A MOMENT OF TIME



Many of us have come to think of the Christmas Seal as the first harbinger of Christmas.

When these Seals arrive in our mail around Thanksgiving time, we realize that "Christmas is coming", that once more we shall relive all the beautiful traditions that make this the best time of year.

It takes only a moment to write a check or slip some bills in an envelope. If the envelope is addressed to the Wichita County Tuberculosis Association, Wichita Falls, that brief moment may help save a life.

Funds realized from the sale of Christmas Seals are the sole financial support of the association in its work to bring tuberculosis under complete control in our community. The activities of the association include such worthwhile projects as Free X-Rays. This summer a TB X-Ray unit came to Burkburnett for two days making X-Rays of Burkburnett citizens. There was no charge for this service.

Continuation of these activities may make the difference between life and death to some of our residents. Surely all of us want to support the work of our tuberculosis association. It will take but a moment to tell the association we are back of its life-saving program, only a moment to acknowledge our Christmas Seals.

Burk Water Has Sufficient Fluoride Without Addition

Many cities in Texas have added fluoride, that wonderful chemical which keeps teeth from decaying, to their water. Many other cities are contemplating the move, some at great expense. The City Dads in Burk had been discussing the advisability of such a move, and got estimates on the cost.

This week a state water expert from A. & M. College Short Course Extension Service has been conducting a school of instruction in Wichita Falls for area water department employees. He took the state analysis report on Burk's water, made extensive tests of his own and came up with this happy finding—BURK'S WATER ALREADY, IN ITS NATURAL STATE, HAS SUFFICIENT FLUORIDE!

The maximum amount of desirable fluoride content is 1.3. BURK'S WATER CONTAINS .6 JUST AS IT IS NOW. The expert informed City Manager Wiggins he did not recommend any additional fluoride here. It is sufficient for all practical purposes so far is known by chemists.

The expert also complimented Burk's water for its other chemical and mineral contents. Water with no minerals is almost tasteless. He said Burk's water tasted good to him and compared to other cities in this area, had a lot of advantages. The only objectionable feature the expert found was that our water is just a wee bit harder than desirable.

He will take claims of retired workers, dependents and survivors; issue social security cards; and distribute informational leaflets explaining phases of the amended Social Security Act.

Mr. Tate calls attention to the provision in the new social security law for the payment of monthly insurance benefits to the wife of a retired worker, regardless of her present age, if she has a child under 18 in her care. Under the old law, such payments were not made until she became 18. Women who meet this requirement should file new claims for insurance payments, says Mr. Tate.

Using and discipling ones inner resources of the mind's powers is true education, and for Education Week we quote a portion of an address made by General Eisenhower to the students of Columbia University:

"In these times when we hear so much of security, security for everything we do—when so many of us want to be sure that we shall never be cold, or hungry, or out in the rain, or have a leaky roof—I must tell you that you have come to the wrong place if you are seeking complete fulfillment of any ambition that deals with perfect security.

"In fact, I am quite certain that the human being could not continue to exist if he had perfect security. Life is certainly worthwhile only if it represents struggle for worthy causes, and there is no struggle in perfect security. I should think that the best example of it would be a man serving a life-time in a federal prison."

WE CAN'T IMAGINE.

Taking systems of transportation and communication for granted it is hard to imagine what life would be like without postal and telephone facilities. In Korea they are finding out, as their minister of communications says war's destruction has almost completely crippled postal and telephone communication. Maintenance of mail and phone service is vital to the administration of a country, to its economy. Think what the loss of it would mean to our area alone. In a single City it would be crippling, to an entire country it would be chaotic. It is for just such a reason that certain cities are redoubling their efforts for civil defense programs.

