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### ON OUR OWN

The matter with voluntary controls, is human nature. Why didn't the government begin earlier to impose mandatory controls, asks a local critic? Maybe capable men needed at such a time are difficult to lure to Washington, to take on hard, thankless jobs that are unsteady pay low salaries, are upon to constant, severe political attack. Anyhow, we are now asked, as patriotic folk to voluntarily refrain from charging too much, paying too much, buying too much. Self-controlled, duty bound, civic-minded citizenry would make an ideal situation but, unfortunately, the plan didn't work when voluntary price control was tried during World War II, and human nature hasn't changed since then. It didn't work at the time of the Civil War when voluntary enlistment, with an inducement of cash bonuses, didn't appeal and finally the draft system was inaugurated.

It is the same old story over again, to hold the excess demand over the limited supply, to make a stable price level. Voluntary or mandatory, the control may restrain or dam inflation, but the pressure is still there. Taxes and credit controls are used to reduce the consumer's demand for goods. This is hateful to us but is a necessary measure to reduce spending, though it lowers our level of standard of living. This comes under the heading of sacrifices. During wartime, surely price control is not the greatest sacrifice asked of us. Americans can take it, the majority want it and feel the gov-

ernment should have acted sooner.

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

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

### HOME OWNERS QUESTION BOX

Q—I plan to paper the plaster walls of my newly-constructed house. How soon can I do this? A-A new plaster wall should

not be papered or painted until it has dried out thoroughly. Usually this will require at least two months. Calcimine, in white or one of the many tints, can be used for immediate decoration if

Q—I want to put a new roof on my house which stands in an ex-posed location where winds of gale force are frequent. What roofing would you recommend?

A—Several types of roofing could be used, but it is likely you will use asphalt roofing which to-day is supplying about 90 percent of the nation's roofing require-ments. It will be advisable to ce-ment down the asphalt shingles by applying a daub of quick-set-ting cement about the size of a fifty-cent piece under the exposed portion of each tab.

Q-Is a special type of paint required for painting concrete? A-Ordinary house paint can be used in painting concrete and

portland-cement stucco. But the concrete must be dry. Sufficient time should be allowed for night dampness to dry off, and after a rain three or four days are required to permit the concrete to dry out thoroughly.

Q-What is the proper method of taking care of waxed floors? A—Waxed floors should be dusted with a dry brush or cloth and polished once a week or so. This holds true whether the wax is applied directly to the wood or over varnish or shellac. But do not use an oiled mop because oil will soften the wax.



The cottontail rabbit is our favorite game animal. If you don't believe this, just look at these facts dug up by George Heinold: Some 11 million hunters take to the field each season have inherited most of its bills. and bag between 30 and 40 million bunnies. The incredible harvest puts nearly 100 million pounds of succulent meat into the national stewpan. According to a recent national survey, the rabbit toll adds up to more than 50 per cent of all other small game combined!

Now there are several sporting ways to hunt rabbits. Men who like grade-A hound music send beagles into the field. But many other breeds will serve the purpose. In fact, any pooch that will tree the neighbor's cat will also run a rabbit.

For tops in sport, however, certain qualities are necessary in a rabbit dog. Among these, ose and persistence are the nost important. Experience will e the best trainer.

Unlike foxhounds, low geared speed is desirable in a rabbit dog. A race track dog will run the game into dens and stone walls, but a slower one drives in a circle and almost invariably brings the bunny back to where the chase began. Next to the beagle, my second choice for a rabbit dog would be a spaniel or terrier.

But you can hunt without a dog. The main thing is knowing where to look for rabbits. The cottontail can usually be found snoozing in brush lots, meadow lands, grassy thickets on the fringes of farms and suburbs, on ill-kept farms and cutover wood lots. Never pass up a brushy, sunny slope when hunting on farmland, Buckshot dung, piles of little brown pel-

lets are the signs to look for. Then after the first snow blankets the woods, you can try the traditional New England pastime of "Injun-walking" rabbits. This is a simple but stimulating sport because following tracks etched in fresh snow keeps you in contact with the movements of your game.

There is an important rule to remember when injun-walking rabbits: although they are hard to evict from their beds the first time, they are very apt the second time to jump the new lair before you can get close enough to kick the cover. So watch it.

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

A—Liquid wax, applied periodically, is recommended. If clothing still becomes discolored from contact with the sink edge, you might try roughing up the alumi-num with steel wool and then applying shellac

Q-I have been unable to find a mall leak in my roof. How can locate it?

A-Examine the under side of the roof in bright daylight. When you find the spot where light shows through, put a piece of wire or a sliver of wood through the hole so it can be located from outside. If your roof is worn, however, other leaks can be expected to develop shortly and it would to develop shortly and it would be economical to put on a new roof rather than to attempt to patch the old one. Asphalt shin-gles usually can be applied right over the old roofing material.

Q-Some of the windows in my home are difficult to open and then, once opened, require considerable effort to close. What causes this, and how can the condition be overcome?

A—There are several causes of sticking windows. Hardened paint in the grooves in which the window slides may be responsible, and swelling of the sashes or parts of the grooves is another cause. The sash can be made to slide more easily, however, by rubbing paraffin on the grooves.


