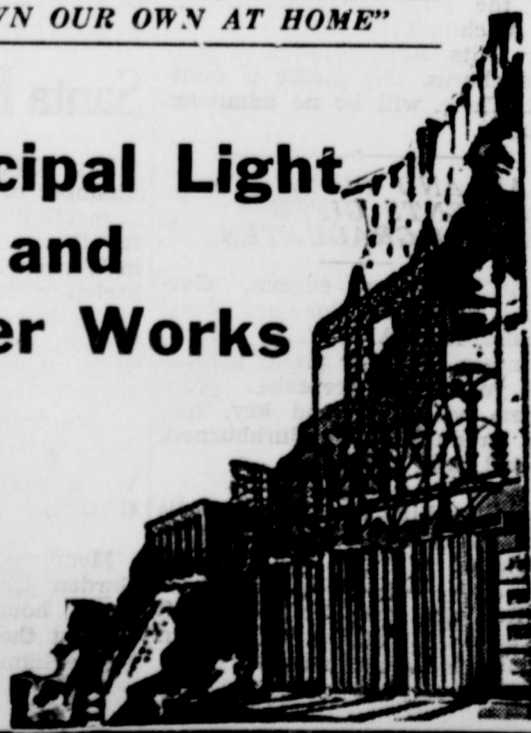

caped to Uruguay after a close brush with the Argentine police who were trying to arrest him.

The press of Argentina, with a single exception, is now wholly controlled by the government. There will be no dissenting voice, no matter what the dictator does.

Of all the safeguards which a people have against oppression, the free press is the most important. It is not a coincidence that a very dictator—communist, fascist or what have you—starts to muzzle the press as soon as he takes over the government. That is a matter of sheer necessity. For when men can speak and publish what they believe to be the truth, injustice cannot long flower. Truth is what all dictators fear the most.

The sentence from the Los Angeles Times editorial should be remembered by everyone: "No dictator can get along with an independent press."

Don't Look For That Spare Tire

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

Washington, D. C., April 13—As this is written two days have lapsed since our most decorated, most distinguished five-star General Douglas MacArthur was fired. To date I have received fifty-nine telegrams signed by two hundred and two persons, and eighteen letters on this subject. All letters, wires and telephone calls have been deeply critical of President Truman. Most of them demand the impeachment of Truman and the firing of Acheson.

No one has been more critical of the bungling of our foreign affairs than I. The Morgenthau Plan, the Teheran, Yalta and Potsdam conferences, our Palestine policy, and then Secretary Marshall's trip to China, were all major diplomatic tragedies, and sowed seeds of strife, confusion and conflict. Some or all of these were directly responsible for the Korean debacle in which we now find ourselves. It has been my contention that the pinks and the reds within this country, supported and sustained by organized, minority pressure groups of the same hue, have been principally responsible for both our major domestic and foreign difficulties. The tragedy has been that most of these groups have been aided and abetted by many well-meaning, high-minded American citizens; by intellectuals and humanitarians and others frantically seeking for a peace formula and for a way to avoid another world conflict—a strange coalition, some seeking to save and some to destroy our great country.

The President had the authority to fire General MacArthur. The proud, strong-willed General did much to force his hand. Those who grieve because of this crisis must remember and must uphold the sound American principle of civilian superiority over the military. To impeach the President is an impossible remedy. Article II, Section 4, of the Constitution states: "The President, Vice-President and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for a conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors."

Many of us strongly agree with MacArthur that Formosa must never be surrendered to the Reds and that UN membership must never be accorded to Red China. However, grave doubt exists even among many MacArthur supporters as to the wisdom of his policy of "an all out war on China." It is thought by many that an invasion of Manchuria or a transporting of Chiang's forces by us to the mainland of China would set off an all out war against China, if not an all out world war. We are told that many war lords within China are now fighting Mao who would fight with him against Chiang.

In all American top bracket leadership, civilian and military, MacArthur has stood out as a strong, positive character. Most Americans are grieved when a strong, positive character is liquidated by smaller, less positive ones. They feel that the negative has eliminated the positive. However, many of those who now acclaim MacArthur strongly condemn many of the things for which MacArthur stands. There are many inconsistent, incongruous elements in the present furor. The great

American tragedy is not the firing of MacArthur, but the absence of strong, positive American leadership in the State Department and in the Executive branch of the government. The

President had the authority to fire MacArthur and he cannot be impeached for it. His greatest mistake, however, was in venting his spleen so devastatingly against our Number One soldier. At least, MacArthur should have been left in full control of Japan. His administration of the Japanese Islands has been one of the bright spots in a dismal post-war world.

