45 yard line for the remainder of the game, and Miss Barbara Vaughn will be official Football Queen for the 1950-1951 season.

Mother of Mrs. J. C. Adams Dies In Fort Worth

Mrs. Albertie Chamblee, 79, and mother of Mrs. J. C. Adams died at the home of another daughter, Mrs. J. R. Wilkinson in Fort Worth Tuesday of last week.

Mrs. Chamblee was born in Anderson, South Carolina, and had lived in Fort Worth for many years. Her family was one of the first to establish a business when the city was started. She spent three months each winter with Mrs. Adams and was well known and loved by those who knew her. Very active until last March, Mrs. Chamblee suffered a stroke as she was preparing to go to Anderson to visit an only sister. After a month in the hospital, she was moved to her daughter's home. She had an attack of pneumonia and several other strokes followed until the end came last week. Her three children were with her at the time of her death.

Survivors include the one sister, two daughters, and a son, W. H. Chamblee of Ft. Worth; 11 grand children and 13 great grand children.

Funeral services were held Wednesday from the Pleasant Run Baptist Church, and interment was made in the Parker Memorial Cemetery at Grapevine.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Brashear have received word that the body of their son, Lieut. Sam Brashear, was identified about two months ago, and is being returned for burial.

Lieut. Brashear was killed on Okinawa August 13, 1945 in an airplane accident. He volunteered for military service and was inducted at Sheppard Field in January, 1943. He trained at San Antonio, Tulsa, Greenville, and received his Wings at Frederick April, 1944 as flight officer. He was sent overseas in November, 1944, being stationed at New Guinea, later being moved to the Philippines and was apparently flying from bases in the Philippines to Okinawa at the time of his death.

A wire received by Owens and Brumley Funeral Home, stated that the body would arrive in Wichita Falls, Monday morning, Nov. 6th. Funeral services will be held from the First Baptist Church here Tuesday at 2 P. M. Rev. Miles B. Hays, former pastor of the church, will officiate. Interment will be made in the Crestview Memorial Park in Wichita Falls.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a daughter, one brother, Cline Brashear and one sister, Mrs. J. H. Watson of Wichita Falls.

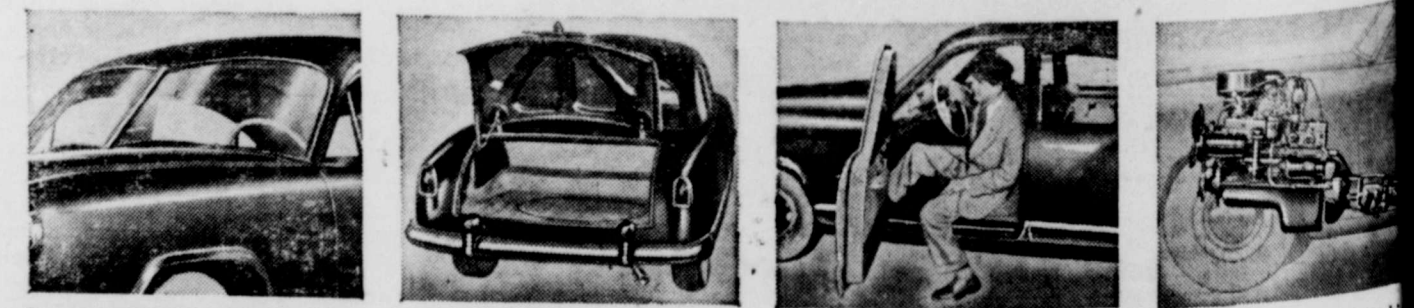

**Senator Johnson
Favors Raising
Cotton Exports**

The cotton export quota should be raised by several hundred thousand bales, Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas told the Department of Agriculture this week.

Senator Johnson acted after the Munitions Board advised him that 700,000 bales should be enough to take care of military needs during fiscal 1951.

The Department of Agriculture had set up 1,500,000 for military use, an estimate which Senator Johnson called "guesswork" which resulted from the failure of the Munitions Board to state its needs.

It was prodding by Senator Johnson, who is Chairman of the Senate Preparedness Committee, that brought the 700,000 bale estimate from Roscoe Seybold, acting chairman of the Munitions Board.

