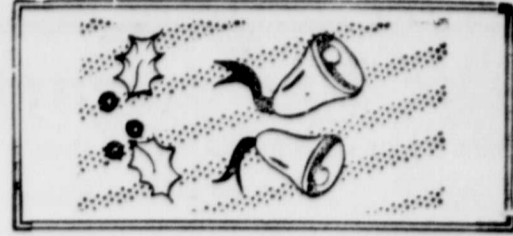

### Burk Store One of Fifteen in Texas And Okla.

H. D. "Jack" Snell Owns And Supervises Stores In Texas

H. D. Snell, originator and owner of the United Super Markets with his three sons, gained success the hard way. Hard work and good business judgment has enabled him to advance from a clerk in a small grocery store to the head of a successful chain.

In 1907 in Sayre, Oklahoma, Snell made a living with a horse and wagon, doing odd hauling jobs.

The work started his association with Dugger and Cotton, a grocery store. He worked there for four years and in 1911 left for Dallas to learn the chain store business.

In Dallas Snell went to work for the Higginbotham group, known as the United Stores. He studied their technique and the manner of operation until 1916 when he returned to Sayre and went into business for himself.

Snell's first store was started with an \$800 capital, but the owner of the new business first secured the friendship and co-operation of the bank and a wholesale grocery house.

Snell became the first in Oklahoma to advertise groceries exclusively in newspapers. He also was the first to sell merchandise at odd cents in the state.

A policy of Snell's was to buy nothing until he had the money to pay for it and thus his growth became a solid one. He opened his second store at Erick and new stores have been added at regular intervals since.

In Oklahoma United Food Stores are at Sayre, Erick, Elk City, Mangum, Cordell, Hobart, Sentinel, Snyder, Frederick, Hollis and Altus. The office and warehouse is in Altus.

Snell's debut in Texas was in 1930 when a store was opened in Wellington. Now there are stores in Texas at Wellington, Vernon, Childress, Shamrock and Burk Burnett. H. D. "Jack" Snell, Jr., owns and supervises all Texas stores. His home is in Vernon.

H. D. Snell, Jr., attended high school in Oklahoma and was graduated from Baylor University with a BA degree in 1940, entering the grocery store business in 1941.

Two other sons, Jim and Perry, are associated with their father in operation of the Oklahoma stores. H. D., Sr., makes his home in Altus, Oklahoma.

Bob Heiney will manage the local store. Mr. Heiney, his wife and two daughters, Charlene and Lois will establish residence here as soon as a place can be found. He was reared at Hobart, Okla., and came to Burk from the Vernon store where he had many years' experience in the grocery business.

## Grass Is Man's Anchor for Soil Against Erosion

Grass, man's best tool for anchoring soil against erosion, was given a sound vote of confidence during 1950 by Texas farmers and ranchers.

Increased respect for this weapon against soil and water waste is reflected by last year's seed harvest, which shows 746,596 pounds of native grass seed harvested by Texas farmers and ranchers. It was pointed out today by Louis F. Merrill, Soil Conservation regional director at Fort Worth.

Leading the native grass seed harvest parade in Texas were little bluestem, (400,325 lbs.) and blue grama (202,430 lbs.), both warm season forage plants. The 1950 seed harvest figures, Merrill said, also reflect widely increased use of King Ranch bluestem by conservation-wise farmers and ranchers. It is a deep-rooted introduced perennial grass known for its erosion-resisting and forage qualities and its adaptation to wide extremes of rainfall.

Throughout Texas a total of 506,537 pounds of King Ranch bluestem seed was harvested, easily a new record seed take for the popular drought and cold-resistant grass, the regional director said.

Of the KR seed harvested in Texas last year, 463,082 pounds or about 91 per cent of the state-wide harvest were taken from the farms and ranches of soil conservation district co-operators, Merrill said. An additional 2,430 pounds of KR seed were harvested from the Soil Conservation Service nursery at San Antonio and U. S. land utilization project areas.

From Texas' more than 4 1/2 million acres in close-growing, soil-conserving legumes, a total of 25,214,000 pounds of legume seed was harvested during 1950, Merrill announced.