A lot of MacArthur scuttlebutt is heard around the Capitol these days. Congressman Rankin still reminds us that MacArthur served on the Courtmartial that cashiered General Billy Mitchell. Some still cuss him for leading an attack against the bonus marchers in 1932. Some claim that MacArthur was successful in the Hawaiian Conference with President Roosevelt and Admiral King in the early days of the war in having his way. Mr. Roosevelt and Admiral King are said to have insisted on by-passing the Philippines, but the General said no. He has not been as successful in dealing with Acheson and Truman.

I shall support a resolution to invite General MacArthur to address the Congress. All of us should know what he can tell us. We must all work and pray for an honest and honorable solution to the Korean debacle as well as some formula for peace.

The government has published a bulletin on "How to Treat a Black Eye." More useful would be one on how to explain it.

Subject to the limitations hereinafter set forth, there is hereby granted to Texas Electric Service Company, its successors, hereinafter called "the company," the right, privilege, license, until the last day of A. D. 2001, to locate, install and operate in and future streets, public places in the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," electric light and power lines with all the appurtenant underground conduits, towers, wires, poles and telegraph poles, and all other necessary equipment for the purpose of supplying to said City, the hereof, and persons, corporations beyond thereof, for light, heat and other purposes.

2. In consideration of the sum of \$100,000.00, hereinafter called "the franchise fee," the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," grants to the company, its successors, hereinafter called "the franchisee," the right to operate and maintain in and future streets, public places in the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," electric light and power lines with all the appurtenant underground conduits, towers, wires, poles and telegraph poles, and all other necessary equipment for the purpose of supplying to said City, the hereof, and persons, corporations beyond thereof, for light, heat and other purposes.

3. The franchise fee shall be paid to the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," in cash, in advance of the date of the execution of this ordinance, and shall be deposited in the City Treasury Department.

4. The franchise fee shall be paid to the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," in cash, in advance of the date of the execution of this ordinance, and shall be deposited in the City Treasury Department.

5. The franchise fee shall be paid to the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," in cash, in advance of the date of the execution of this ordinance, and shall be deposited in the City Treasury Department.

6. The franchise fee shall be paid to the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," in cash, in advance of the date of the execution of this ordinance, and shall be deposited in the City Treasury Department.

10. The franchise fee shall be paid to the City of Burk Burnett, hereinafter called "the City," in cash, in advance of the date of the execution of this ordinance, and shall be deposited in the City Treasury Department.

(d) After the election on the part of the City to acquire Grantee's property and business becomes effective, and pending determination and payment of purchase price, Grantee shall continue to make all additions to its facilities necessary to maintain adequate service to its customers, and shall complete all construction work under way at that time. The City shall pay to Grantee the cost price of all such additions to facilities and completed construction work.

(e) All of the books, records, documents, assets and properties of whatsoever nature kept or owned by Grantee shall be subject to examination by one or more of said Commissioners or their duly authorized agents and employees upon demand therefor.

(f) As the basis of their appraisal, the Commissioners shall make or have made a complete and reasonably detailed list and inventory of all of Grantee's properties, property rights and assets to be acquired. When the Commissioners have assessed the value of Grantee's property and business, they shall reduce their decision to writing, stating therein the total value of said property and business, the amount of severance damages, if any, the amounts of all liens and encumbrances against such property and business, and to whom payable, and all the costs which have accrued as a result of such hearing, the examination and investigation, and shall file it, together with a copy of the aforesaid list and inventory of Grantee's property rights and assets located in the City and all other papers connected with the matter, with the District Clerk of the District Court of Wichita County, Texas, and shall also deliver a copy thereof to the City of Burk Burnett and to Grantee. The decision of the Commissioners upon any matter shall be by a majority of said Commissioners.