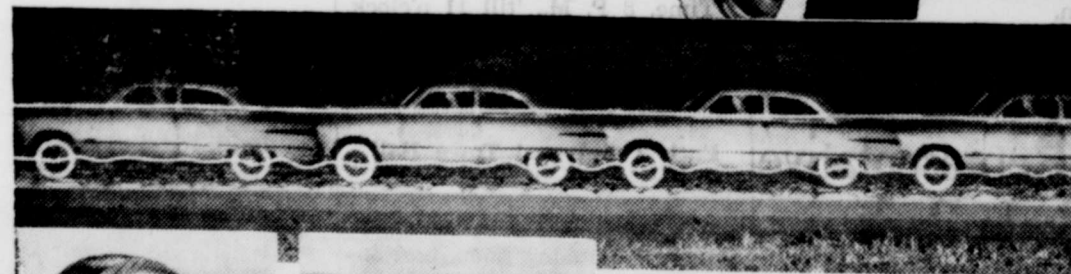

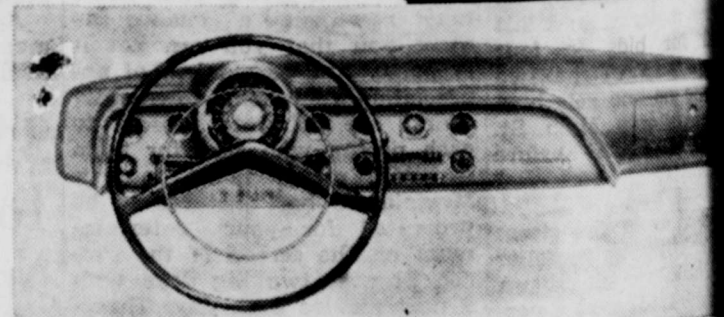

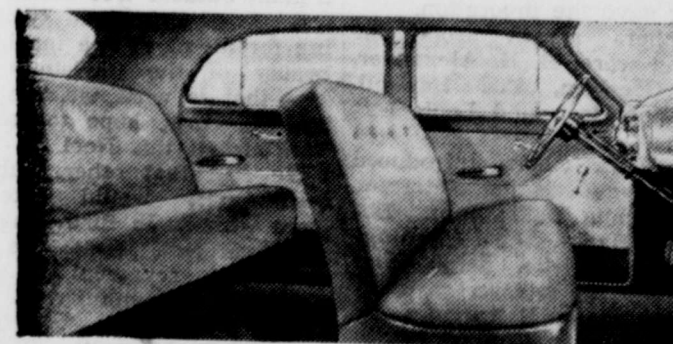

1951 Fords Feature Fordomatic Drive Transmission

The 1951 Fords, featuring Fordomatic Drive, the new automatic transmission, will be introduced in Ford Dealerships throughout the nation Friday, November 24th.

"Ford cars for 1951 accomplish notable refinements in styling, beauty, engineering, riding qualities, economy, safety and ease of handling," L. D. Crusoe, vice-president and general manager of Ford Division, announced.

Addition of the new automatic device will make available to Ford buyers a choice of three transmissions and two engines—six different power combinations in all.

Both the conventional three-speed transmission and the Ford overdrive will continue to be available. These, with the new Fordomatic Drive, will be offered with either the 100-horse power V8 or the improved 95-horse power six engines.

Introduction of Fordomatic climaxes several years of intensive engineering research by the company to develop a fully automatic transmission that is simple to operate, economical, long wearing and easy to service. The device, which will be optional at extra cost, combines the advantages of a hydraulic torque converter and a plane-

tary gear train to provide maximum performance and smooth and economical flow of power.

The distinctive styling of the 1949 and 1950 models has been retained, but with refinements and improvements both in interiors and exteriors.

A lowered hood, a new dual-spinner grille and a wider, wrap-around bumper gives a more massive appearance to the front end. Parking lights are restyled and larger chrome headlamp rims extend beyond the lenses. Added chrome and new, larger tail lamps add to the appearance of the rear end.

Rear deck lids on the new Fords have been counter-balanced and are opened by a new key release lock. Springs then assist in raising the lid and hold it in the open position.

The new models have a wide range of color combinations, and a choice of upholstery, headlinings and other interior trim to harmonize with body colors. This wide choice is a Ford exclusive in the low-price field.

The '51 "Safety Glow" instrument panel is completely new. A "Chantallited" instrument cluster adds safety and convenience, and the speedometer pointer has a glowing ring which encircles and illuminates the figure showing the speed. The instrument control knobs are mounted in depressed cups, each individually lighted.

Key starting is provided by the new ignition switch which incorporates the starter control. The steering wheel also is re-designed, with a full-circle horn ring on custom models. A posture control front seat is mounted on curved tracks, and when it is moved forward or backward, the entire seat assembly tips seat forward automatically.

Rubber engine mounts also have been re-designed.

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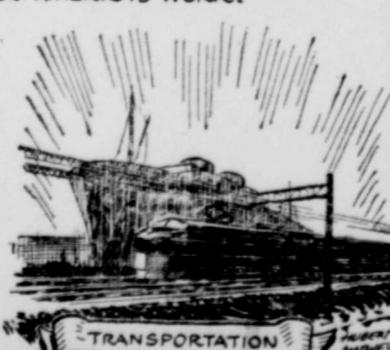

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Now is the opportune time for farmers and ranchers planning to do range seeding of grass, to purchase their seed now. Either for seeding this fall or in the early spring.

From the exceptional growth that most warm season grasses made during the past summer, where proper range management was carried out, allowed most of the range grasses to produce an excellent seed crop, which in most grasses will be high in germination. This is especially true with little and big bluestem, Indian grass, and switch grass in this locality.

The Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors has purchased grass drills, and placed them at each Work Unit Soil Conservation headquarters for farmers and ranchers use who are co-operators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District.

Co-operators of Wichita County should contact the local Soil Conservation Office in Iowa Park who wish to use the drill. This drill is adapted for seeding most all kinds of grass and legume seed.