Senator Johnson immediately called on Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan to raise the export quota considerably above the present figure of 2,000,000 bales.

"While everybody wants to see that we have plenty of cotton on hand for military and domestic needs," Senator Johnson said, "we must also see that the cotton farmers are not put at the mercy of speculators by the hoarding of cotton which is not needed for this nation's requirements."

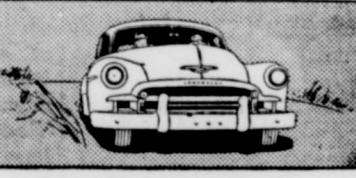
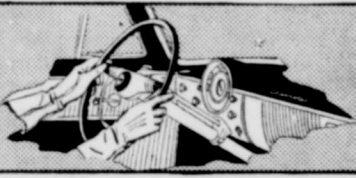

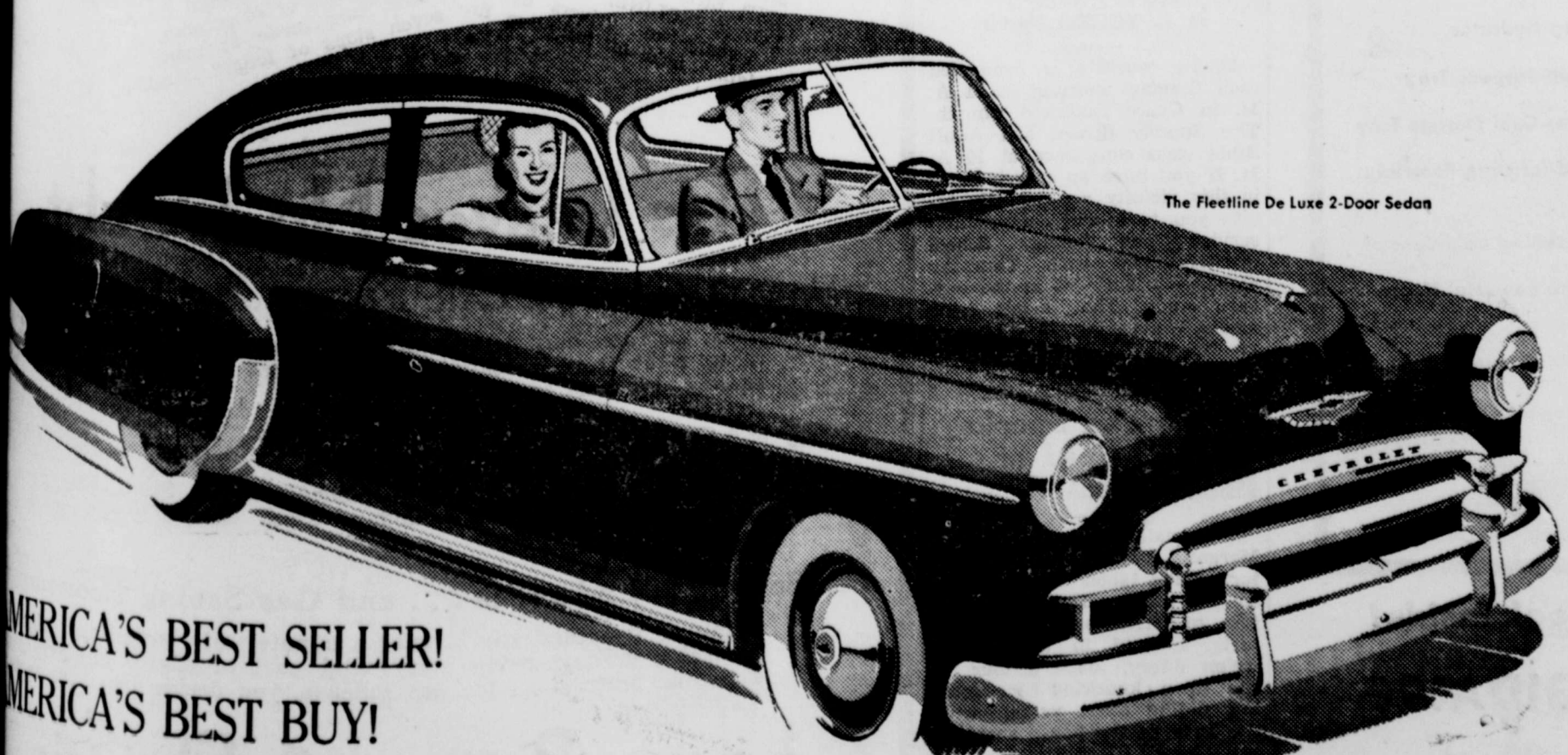

CHICK CHATS
By Clark Gresham

Ask yourself this question: "Do I make needless trips to the laying house?" If you do, perhaps an adjustment in your chore schedule will reduce those trips and make daily flock chores easier for you.

An efficient, smooth working daily routine will go far in eliminating those little mistakes that often lead to disease, reduced egg production, and other poultry troubles. By following a good chore schedule, by performing regular tasks each time you look in on your flock you make each trip count. You reduce wasted time, save labor, and give birds the benefit of a consistent management schedule.

Four Daily Trips
Four daily trips to the laying house are recommended as good procedure. By following this step by step plan you soon realize how efficiency in poultry raising pays you dividends.

Suggested Chore Schedule

Early Morning Chores:

1. Adjust ventilation for daytime use.
2. Refill feeders, shell, and grit hoppers.
3. Clean and refill waterers, removing surrounding litter, if wet.
4. Open nests, if you cover them at night.