(g) If either party, that is to say, Grantee or the City of Burk Burnett, be dissatisfied with the value placed upon the properties and business of Grantee, such party may, within twenty days after the same has been filed with the Clerk of the District Court, file its objection thereto in writing, setting forth the grounds of its objections; thereupon the adverse party shall be cited to appear therein, and the cause shall be tried and determined as in other civil causes in the District Court. If no objection to such valuation is filed within twenty days, such decision shall thereupon become binding upon both the City of Burk Burnett and Grantee, and the same may be enforced in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(h) If the value fixed for the property and business of Grantee by the court on appeal shall be the same or greater than the value fixed by the Commissioners, the cost of the proceedings upon appeal shall be assessed against the City. If the value of the property and business of Grantee shall be fixed by the Court on appeal at a less sum than fixed by the Commissioners, the costs of court on appeal shall be assessed against Grantee. If the value of the property and business of Grantee shall be fixed by the Court on appeal at the same sum as that fixed by the Commissioners, the court costs on appeal shall be assessed against the party appealing.

(i) Grantee shall retain the possession and use of its properties until a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction has been entered and until payment to Grantee of the value fixed thereby by said final judgment. Full payment of the value of property and business of Grantee shall be made or tendered in accordance with the final judgment of said court within six months from the date said judgment becomes final; provided, however, that if such full payment is not made or tendered within such six months period, then and in that event the City shall forfeit its right to acquire Grantee's properties until the expiration of the then current ten year period hereunder, and the City shall reimburse Grantee for all costs and expenses reasonably incurred by Grantee as a consequence of, or arising out of any such unconsummated acquisition proceedings.

(j) Upon receipt by it of the purchase price of its property and business, Grantee shall deliver to the City all books, records, maps, drawings, memoranda and other papers relating to the operation of its property and business in the City of Burk Burnett; provided, however, that Grantee shall not be required to deliver to the City any of such books, records, maps, drawings, memoranda or other papers as pertain, in whole or in part, to portions of Grantee's property and business located without the City.

SECTION 9 The right of termination on the part of the City of Burk Burnett to terminate this grant as herein provided and to acquire the properties of grantee as herein provided shall be an exclusive remedy, and the City of Burk Burnett shall not engage in the construction or operation of an electric light and power plant for the purpose of serving said City and the inhabitants thereof until and unless it exercises the right of termination and of acquisition as herein provided.

SECTION 10 Nothing in this franchise contract shall be construed to limit or abate the exercise of judicial power in adjudging the adequate compensation to be paid for the property and business of Grantee or to limit the courts of this State in their determination of the elements of value, the weight to be given thereto, or the consequential damage which shall be included as adequate compensation for the property and business of Grantee sought to be acquired in the manner herein provided.

SECTION 11 This grant shall not become effective unless and until Grantee shall file its written acceptance thereof within thirty (30) days from the passage and approval. In the event that this franchise is rejected at the polls by a referendum vote of the electors of the City of Burk Burnett, the franchise heretofore granted to W. H. PAINTER and his assigns on the 19th day of April, 1915, and which is now owned by Grantee, shall remain in full force and effect, and shall not be deemed to have been repealed, rescinded, surrendered or in any wise modified because of the prior enactment or acceptance of this ordinance.

SECTION 12 In passing this ordinance the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burk Burnett finds that all of the conditions precedent to its adoption and passage as provided in the Charter of the City of Burk Burnett have been complied with.

SECTION 13 If any provision hereof or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, the remainder hereof and the application of such provisions to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby; and provided further that if any part of this ordinance is hereafter declared to be invalid, or if any section of the City Charter of the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, upon which such part or parts is predicated is declared to be invalid, then and in such event and notwithstanding the acceptance hereof by Grantee, and notwithstanding any other provision herein contained, such part or parts or section or sections shall not thereafter be binding upon Grantee.

SECTION 14 All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

**EXHIBIT I
CONTRACT**

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF WICHITA

THIS CONTRACT AND AGREEMENT made this 2nd day of April, A. D. 1951, by and between the City of Burk Burnett, Texas, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called "City," and Texas Electric Service Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Texas, hereinafter called "Company."

WITNESSETH:
WHEREAS, City owns and operates an electric generating plant and distribution system within the territorial limits of City; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed best for the financial interest of the City and its inhabitants to lease said property to Company for a period of six (6) years and to give and grant to Company an option to purchase said facilities at the end of said lease period, and to give and grant to Company a franchise to operate said facilities within said City in the event it elects to exercise said option;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed between the parties hereto as follows:

1. City demises and leases to company its electric generating plant and its electric distribution system and street lighting equipment as described and set out in Exhibit 1 attached hereto and made a part hereof for a period of six (6) years. Company agrees to purchase from City at the time of the beginning of said lease all materials and supplies on hand at cost price to City. In event Company does not elect to purchase said property as hereinafter provided, company agrees to sell City all materials and supplies on hand at Burk Burnett at the end of the lease period at cost to Company.

