It has been understood that military cuisine cannot be likened to good, home cooking. But each war finds the conditions bettered, with dieticians at work to plan palatable meals for our boys. Field rations have become more appetizing though we have heard some lads giving K rations the Bronx cheer. But man's ingenuity is making possible kits that include a meal far superior to the army rations of yesterday. There is a new one for assault troops, about the size of an ice cream brick package, weighing less than a pound. In the individual cardboard box are two cans, one containing meat patties which can be eaten hot or cold, with a can opener inclosed that is the size of a watch charm. The top of the can holds a heat tablet which, when lighted, gives the effect of canned heat. Over it, in two minutes the patties begin to sizzle. The packet contains two portions of coffee with a vial of water purification tablets, if you are uncertain about the water in your canteen. Another heat tablet and you have good, hot coffee. There is a tin of cookies, two sweet, chocolate bars, three cigarettes and a stick of chewing gum, to complement your meal.

How To Check

The annual threat of fall and early winter colds is here again. And to the average poultry raiser, this means another season of coughing, rattling, and perhaps lowered disease resistance in his flock.

Yes, colds and respiratory conditions are prevalent in poultry this time of year. But such conditions can be controlled-and greatly reduced-"The West 50 feet of Block if Mr. average poultry raiser follows a few rules of management and takes certain preventive measures.

A Comfortable House

The condition of the laying house is all-important. Therefore, as part of the overall precautions against colds, it should be kept as free from drafts as possible. In doing this, the area around nests and roosts should be given special attention, since any sudden changes in temperatures is likely to upset layers -and production. But raisers must provide protection against cold air throughout the house. In fact, every effort should be made to duplicate springtime conditions in the laying house. go a long way in achieving these ends.

In guarding against colds, it also is necessary to keep the flock eating well. To do this, poultrymen must keep up the vitality of layers and see to it that birds' diets are well supplied with vitamins and trace mineral elements. Stomachic appetizers can usually be fed with good results.

Treat Colds Promptly If poultry should develop

colds during the forthcoming cold weather months, there are several means of easing the conditions. When poultry have trouble breathing, it is advisable to treat them with an inhalent. There are good vaporizing spray treatments available at most hatcheries, feed stores and farm poultry supply stores. Prompt use of a spray or nasal wash usually brings quick relief to birds' clogged nasal passages.

Sulfa drug aids are also useful in bringing colds under control. Used in either drinking water or mash, sulfa aids are excellent treatments for such cold troubles or coryza and roup. Many poultrymen also use certain vaccines and bacterins for colds.

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

Thomas Bell Addressed Lions Tuesday Night

Lions C. M. Archer and Jim D. C. Dodson. Ady had charge of the program Tuesday night. Archer introduced Lion Thomas Bell, Vocational Agriculture instructor, who brought the club briefly the program undertaken by FFA

In opening his talk, Bell explained what Agriculture is, and stated that everyone is directly or indirectly dependent upon agriculture. "FFA, Future Farmers of America," said Bell, is a young man's training for the farming vocation. Our program teaches boys how to farm profitably. Every boy has a project. He keeps minute records of expenses and income. At the end of the year he can tell exactly how much money he made or lost. Vocational Agriture Education teaches a boy more than farming. It teaches him public speaking, fundamental parliamentary rules, mathematics, and bookkeeping. It is a well rounded course to better fit a boy for the future."

To give some idea of the scope of the work being done by local FFA boys, Bell said: "Since September 15th, we have sprayed 15 pecan trees to control worms, treated 78 peach trees for borers, castrated 8 calves, vaccinated 11 calves for pinkeye, vaccinated 9 calves for blackleg, vaccinated 7 calves for Hemorrhagic-Septicemia, vaccinated 2 dogs for rabies, treated 5,000 flower plants to control insects, culled 335 hens for egg production, treated 93 hens for lice and mites, treated one laying house for mites and lice. This is a community service to teach the boys to do by doing; to give them experience in the actual work.

"In conclusion, let me say that agriculture is the backbone of our national economy. Without a prosperous agriculture the

world would be paralyzed." Lion Harlan Mills had as his guests his daughter, Miss Wanda Gayle Mills, and Miss Charlene

Clements.