5. Inspect area under nests for cleanliness.

Late Morning, Mid-Afternoon

1. Adjust ventilation if necessary.
2. Stir up feed, bringing fresh feed to surface.
3. Gather eggs.

Evening Chores:

1. Gather eggs.
2. Close nests for the night, if covers are used.
3. Stir up feed.
4. Adjust ventilation for the night.
5. Observe flock continuously for culls.

Henry J Wins Race At Arlington

ARLINGTON, Texas, Oct. 28—Orville Mills of Ladonia, Texas, piloting a 1951 Henry J (Kaiser), won the 250 mile Southwestern United States Stock car racing championship at Arlington Downs Sunday afternoon.

A crowd estimated at 12,000 watched Mills cover the distance in four hours, twenty-five minutes and twenty-seven seconds for an average speed of 56.7 miles per hour. MILLS MADE ONLY ONE STOP—AT THE END OF 200 MILES—FOR GASOLINE. Twenty-two drivers of an original field of forty-five finished.

One Stop Aids Auto Race Winner

Oct. 31—Last week a Corvair car dealer bought a Henry J at an auction sale for \$1,100. Sunday the same car, a mere midget among mastadons, captured the winner's share of the \$3,000 Southwestern U. S. Championship stock car race at Arlington Downs.

Orville Mills of Ladonia was the lucky lad chosen to drive the surprise entry after the dealer was ribbed into entering the car in the 250 mile event. And Mills won it with a steady foot that coaxed an average speed approximating 58 miles per hour from his car. Another contributing factor to the upset victory was that Mills made but one pit stop for fuel, a brief half of 20 seconds, while other cars made as many as seven stops of longer duration.