2. Company agrees to pay City annually in advance the following sums as rental for such facilities: The first year \$40,000.00; the second year \$41,000.00; the third year \$42,000.00; the fourth year \$43,000.00; the fifth year \$44,000.00; the sixth year \$45,000.00. City agrees that Company may remove any of said properties, may add to and make additions to any of said properties, and may operate said properties during the term of this lease in conformity with standard practices and custom and in any way which Company may deem necessary and proper to furnish an adequate and continuous electric service to City and its inhabitants. Company agrees to operate and maintain said property and facilities and upon the expiration of the term of this lease to return said property, or its equivalent in kind and value, to City in the same condition as the same were in upon the date of the beginning of said lease, reasonable wear, tear and deterioration excepted.

3. Within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this lease, Company will cause an inventory of said properties to be prepared by engineers acceptable to City, and said inventory and map will be evidence of the nature, the condition and the location of said leased properties and shall be conclusive in connection with the return of said property and facilities to City at the termination of this lease. Copies of said inventory and said map shall be delivered to City upon completion.

4. In further consideration of the payment of \$5,000.00 in cash, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, City gives and grants to Company an option to purchase said properties at the end of said lease period by the payment of \$200,000.00 in cash to City. In the event of the exercise of said option, said payment shall be applied on the purchase price. In the event Company does not exercise said option, said payment shall be returned by City. Notice on the part of Company to exercise said option shall be given City in writing on or before six (6) months prior to the expiration of said lease period. In the event Company does not elect to exercise said option within the prescribed time, Company agrees to pay City the sum of \$20,000.00 in full payment for City's expense in re-attaching customers to its lines. During the existence of this lease City covenants that it will not authorize or suffer the placing of any lien or encumbrance of any nature upon the properties hereby leased. In the event Company does not exercise its right to purchase said properties, and City is unable by reason of lack of generating capacity to supply its customers, Company agrees during such emergency for a period of not more than one (1) year to sell the City its requirements of electric power and energy at the Company's rate in effect at the

time for such character of service. In this connection City agrees to utilize to the fullest extent possible its own generating facilities.

In the event Company does exercise its right to purchase said property as herein provided, City agrees to convey the same to Company by proper instrument of conveyance free and clear of any and all liens or encumbrances of every nature and character.

In further consideration of the premises City agrees in the event Company exercises its option to purchase said facilities that it will not engage directly or indirectly in the operation of an electric light and power distribution or transmission system within said City for a period of not less than ten (10) years from and after the date of the termination of this lease.

5. City agrees to give and grant to Company a franchise for a period of fifty (50) years in the form attached hereto and marked Exhibit 3 for identification. In the event Company does not elect to purchase said properties, said fifty-year franchise shall be of no further force and effect and Company shall have only such rights as are set out in its present existing franchise.

6. Company agrees that during the period of its operation of said facilities under said lease and thereafter, it will place in effect its regular rates and charges which are charged to cities and towns similarly situated. In this connection City agrees to repeal Ordinance No. 184 from and after the date of the approval of this contract as hereinafter provided (Minimum Rate Ordinance).

7. In the event any dispute arises between City and Company with reference to any of the provisions hereof, the same shall be settled by arbitration. City shall select one arbitrator and Company shall select another and the two thus selected shall select a third arbitrator. In the event the representatives of City and Company can not agree upon the selection of a third arbitrator, then the then Judge of the District Court of Wichita County, Texas 30 Judicial District, shall appoint said third arbitrator.

Within a period of ten (10) days after the selection of said Board of Arbitration the matters in dispute shall be submitted to said Board, and within thirty (30) days thereafter said Board of Arbitration shall hand down its decision with respect thereto and the decision of a majority of said Board shall be binding upon both City and Company.

8. This contract and agreement is expressly subject to the approval of the qualified voters of City at an election called for that purpose, said approval to be evidenced by a majority of those voting at said election. Said election shall be called within thirty (30) days after the execution of this instrument by City and Company. Said approval shall include not only the approval of this lease contract but also the right and authority of the City to give the option herein provided for and to consummate the sale of said properties and facilities in the event Company elects to exercise such right, and shall approve the granting of a franchise to the Company as herein provided. The expense of such election shall be borne by Company.

It is the intention of the parties hereto to fully and in all respects comply with the provisions of Section 2 of Article IIIA, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas. In the event this contract is approved no further action with respect to the conveyance of said properties to Company in the event it exercises its option shall be deemed to be necessary, except the execution of deeds to the real property.

