In Fairness To All

In order to properly inform the people that did not attend the Mass Meeting, Monday night, April 16th; and in order to carry out the City Council's assertions that they intended to present the facts fairly and impartially to the people that do not favor the sale of the light plant and to the people that are in favor of the sale of the light plant, the Council felt that there were a sufficient number of citizens that thought the price offered of \$455,000.00 for the plant to justify the calling of the election as the price seemed to the Council to be a good offer in lieu of the fact that the people would no doubt have to be called upon to vote a minimum of \$200,000 to replace distribution lines and purchase another engine that would take 20 years at \$10,000 per year to repay, plus an additional \$90,000 to pay interest on the new bond issue, whereas, the sale price would permit the full payment of the present bond indebtedness with approximately \$200,000 left over at the end of six years and a saving of interest of over \$100,000 on present bonds.

Contrary to an article in last week's Star to the effect that no information was given by the Council as to the profits of the light plant, and that the Council refused to give information, people that were present are well aware that printed statements were passed out that were taken from annual audits, to all present, showing a profit of \$18,075 on a six year average, and a statement was read and was available for inspection on the operation of other city departments, showing a need to use not over \$10,000 each year of the rental money for general government operation, leaving the balance to retire bonds, and when the statement was made by someone that the light plant statement was not correct, the Council offered to go over the items charged to the light plant for any year or number of years with any individual or any group, and no one present seemed interested in doing this, which would give uncontestable information if charges to the light plant operation had been made that justly belonged to some other departments.

The present average operating profit would repay the \$200,000 improvement need and service the debt on 20 year repayment and we would still own the plant, provided no extra ordinary breakdown occurs, or no large replacements or extensions are required. In such an event, it is believed that additional financing would be necessary unless a material gain is made through operations.

It is the duty of all of us to vote for what we believe to be the best interest of Burkburnett and to forget personalities. Your neighbors, friends and acquaintances all have an inherent right to their views and opinions of any election.

Who Is Qualified Voter In Coming City Election?

Honorable Mayor and City Councilmen, City of Burkburnett, Burkburnett, Texas.

Gentlemen: You asked for a commitment on our part as to street lighting and water pumping service for Burkburnett. We attach hereto a contract in the form used with all of our cities, covering street lighting and water pumping services.

For street lighting you would pay two cents per kilowatt hour, we to install the equipment and such extensions as are necessary, and maintain the equipment, including the renewal of the lamps.

For Town Hall, City Hall and all services other than pumping, the rate would be two cents per kilowatt hour.

For water pumping and sewage disposal, based on your estimate of consumption, you would pay one cent per kilowatt hour for your services.

You will note that the contract is executed on our part, and becomes effective upon favorable vote by the people of all three proposals on the April 27th ballot and upon your proper authorization and signature and return to us.

Facts

Here are some questions and answers which bring out important facts about the April 27th election:

Q. What questions are to be voted upon April 27 in connection with the Light Plant Proposal?

A. There are three things to vote on. (1) For or Against approval of the contract. (2) For or Against approving an option to Texas Electric Service Company to purchase the plant. (3) For or Against approval of an operating franchise to the Company.

Q. Is it necessary for all three to be approved by a majority of those voting if the proposition is to be carried through?

A. Yes. Defeat of any one of the items would eliminate the entire plan.

Q. Does this mean that if the voter wants Burkburnett to get the benefit of this proposal, he must vote "for" on all three of the items?

A. Yes. Q. How much will the lease payments be during the six year period?

A. A total of \$255,000. (1st yr., \$40,000; 2nd year, \$41,000; 3rd year, \$42,000; 4th year, \$43,000; 5th year, \$44,000, and 6th year, \$45,000.

Q. If the voters approve the proposal on all three items and when the Company completes the purchase, how much money will the city receive in the next six years?

