Don Short, local Attorney, was the unanimous choice for City Attorney.



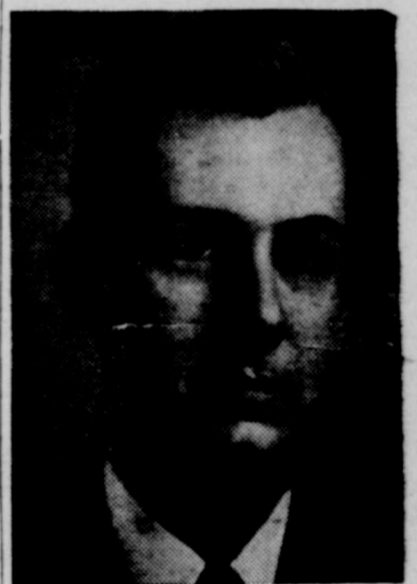

Voters Turn Down Sale of Light Plant Almost Two to One in Election Friday

In one of the largest votes ever recorded in a City election, Burkburnett people turned down a proposal to lease and sell the Municipal Light Plant to Texas Electric Service Company. A total of 528 people voted during the day. The voting was steady, with some one in the balloting office almost every five minutes.

The ballot was in three parts. Section 1, which was for or against approving a contract dated April 2, 1951, between the City of Burkburnett and the Texas Electric Service Company, drew 341 votes against and 174 for.

Section 2, for or against giving the company option to purchase the electric generating plant and distribution system belonging to the city at the end of a six year lease, brought 345 negative votes and 173 for.

Section 3, for or against the approval of the franchise granted to the company, brought 346 votes in rejection, 174 in approval.

The issue, which has overshadowed other activities here for the past month, arose April 2 when the City Council entered into the contract with the company and then presented it to the people for acceptance or rejection.

"FRIGHTENED BY WASHINGTON"

A Wall Street Journal editorial tells of a friend of the Editor who recently bought a new furnace. He didn't need it now—the old one would have lasted through the winter and possibly the next. Also, he had to borrow the money. So he was asked why he didn't postpone the purchase. The paper reports: "He said he was frightened by the Government. For all he knows, when the normal replacement time comes he may find that the only way he could get a furnace would be to apply to a National Furnace Administration, fill out a million forms and wait six months for an okay from some bureaucrat. Meanwhile, he'd freeze."

"So he's buying something he doesn't need to buy today but will need to buy someday, adding to his own burdens and also, in a small way, to total consumer demand. And he's doing all this because Washington has scared him into doing it . . ."

"If Washington wanted more shortages as an excuse for more controls, it could hardly do better than it is doing."

The hard fact is that, while Washington has been weeping crocodile tears over inflation and scarcities, it has been pursuing policies which make more inflation and more scarcities inevitable. All the controls ever imagined by man will be ineffective if people lose faith in the integrity and actions of their government—and if their government keeps on spending their money like a drunken sailor for non-essential things. It is all very well to talk about national unity, but unity must be earned, not just requested. It's time our government quit frightening us.

INDUSTRY DESERVES PRAISE

Last week was Texas Industrial Week, proclaimed by governor and legislature, and a week we are glad to note in these columns. "Weeks" are usually just so much balderdash, but we agree in this case that we all need to reflect more on the importance of industry to our daily lives.

Industry in Texas and elsewhere in the U. S. stands with agriculture and production of natural resources as a source of wealth as a state. Industry is growing in Texas, bringing with it the many advantages of added payrolls in areas formerly reserved for wildlife and open

prairies. We can think of dozens of other ways industry has benefitted us in Texas, and so thinking, we can hope and try to assure that our industry under the free enterprise system—that has spawned it—shall continue and continue to grow.

The tax problems facing our legislature now have a very real bearing on the future of Texas, and the way our legislators solve these problems will determine to a large extent whether or not industries continue to come to Texas. The natural resources and the labor are here, and we should keep the "welcome" mat out for industries.

Gov. Allen Shivers has been quoted as having what we believe is a very sound idea about spreading the tax load over all present tax sources. There is no question that Texas needs more funds if it is to continue rendering the services it now is rendering or to increase those services. We prefer a tax plan that would raise taxes fairly and equitably over all present tax sources rather than make one source bear the entire burden of whatever tax increase may be necessary.