Shall We Sell Burk Burnett's Future Down The River?

Our good citizen, W. A. Roberts, should be complimented on his article, "A Community Debauch," which appeared in the Burk Burnett Star, October 24th (1940).
Within the past five years Burk Burnett has suffered the loss of many valuable citizens—men who have been largely responsible, through their wealth and community loyalty for the fine worthwhile things we, as a community, now enjoy.
It was through the influence and wealth of such men as J. G. Hardin, I. E. Harwell, and J. R. Chatam that the Baptist, Methodist and Christian church buildings were made possible as permanent places in which the membership can worship. Today these fine buildings stand in our community as monuments to a life which has passed on—a life filled with an undying loyalty to a community where he lived for many years and accumulated a huge fortune only to be passed on to the people of this community and generations yet to come.

The bonded indebtedness of our school district was discharged in full upon the death of the late John G. Hardin, and today our community should be proud of the two fine school buildings left by him. These buildings will be enjoyed by our children and our children's children.

Yes, there is another monument standing in our little community made possible by Mr. Hardin and dedicated to the future generations of this city—it is the "Hardin Municipal Light Plant." The revenue from the plant will, forever, assure us a community far better than the average of this size. We, the people of this community, are its keepers; and Mr. Hardin intended that it be protected and operated for the benefit of the good people of this city. We shall protect and preserve these monuments for the benefit of those who will still be here after we have met him on the other side. When that time comes, may we be able to tell him that the task entrusted to us has been carried out according to his wishes.

There is an outside interest that has never been in favor of the Municipal Light Plant, and that interest is continuously looking forward to an opportune time when the light plant can be destroyed. As long as Mr. Hardin lived little effort was made to bring about this accomplishment; but now that he is gone, an organized effort, disguised in the robe of a few local men, is working daily in our community. In order to bring about the desired accomplishment, it is, of course necessary to elect a majority on our city council who would be in favor of destroying our light plant. To do this one thing it is necessary to do some other things first which would be a stepping-stone to the one and only accomplishment in mind.

These local agents are throwing up smoke screens which they hope to hide behind while bringing about the much desired and coveted fatal blow. These agents are right now working to agitate and divide our community which has stood united for years. May it continue to be that way!

These smoke screens are thrown about us in the form of petitions. The one just recently circulated was to change the chief of police from an appointive to an elective office. May I ask what is wrong with our police department as it is being operated today?

I am going to predict that the next petition offered to you will be to change our city from a manager to a mayor form of government. With a mayor form of government, no one is particularly on full-time duty; and it would then be a very easy matter to bring about inefficiency in the operation of our light plant. It would be much easier then to sell our Municipal Light Plant "down the river" to outside interests.

It is to be regretted that these agents have undertaken to divide our community. In so doing they have been unscrupulous in their tactics. They have carried this fight not only to our street corners, but into our local churches; and some of our churches have become a clearing house to further these local agitators' own mercenary motives.

Some of those who are constantly stirring up the minds of our good people have been, in the past, just "fair weather birds". When the going was tough, they closed up their doors and ducked out of the lime light only to spring up again when it might appear that the opportune time had come to again "feather their nests".

I still believe that the majority of the citizens of this community are interested in the future welfare of Burk Burnett, and I do not believe that they would sell their community loyalty for a "mess of pottage."

I do not believe that this town is headed for destruction. I do not believe that any man, or group of men, can destroy the good that has been builded over a period of years.

Volunteers Are Encouraged to Enlist Before May 1

SFC. Boyd L. Sullivan of the Wichita Falls Recruiting Station today advised men contemplating enlistment to act before May, to insure obtaining their choice of service. He based his statement upon information released this week by the Defense Department in Washington which will restrict volunteers in their selection.

Though stating that he had not received official notice of the new plan, Sgt. Sullivan pointed out that it will not be effective until May 1st and the recruiting service can still enlist men under present regulations. "The volunteer can still select from several different enlistment programs," he said. "These include: the Regular Army, the Air Force, the Airborne, and the Far East Command; or, for high school graduates, a choice can be made of any of 23 Army Technical Schools. Qualified men are also being sought for Army Officer Candidate School attendance," he added.

"The Air Force volunteer undergoes aptitude testing at Lackland Air Force Base and is assigned to duties commensurate with his abilities and desires. Men with previous service may qualify for a non-commissioned grade in the Air Force providing they have sufficient technical or educational background," he concluded.