A. A total of \$455,000 (\$255,000 lease payments and \$200,000 purchase price).

Q. Will the city receive any other revenue from the company?

A. Yes. Street and alley rental payments of the company will more than double, or bring the total annual payments to more than \$2,000. Ownership of the light plant by the company will result in increased ad valorem tax payments by the company to the city, Burkburnett Independent School District and Wichita County.

Q. If the people vote "for" on April 27, what does the city intend to do with the money it receives?

A. Improve our water and sewer systems, improve our streets and retire the city's debt, which at present handicaps Burkburnett's growth and development.

Q. What would happen to the \$45,000 water bond issue voted recently?

A. It would not be necessary for us to issue and sell these bonds. We could go ahead with the improvements without adding to our city's debt.

Q. What would this mean to the individual resident of Burkburnett?

A. A saving in monthly water bills since we cannot escape higher bills if we must issue the bonds and pay interest in order to develop the water system.

Who Is Qualified Voter In Coming City Election?

You do not have to be a property owner, or property tax paying citizen to vote in the election Friday.

If you have your poll tax receipt, or exemption; if you have lived in the City and State long enough you may vote. Any qualified voter is eligible.

Council Can't Give Exclusive Utility Franchise

To clear up a question in the minds of some: The City Council cannot give an exclusive franchise to any utilities. Regardless of how the election goes Friday, the same would hold true. At present the franchise of Texas Electric Service Company expires in April, 1965. If the election carries, approving the sale and franchise, the date of expiration of the new franchise would be 2,001. If the election does not carry, the present expiration, or April, 1965 would still be in effect.

The City of Burkburnett now receives 2% of the gross of the Texas Electric Service Company in this city, and in the event the election carries, it would still get the 2% of the gross, what ever it is, so long as they operate here. This 2% is a tax for use of alleyways and streets.

The Burkburnett City Commission will continue to regulate rates under rights granted by State Law. Rate changes proposed by the company would be submitted to the Commission for approval—or disapproval.

May Is Jury Service Month In Texas

In olden times in the Orient, a person suspected of a crime was given rice to chew, then directed to spit it out. If the rice came out dry, this fact was considered positive proof that a crime had been committed. The theory was that fear of detection tends to inhibit the natural flow of the salivary glands.

Justice as we know it today is on a much sounder basis than the rice chewing test. Our trial by jury system is the insurance we have against the fear of losing our lives or property without just reason.

The fact that we prefer a country with the advantage of free speech, free press, freedom of religion, and trial by jury has been evidenced again and again in the wars we have fought to preserve these rights.

We are willing to fight on the battlefield for our freedom and for our liberties, but our indifference, carelessness and laziness toward the use of our individual rights indicate that we are unwilling to live for them day by day. At least that is what one would think judging from the results of a survey just completed by the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas. That survey revealed that 23% of the citizens summoned for jury service in Texas begged to be excused.

Did these persons actually feel that the parties involved were not entitled to a fair trial by an impartial jury? Or did they just fail to realize the responsibility that rests upon a citizen to accept jury service as a citizen's duty in helping to maintain law and order and fairness and justice? We are inclined to believe that the latter is true, and heartily endorse the campaign of the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Press Association in designating MAY or JURY SERVICE MONTH—by asking every TEXAN to render willing jury service when called upon—that justice may be preserved.

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

Washington, D. C., April 20—This has been MacArthur week in the Nation's Capital. Since serving in the Congress, it has been my privilege to hear a number of distinguished persons address joint sessions of the House and Senate. There was Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, speaking on the occasion of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the Supreme Court. Then came the Honorable Winston Churchill in the early days of the war. Later, Madame Chiang Kai-shek spoke brilliantly in behalf of the Chinese people. Following the war, General Eisenhower addressed the Congress and the top military and executive leaders of the country from the rostrum of the House of Representatives. Now we have had General MacArthur. The General lived up to his reputation as a brilliant and gifted speaker. He perhaps elicited more rapt attention than did any of the others to whom reference has been made. Certainly more emotion was aroused and more tears shed as a result of MacArthur's report than on any of these other notable occasions in our historic Chamber. Even those who might be classed as hostile to MacArthur were compelled to admit that he did a good job. Were he 15 years younger, he would doubtless acquire, the presidency itself. However, even a majority of his friends hope that he meant what he said in San Francisco; that he had no political ambitions. He appeared to me to be a very tired, and a very old man.

