It comes to our attention there are entirely too many fund raising drives in Burkburnett. There is too much lost motion, too many duplications of effort, too great waste of time for willing workers. It's not that we are opposed to any of the

worthwhile and humanitarian organizations that seek funds from us. Red Cross, Tuberculosis Control, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls-these and many others deserve our support.

For each campaign, a general chairman and his or her workers gather to work out the details of their particular drive. Practically the same workers do the work for each campaign. They see the same list of business men and individuals for a half dozen or more drives each year. A volunteer worker will lose one, two or three days from their business during every drive they help with.

How about having one great big drive just once each year to cover all contributions to worthy agencies? It would necessitate a more thorough

canvass of our citizens, but in the long run would save many man hours of duplicating effort. A committee could be set up to decide just which agencies would participate in the one fund, and just what per cent of the total each would get. This suggestion is worth careful consideration.

Fire Chief Dink Lawson asks the Star to tell

its readers that if they have a particularly dangerous fire hazard of grass and weeds around their premises, the Fire Boys will burn it off for thembut by appointment only. Just phone 244, give the location and you will be taken care of just as soon as possible. But for heaven's sake, be careful about setting fires yourself. Don't think that the Fire Boys can drop everything for hours and days at a time and come burn grass for you. All the boys are working at their places of business or for some one else. They have to make a living too, you know. And don't get impatient just because you have called in and the truck isn't there in the next few minutes, and set the fire yourself to make them get a move on. They may be out elsewhere at that particular moment keeping a fire under control they themselves have set by request. If you get too anxious, you could lose your home, or burn down your neighbor's home. Aside from having their hands full elsewhere, it isn't advisable to burn grass just any time. If the wind is too high, no fireman would deliberately set a fire to help you get rid of the surplus mess.

If you want grass burned, call 244. That's all. Don't set it yourself. Let the Fire Boys decide if the time is right.

#### \$6.89 Paid For Million Dollars Worth of Surplus

Investigations by the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee have disclosed how the Air Force paid \$63,000 to repurchase valuable equipment which had been sold by the government as surplus for \$6.89.

This was announced today by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, (D-Texas), Chairman, who said: "Since its creation, the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee has devoted considerable time to efforts to halt the unwise sale of valuable defense materials as surplus. We believe that substantial progress

has been made toward establishing more prudent and more realistic policies. "In all our investigations

however, this case of the Air Force spending \$63,000 to repurchase equipment which had been sold by the government for \$6.00 is perhaps the most astounding case of short-sightedness that we have encountered We hope that this incident will impress upon all agencies dealing with surplus the great necessity for exercising the utmost caution and care in their transactions."

The case mentioned by Senator Johnson is this: In 1946, a former Naval Of-

ficer returned to his home in East Texas and began buying small quantities of surplus goods from the War Assets Administration to improve his farm. These goods he bought included blacksmith tools, build. ing materials, carpentry tools, tractors, etc. His total pur chases were less than \$3,000.00. While bidding on this equipment, he found an item offering for sale Air Craft 'Computers." The man explained:

"I had in mind that these instruments were small circular cardboard computers which might be used in civilian life for calculating land areas, etc., in a similar manner to a cheap slide rule.

So he filed a bid for about 5 cents each on these items. Some time later he was notified that his bid had been accepted and he was urged to move the

"computers" promptly. "At that time", the purchaser reports, "I told the contracting officer over the telephone just to send them up to me parcel