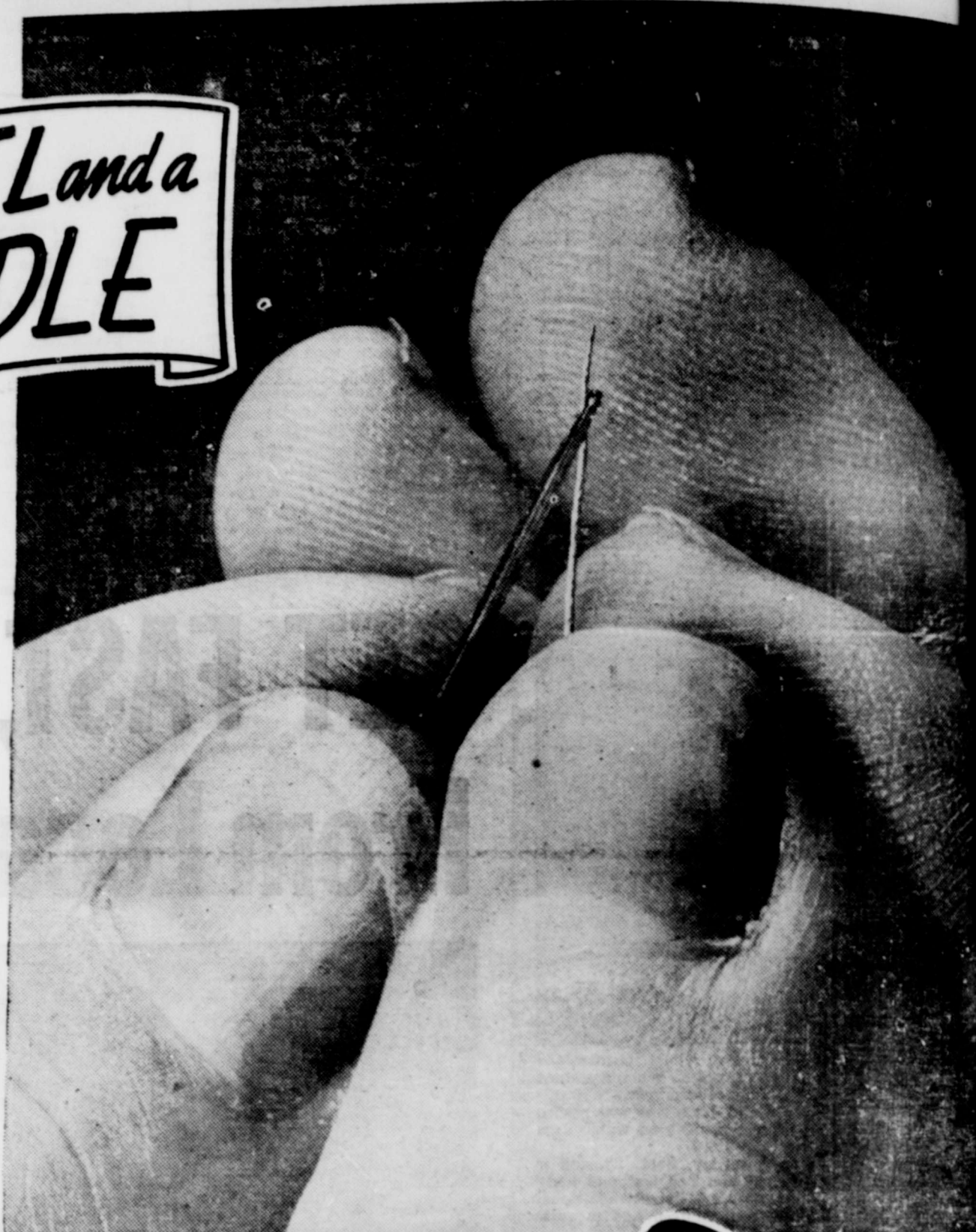

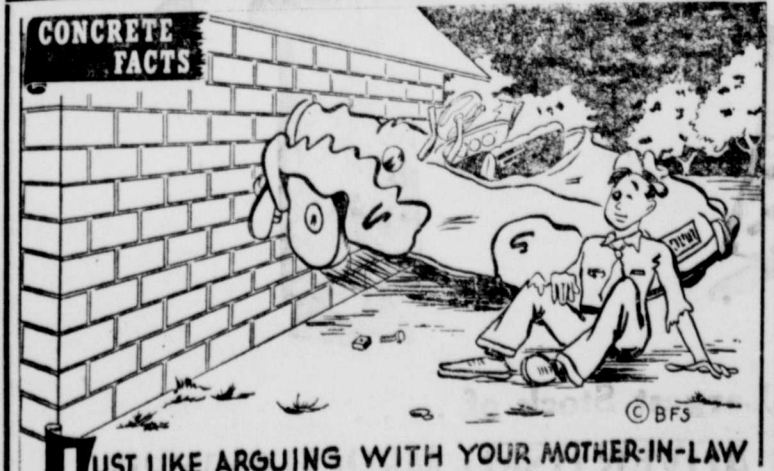