Leading in the Texas legume seed harvest was Hubam sweet-clover (11,258,947 pounds), a versatile conservation crop respected for its ability to overcome cotton root rot, decrease soil loss and runoff and improve soil productivity. Second was hairy vetch (10,819,067 pounds), a winter cover crop known as a veritable storehouse of soil nutrients.

The harvest of native and introduced grass seed and legume seed in Texas last year totaled more than 30 million pounds, the regional director said. "The 1950 seed harvest is a clear indicator that the Texas farmer and rancher is paying increased attention to the use of grasses and legumes as his best weapons in improving the soil and fighting soil and water waste," Merrill said.

## Quail Wings Give Commission Clues On Bird Habits

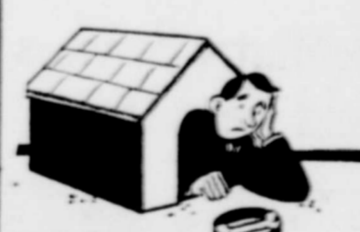
The Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission announced that 6,000 quail wings were sent into the Department's office in Austin by sportsmen during the past season. Hunters had been requested to aid in this study of quail populations in the various sections of the state.

Wildlife biologists from six regions in the state were called into Austin last week for the purpose of examining these wings. In classifying the wings they are broken down according to the sex of the bird. By studying the shape, coloration, and growth stages of the wing, it is possible to distinguish the adult bird from the young of the year.

Normally 75 to 85 per cent of the birds killed by hunters are less than one year old. Biologists consider a quail population to be in good condition when it is made up a high percentage of young birds. Each year brings a big turnover in the individual birds making up the current population. This information was developed as a result of wing studies.

Information on hunting success was also sent in by hunters, the Executive Secretary said. Heaviest wing returns and greatest hunting success for the amount of time spent in the field came from the Panhandle for lower plains. Better than normal range conditions during