There are and have been dozens of ideas in Austin on how to get the money needed in order for the state to continue its services . . .

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., April 27—This week I had to fly to Galveston to keep a long-standing appointment to address the State Convention of Lumbermen's Association of Texas. On the way back, I sat next to a distinguished old gentleman who has been one of our aviation experts for 35 years. He was a close friend of General Billy Mitchell, who was court-martialed and cashiered out of the Army in the early 30's. He told me he was sitting by the Colonel's (Billy Mitchell was promoted to General by act of Congress years after his death) bedside about a week before his death in 1936. The Colonel stated that he wished he could stay around for the real war, saying that World War I had only been a prelude, and that World War II was soon to come. A second interesting comment from the dying Colonel Mitchell was that he wished that he knew how General Douglas MacArthur had voted on the military court that had tried him. Report now has it that General MacArthur voted to acquit Colonel Billy Mitchell. However, General MacArthur obviously has never revealed how he voted.

Congressman Herlong, of Florida, has just placed in the Congressional Record an address by Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds, President of John B. Stetson University. In this speech, Dr. Edmunds quotes from the distinguished British analyst, writer and commentator, Lord Macaulay. Lord Macaulay was very distrustful of American democracy. Writing more than a hundred years ago, he declared that one of two things would happen: (1) Either "some Caesar or Napoleon will seize the reins of government with a strong hand" or (2) "your Republic will be as fearfully plundered . . . by barbarians of the twentieth century as the Roman Empire was in the fifth; with this difference . . . the Huns and Vandals who ravished the Roman Empire came from without . . . Your Huns and Vandals will have engendered within your own institutions."

Perhaps Congressmen should not dig up these dire predictions. Perhaps we should be optimists and should seek to allay the fears and apprehensions of our countrymen. Assuming momentarily such a rule, let us repeat some history used several years ago on the subject of optimism.

In 1800, Archbishop Wilberforce said, "I dare not marry. The future is so dark and unsettled." In 1837 Queen Adelaide of England stated, "I have only one desire—to play the role of Marie Antoinette with bravery in the coming revolution." Then in 1849 the great Prime Minister of Britain, Disraeli, declared, "In industry, commerce, and agriculture there is no hope." In 1851, just before

his death, the Duke of Wellington remarked, "I thank God I will be spared from the consummation of ruin that is gathering around." And in 1875 another great Prime Minister, William Pitt, said, "There is scarcely anything around us but ruin

and despair."

In Harper's Weekly in October, 1857, there appeared the following: "It is a gloomy moment in history. Not for many years—not in the lifetime of most men who read this paper—has there been so much grave and deep apprehension; never has the future seemed so incalculable as at this time."

"In France the political cal-dron seethes and bubbles with uncertainty; Russia hangs as usual, like a cloud, dark and silent upon the horizon of Europe; while all the energies, re-sources and influences of the British Empire are sorely tried, and are yet to be tried more sorely, in coping with the vast and deadly Indian insurrection, and with its disturbed relations in China. It is a solemn moment, and no man can feel an indifference—which, happily, no man pretends to feel—in the issue of events."

"Of our own troubles (in the United States) no man can see the end."

Certainly all of these prophets and philosophers of doom in all the ages repudiate all Christian doctrine. If one searches he may find everywhere evidence that man grows better, not worse, and that civilization progresses. Such progress is in proportion to our adherence to Christian ethics and principles.

In the dark clouds of national and international discord there are many silver linings. I, for one, believe we have enough faith, wisdom, and character to solve our problems and that tomorrow will be better than today.

Highlights

Austin, Texas, April 28—It is likely that a good slow three inch rain would do a lot more good at this time in Northwest Texas than any bill which will be passed by the Texas Legislature. However, about 1,100 bills have been introduced at this session, some good and some bad. Not nearly all will pass and the duty of the 181 members of the Legislature is to screen out the worthwhile bills and send them to the Governor's office. This screening process brings on endless argument because there is difference of opinion as to what constitutes a good or bad bill. We do make some mistakes. However, when the final roll call is made on the last day of the session, it can usually be said that we have not made as many mistakes as we had an opportunity to do.