MacArthur made one sensational statement which will be bitterly explored and bitterly debated in the days immediately ahead. His statement that the Joint Chiefs of Staff agreed with his views on military policy in the Far East shocked and startled official Washington. Most of

of us believe that MacArthur told the truth. Many believe, however, that the Joint Chiefs of Staff will squirm off of the spot on which MacArthur's statement places them. Indeed, many high ranking officers seem to be Charlie McCarthys for their political bosses. Perhaps they fear being fired, as was Admiral Denfeld, and now General MacArthur.

I recall when General Omar Bradley was Chief of the Veterans Administration immediately following the war. A Committee on which I served was conducting hearings on H. R. 2202, known as the "Guaranteed Full Employment Bill." Secretary Henry Wallace came before the Committee in behalf of the bill, predicting that 8-million men would be unemployed within a few months, and insisting that the government must guarantee every citizen a job. General Bradley followed to testify in favor of the bill. He testified for this socialistic legislation, although at heart he was bitterly opposed to it. Secretary of Defense, General George C. Marshall, is generally conceded to have been a great Chief of Staff of the Army during World War II. Still, when he became Secretary of State, and now Secretary of Defense, he appears to lend his name and prestige to causes in which he does not believe. I recall his coming before the Judiciary Committee in behalf of the DP Bill while he was Secretary of State. He obviously knew little of the implications of this legislation, and yet he professed to support it wholeheartedly. The General has taken the credit, or the blame, for electing Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg to be Assistant Secretary of Defense in Charge of Manpower. In my humble opinion, this was not his idea at all.

Incidentally, members of the Armed Services Committee of the House tell me that Secretary of Defense Marshall has been of little help to them since he assumed that post. He has refused to answer or to discuss most of the questions propounded to him, but instead has turned the job over to others. One would be disappointed in

the American people if they did not become alarmed, and if they did not ask pointed questions, when they observe vacillation and duplicity in the conduct of high political figures. There was never a time in our history when our nation was more badly in need of strong, intelligent, courageous, top bracket leadership than now. Perhaps an all-wise, all-merciful Providence will help us to muddle through, but muddling is nothing of which any of us should be proud.

This week my Sub-committee of the Judiciary Committee of the House has again been conducting hearings on the so-called Lodge-Gossett Amendment, an amendment to abolish the Electoral College, and to reform the method through which we elect presidents. Twenty-seven senators have joined Senator Lodge in introducing this same resolution in the Senate. In the last session the Senate passed this resolution by a vote of 64 to 27. That was the all-time high mark in a hundred years of effort to do something about the cumbersome, undemocratic machinery through which we elect the most important official in the world. The sooner this reform is made, the better it will be for our country.