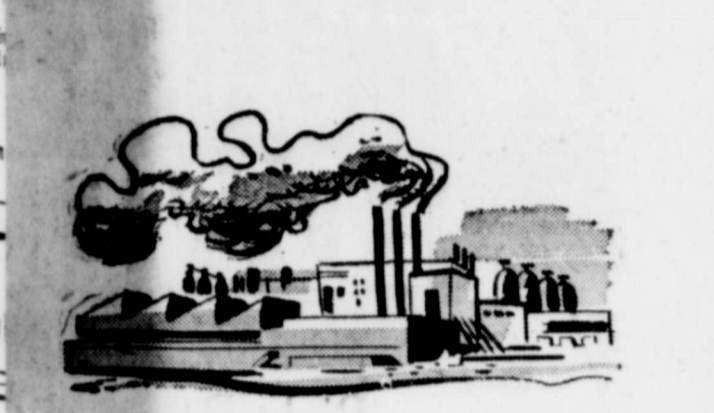

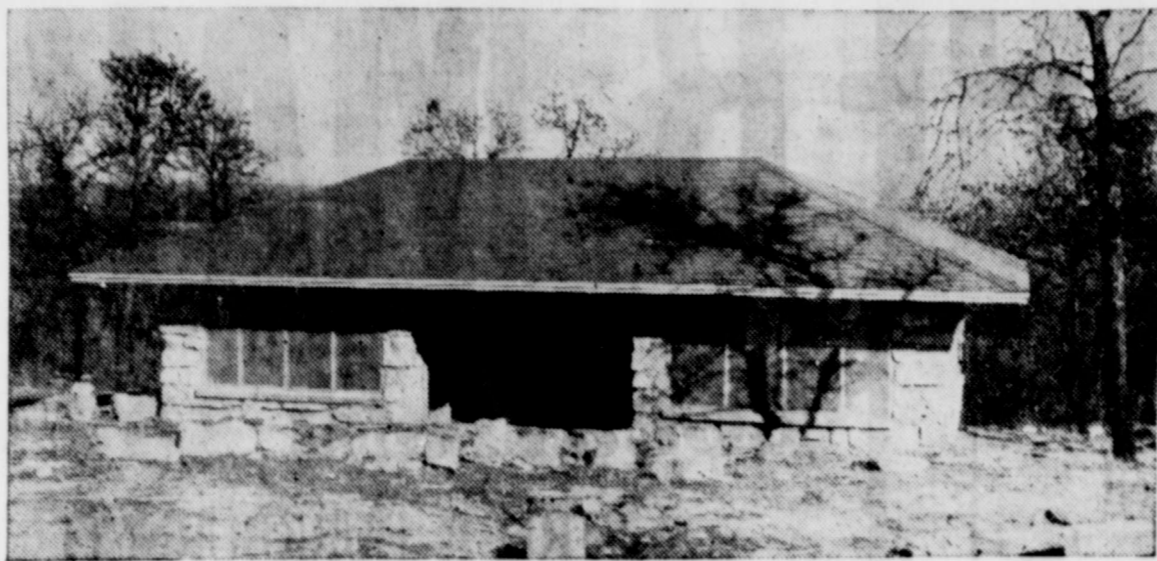

## First of New Stone Buildings Completed at Camp Letoli



Pictured above is the very first sleeping cabin built at the Camp Fire Girls Camp Letoli, 5 1-2 miles North of Saint Jo. This rock cabin, which will accommodate 10 girls and 2 counselors, is one of 10 cabins in the master plan for camp which includes an administration building, staff house, infirmary, sleeping cabins, and swimming pool. The cabins are built of white stone, measure 18x35 feet, and are being built at a cost of about \$1,600. The stone is being secured from an old building at Seymour, Texas, and hauled to the camp site by donations.

This cabin represents a true memorial to the girls because it was financed by the profits of a city-wide candy sale conducted by all the Camp Fire Girls and Blue Birds in Wichita Falls. Camp Letoli is the resident camp of the North Central Texas Area Council which includes Montague, Clay, Wichita, and Young Counties with headquarters in Wichita Falls.

Work on 4 more such cabins is now in progress. These cabins will be ready for use by the 1951 camping season which begins in June. All girls in North Texas—especially members of one of the three program divisions of Camp Fire—Camp Fire Girls, Blue Birds, and Horizon Clubbers—may attend camp for sessions of one week or more.

In addition to this construction work being done, a group of 50 volunteers—Camp Fire dads and friends from Wichita Falls, Saint Jo, Bowie and Nocona, gathered Sunday, February 3 for a "stag" day at Camp, and did much to clear out the underbrush, small trees, and brush around the camping area. Not only did these men find a comradeship there, but they also contributed much toward preparing an excellent camping site for younger girls.

About 15% of the camping attendance at Camp Letoli each year is made up of Camp Fire Girls and Blue Birds from Burkburnett.

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### WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By Congressman ED GOSSETT, District of Texas

Washington, D. C., Feb. 9th—The biggest legislative fight in the House this week is over the extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act. The former Secretary of Cordell Hull. It was enacted into law in 1940. The program has been extended from time to time since then, usually for 1 and 2 years. This week the House passed a bill extending the program for an additional 2 years.

The Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act authorizes the president, through the secretary of State, to negotiate trade agreements with foreign countries, raising or lowering duties almost as he pleases.

Our big argument in the House was over 2 amendments to this Act. One is known as the "peril-point amendment."

The other is known as the "escape-clause amendment." The peril-point amendment gives persons interested, a right to be heard before the Federal Tariff Commission on what they think duties should be prior to the negotiation of a trade treaty. The escape-clause amendment gives persons the right to be heard after agreements have been working for sometime. Neither amendment precludes the Administration's making or carrying out agreements. A part of my speech during debate on the peril-point amendment is as follows:

"Mr. Chairman, my good friend who has just spoken said that those who favor this amendment are enemies of the reciprocal trade agreements program. Such is not the case at all. I have always supported the reciprocal trade agreements program. I am for it. I am going to vote for it today, whether or not this amendment is adopted. But I do say that this is a reasonable, a fair, a democratic amendment, and that we ought to adopt it."

I recall when the President last addressed this Congress he said we should put the welfare of the country above partisan politics. We all agree to such a principle. The peril-point and the escape-clause amendments being offered to this bill are very much in the public interest. The peril-point amendment after all simply gives to industry and labor in this country a wailing wall, so to speak.

The Congress is being asked here to grant almost plenary power of life and death over American industry and American labor to the Secretary of State. I am not willing to entrust such power to any agency or department of Government. The American people are getting tired of this Congress frittering away its legislative duties and responsibilities. If you Members have been reading your mail lately, you know that we are being castigated because we do not do our duty and because we turn over to the sprawling executive branches of the Government vast responsibilities and power over the lives and property of the people.