And it is generally conceded by those who visit other Leg-islatures that the State of Texas turns out a legislative product which is better than that of states which join the Lone Star State. For instance, each state around us has both a state in-come tax and a state general sales tax. Texas has neither. The people of our state pay only a federal income tax, and I doubt that we will have either a state general sales tax or a state in-come tax in Texas at any time in the near future.

The Texas Legislature has in- vited General MacArthur to ad- dress us in joint session. He has not yet accepted, but we sin- cerely hope that he will do so.

This present session will prob- ably adjourn about mid-May. Important bills will be dis-cussed in a later article.

INDOOR PICTURES WITH DAYLIGHT ARE

Indoor photography takes the spotlight during the bleak winter months. It's the perfect time to get those photos we always wish we had of the interior of our homes. Those are the pictures we always put off because we don't have a lot of professional lighting equipment and the job somehow seems very complicated.

Actually, you'll be amazed at the wonderful interior pictures you can make by using natural daylight. The rooms will look more natural and you will be spared all the fuss of figuring where to place lights, how to hide wires, how to get even exposure and other complications.

Pick a good bright day and an hour when the sun is not shining directly into the room. Run your shades up to let in all possible light, except in those windows that may be included in your picture. A white sheet is handy to reflect light into dark corners, but be careful it does not show in the picture.

The size and shape of the room will determine your camera's position. Shooting from a corner or through a window is generally taken in a wide-angle shot. Plan your camera position so that your nearest objects are not too close to the lens. From these tests you can compute proper exposure for conditions and, from the judgment of the exposure meter, lighter or darker situations.

May Is "Jury Service Month"

Out of Texas' 7,000,000 citizens, there are 500,000 eligible jurors. Of this group, 115,000 would, if summoned, decline jury service this year. That figure is based on statistics compiled from the experience of Texas courts in 1950, wherein 23 per cent of those summoned asked to be excused.

In an effort to impress upon Texans the vital importance of preserving their right to trial by jury, May has been proclaimed "Jury Service Month" by Governor Allan Shivers. "Jury Service Month" is sponsored by the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas, and the Texas Press Association. Chairman of the Bar's committee is Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd. Fred Massengill, Jr., publisher of the Terrell Tribune, is president and spokesman for the Texas Press Association.

Governor Shivers, in a proclamation designating "Jury Service Month", pointed out that "Justice is the natural and inseparable companion of Freedom, and must constantly be upheld, whoever be the person and whatever the circumstances. This system of free courts can be maintained only as long as the citizenry assumes a willing and intelligent attitude toward jury service. For our system of trial by jury is one of our most basic freedoms."

Health Officer George Cox has said in a statement aligning himself with the medical profession against socialized medicine. Public health is a separate, distinct field from private medicine, Dr. Cox said. Both professions have their separate objectives, and distinctive methods of accomplishing them. He declared public health's objectives to be: 1. Public education as to how to avoid disease by such means as vaccination against smallpox, and typhoid fever and immunization against diphtheria. 2. Investigation of disease outbreaks.

3. Quarantine and isolation of communicable disease cases, thus preventing its spread. 4. Inspection of water supplies, and control over the safe production and sale of milk, and drugs and food products. "But, the health officer added, "people get sick and accidents happen, and the job of curing and patching up is the business of the private practitioner of medicine—the family doctor and the specialist." Doctors in private practice advocate public health principles when they urge mothers to have children protected against diphtheria and smallpox, and public health officials

"need their help in the vital work of maintaining a high level of well being for all Texans," Dr. Cox asserted. "We aren't in competition with doctors in private practice. Public health people deplore the idea of socialized medicine as unworkable, cumbersome, and totally inefficient. "There is no place on earth that has a better system of medical administration than the United States. Private doctors deserve the credit. "And there is no place on earth with a higher standard of public health. Public health people deserve credit for that," the doctor concluded emphatically.