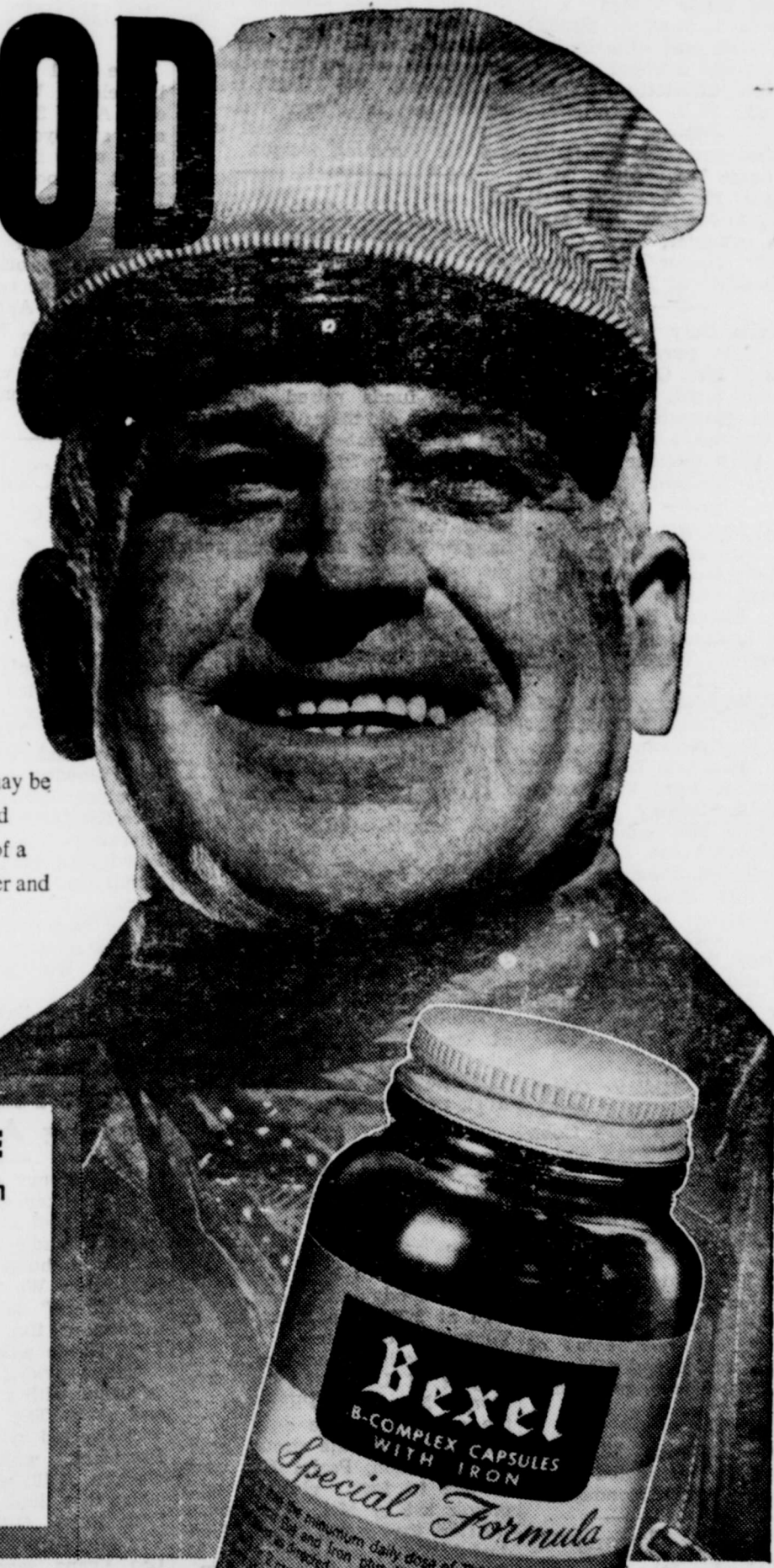

What would you have done with the four ton carcass of an elephant laying right in the middle of the highway?
Authorities near Abilene recently were faced with such a problem. And they did the simplest and most efficient thing to cope with such a situation.
A telephone call to Central Hide & Rendering Company was all that was necessary.
Workers came with a winch cable and moved the 8,000 pound body of Taffy, the circus elephant, to the Abilene rendering plant.
Taffy, who was 85 years old, was owned by the Heart of Texas Carnival. She died when she jumped from her truck into U. S. Highway 80 three miles West of Abilene. The beloved animal, who has thrilled millions of youngsters and older people as well, was mortally wounded when she fell from the tractor-trailer truck.
Taffy's trainer, R. J. Kileen and state highway patrolmen tried for three and a half hours to move the huge carcass from the pavement. But it wasn't until a Central Hide & Rendering truck arrived that the animal was finally moved.
The elephant's body was given to the rendering company and carted to its plant at Caps, Texas. The body was too large to put inside the company's building, so workers had to chop it up with axes.
"That's the only way we could do it," Maurice Mercer, the local manager, commented. "We didn't have knives that sharp."
The removal of Taffy's body is an exaggerated example of the Central Hide & Rendering Company's slogan, "We remove any carcass when you're through with it."