There are two amendments to this bill which are going to be offered. I want to go on record as being in favor of both of them. One is the peril-point amendment and that is an amendment before the fact, if you please, to give industry and labor the right to go down to the Tariff Commission and say, "Here is a level below which we are going to be hurt." In the course of American jurisprudence and American justice has anybody ever been denied such a right—the right of petition, if you please.

The other is the escape clause amendment which is going to be offered by my friend, the gentleman from West Virginia, (Mr. Bailey) and I understand another by the gentleman from Nebraska (Mr. Curtis). That amendment gives the industries and labor organizations of the country the right to go in after the fact, when these agreements have been working for a while, and say, "Conditions have changed. Business has fallen off. The economic situation has changed, and we are entitled to some relief."

Who is there here who has the temerity to stand in the well of the House and say that American industry, American labor, and the American people are not entitled to both those rights? Have we come to a point in this country where we are willing to deliver to anybody, good, bad, or indifferent, plenary power of life and death over American industry and American labor? I still say we should take care of this country first. I do not think we can do it by high tariffs. Neither do I think we can do it by eliminating all protection and all restrictions which have been set up for the protection of the American standard of living. We all know, and we are proud of the fact that American labor has the highest standard of living of any labor in the entire world. We also know that American labor cannot compete with coolie labor in China and with the labor of many other parts of the world. So we simply say here through the peril-point provision that these people, our people who have contributed to the strength and security of this country, have the right to be heard."

Both amendments were adopted.

### Soil Conservation Delegates to Meet In Oklahoma City

Delegates to the fifth annual meeting of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, to be held in Oklahoma City, February 20 to 23 will have a chance to see two of Oklahoma's top attractions in soil conservation.

One of these points of interest is the Department of Agriculture's watershed flood control program on the Washita River where land treatment is being combined with engineering structures to keep rainfall on the land and slow down runoff.

A bus caravan will take convention delegates on a tour of the Mill Creek area near Sulphur to view a typical part of the watershed program on Friday, February 23rd. The visitors will see the land treatment measures which stabilize and improve the soil and increase its water-holding capacity, and the gully plugs, small detention reservoirs and other engineering devices which hold back a portion of the surplus water until streams can carry it safely.

Parts of the big Washita watershed already have shown in flood periods that the watershed treatment program will go far in lessening agricultural damages. The Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture is carrying on the upstream flood control program through the 15 soil conservation districts lying in the watershed.

The bus trippers also will stop at Hereford Heaven, the ranch operated by Oklahoma's former governor, Roy Turner.

Planes of Oklahoma Flying Farmers on the same day will take other delegates to the Wichita Wildlife Refuge near Lawton. Here the visitors will see herds of buffalo, elk, deer and longhorn cattle on native bluestem range against a rugged mountain background. A buffalo barbecue luncheon will be served by the Comanche Soil Conservation District board of supervisors at Lake Quanah Parker. The lake bears the name of the famous Comanche chief who lived in the area. On the trip the planes will fly over a portion of the Washita River flood control project.

The bluestem ranges on the Wichita Wildlife Refuge are believed to be the only remaining areas of native bluestems which have not been commercially grazed.

A. P. (Red) Atkins, president of the Oklahoma host supervisors association, announced final plans for the three-day Oklahoma City meeting are nearly complete. Speeches by Secretary Charles Brannan of the Department of Agriculture and Dr. H. H. Bennett, Soil Conservation Service chief, and a three-man panel discussion on the needs of Soil Conservation Districts are expected to be program high-lights.

On the panel will be Allen Kline, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation; Obed Wym, chairman of the program committee of the National Farmers Union, and Dorsey Kirk, master of the Illinois State Grange. President Waters S. Davis, Jr., of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts will serve as moderator.

A night of entertainment is being arranged for February 21. Indian dances, square dancing and a chorus from Oklahoma City University are among scheduled events.

Events being scheduled for wives in attendance include a tea at the Oklahoma City Country Club with Oklahoma's new first lady, Mrs. Johnson Murray, presiding.

Board members of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District who plan to attend the meeting are T. J. Pace and Arthur Rammung of Wichita County. It is probable that other delegates from the district who are interested in soil conservation will attend this meeting.