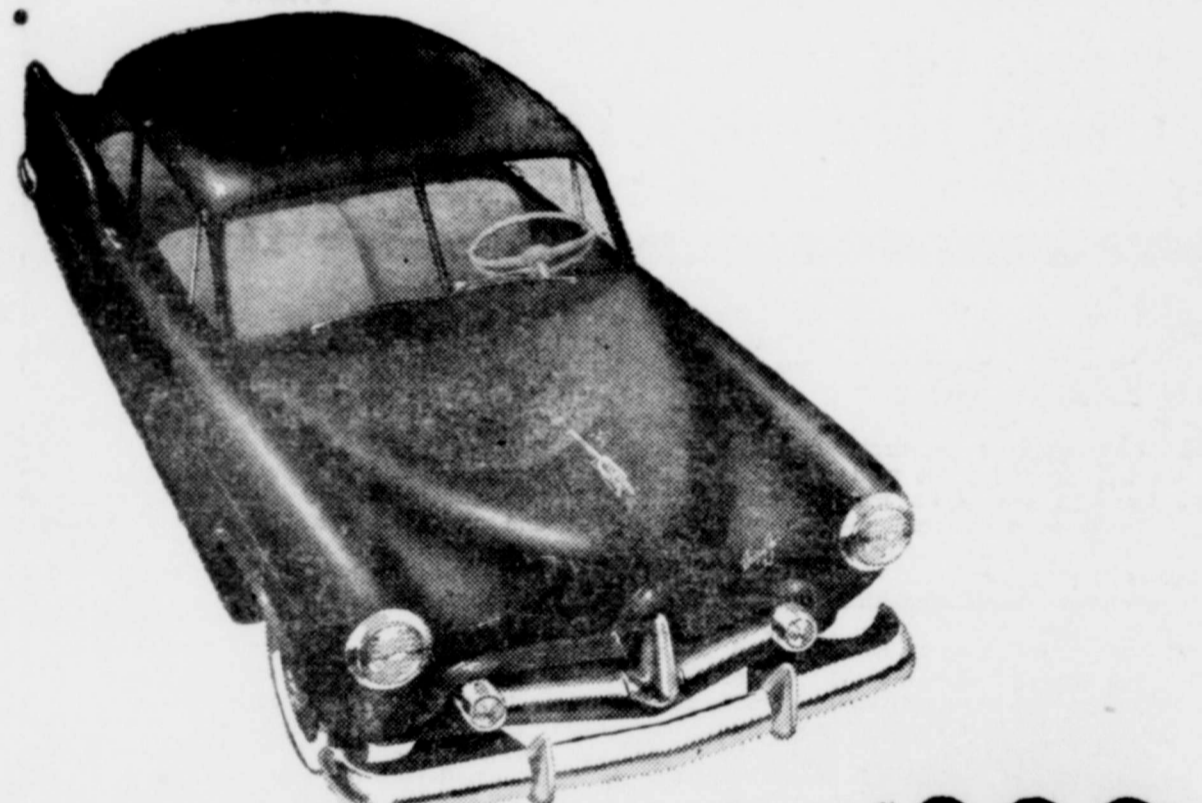

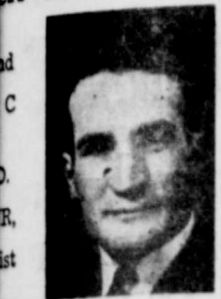

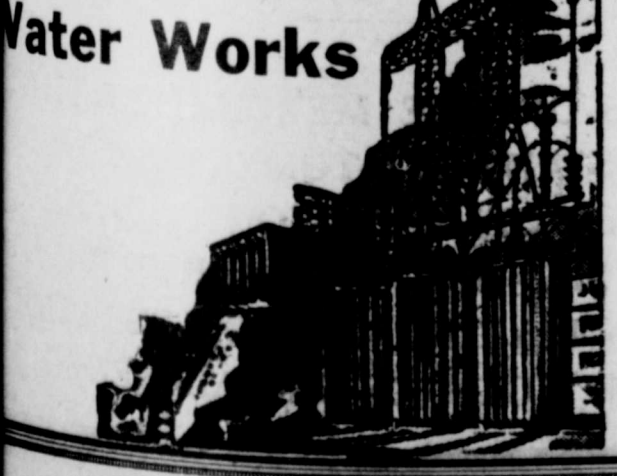