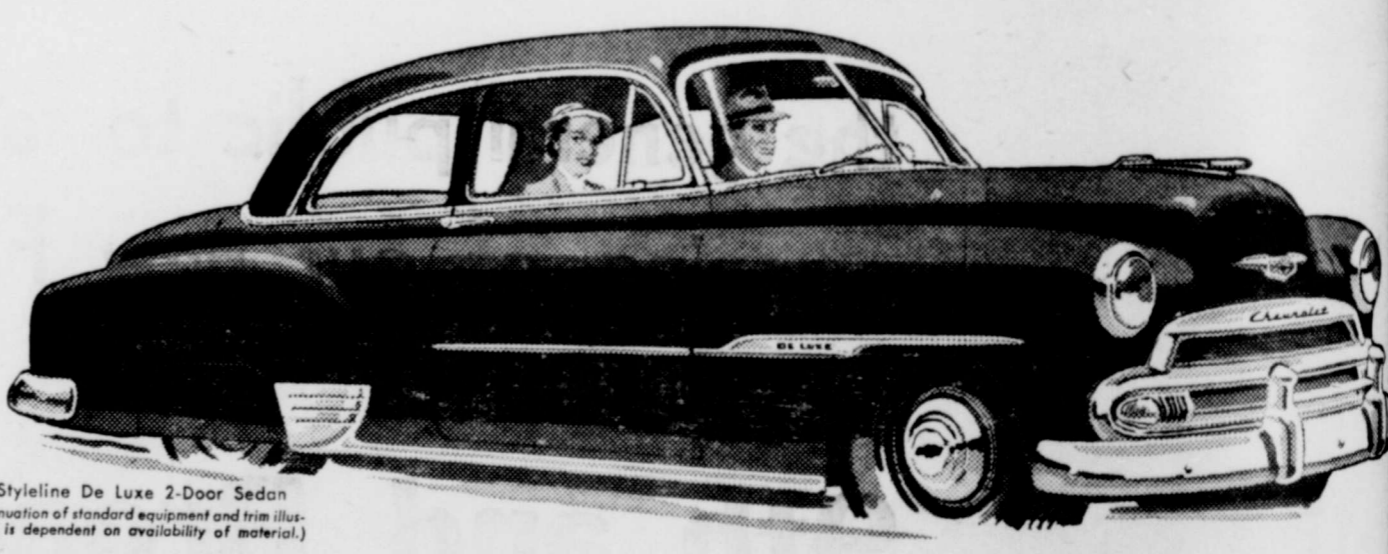

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HOME OWNERS QUESTION

Q—How can I remove stain from a carpet?
A—Sponging with a solution of water and ammonia will remove the stain.

Q—The living room of my home has paneled walls. How can I remove the wood veneer?
A—Sponging with a solution of water and ammonia will remove the veneer. After cleaning and what remains of the veneer is removed, it requires a fresh coat of paint.

Q—Any hardwood floor is easily cleaned and polished. First, clean the surface with a slightly moist cloth. Then dip a mop in tepid water and wring it out. Next, apply a standard wax, either in paste, with a soft cloth, in the direction of the grain. Bring out the full beauty of the wood. Cleaning and waxing a year should be sufficient. Ban areas and may be less frequently in rooms. Other than this, hardwood requires only an occasional cleaning with a dust cloth.

Q—What can be done to remove an odor from a room?
A—Good results are usually obtained by using powdered charcoal. It can be purchased in perforated containers which are expressly for this purpose.