Fire Chief Dink Lawson asks the Star to tell its readers that if they have a particularly dangerous fire hazard of grass and weeds around their premises, the Fire Boys will burn it off for them—but by appointment only. Just phone 244, give the location and you will be taken care of just as soon as possible. But for heaven's sake, be careful about setting fires yourself. Don't think that the Fire Boys can drop everything for hours and days at a time and come burn grass for you. All the boys are working at their places of business or for some one else. They have to make a living too, you know. And don't get impatient just because you have called in and the truck isn't there in the next few minutes, and set the fire yourself to make them get a move on. They may be out elsewhere at that particular moment keeping a fire under control they themselves have set by request. If you get too anxious, you could lose your home, or burn down your neighbor's home. Aside from having their hands full elsewhere, it isn't advisable to burn grass just any time. If the wind is too high, no fireman would deliberately set a fire to help you get rid of the surplus mess.

If you want grass burned, call 244. That's all. Don't set it yourself. Let the Fire Boys decide if the time is right.

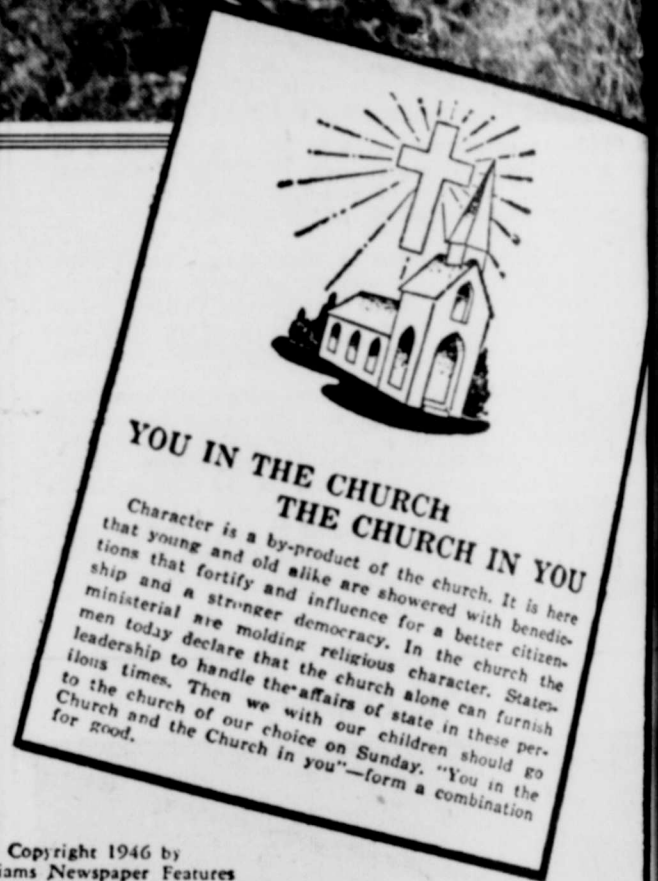

Are Your Birds Free of Lice?
Lice, chicken mites, and other external parasites are a constant threat to poultry flocks. Most raisers recognize this old threat, but many fail to protect their birds properly. As a result, far too many flocks are forced to go through a laying season suffering from heavy lice infestation.

Infestation with destructive, blood sucking, biting mouth parasites can be extremely harmful to poultry. Lower egg production, anemia, and refusal to lay in nests are some of the typical symptoms of lousy birds. Growing birds also may be troubled with poultry pests. Weak, anemic birds that grow at a slow rate frequently show up as carriers of lice and mites.

Michigan Report
The Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association testifies to the damage lice cause birds. In one of the association's recent bulletins, Drs. King and Edgar of the Alabama Experiment Station revealed how the body louse affected laying hens over an 11 month laying period. Louse free hens in this experiment averaged 11.17% greater production than "lousy" hens. The louse free hens also averaged heavier body weights after five or six months of the first laying year—and the mortality rate was lower.

Such findings as these typically describe conditions found in louse-infected flocks throughout the country.
One of the first precautions in pest control is the enforcement of strict sanitary measures. But perhaps the most effective way to combat poultry house pests is through regular delousing.
Effective Pest Control
Of course, the ideal time to delouse birds is when you place pullets in the laying house.

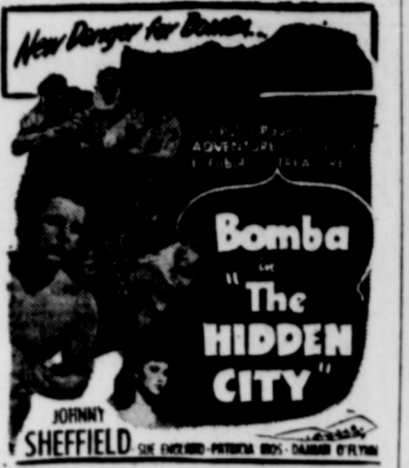