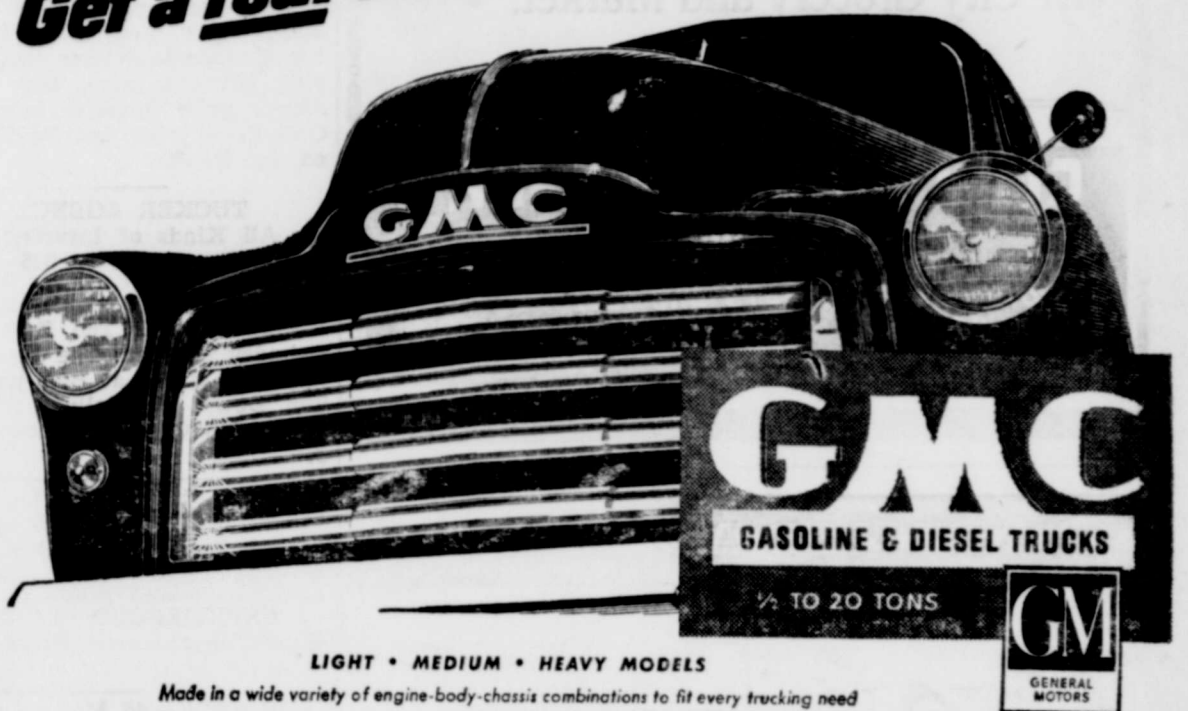

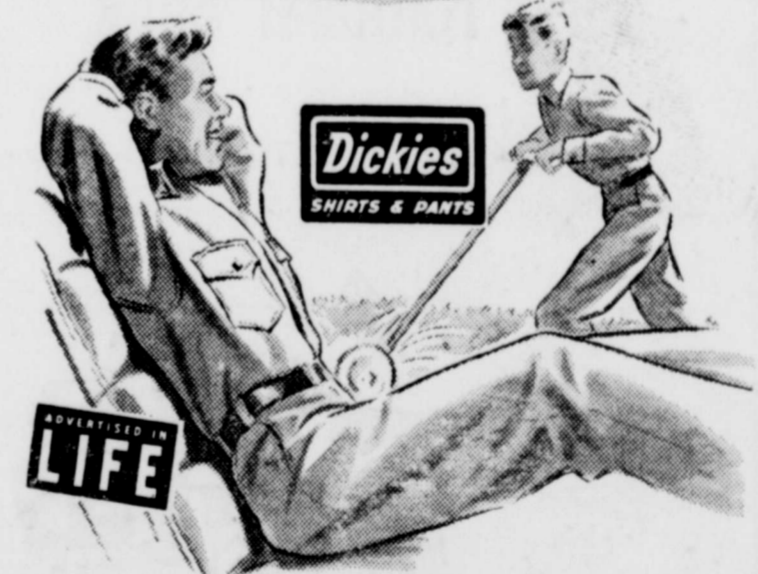
