Red River Bridge Threatened On Its Washout Anniv's'y

May 18, 1935 is a memorable date for most everyone living in Burk Burnett and Southern Oklahoma. On that date the highway bridge across Red River was washed out. A 120 ft. section went out when a portion of the railroad bridge washed out and smashed into the concrete pillars. Four lives were lost at that time when a car on the washed out section went down.

May 18, 1951, just sixteen years later, held anxious moments for this area. Red River was on another rise, and highway engineers feared the bridge would go out again. This time the railroad bridge held, except for a few timbers, probably saving a repetition of sixteen years earlier.

May 19, 1951, traffic was halted across the highway bridge. The water was still rising and the worst was expected. On the 20th, a few cars were allowed to cross in the afternoon when the water began to fall. That night the bridge was again closed for great piles of drift were coming down and lodging against the concrete piers, and enough pressure could have been exerted to force the spans out again. However, by the 21st, normal traffic was resumed when engineers declared the danger had passed.

The only apparent damage to the bridge was that in one portion it was pushed out of line some two or three inches, probably caused by some of the piers settling, but the bridge is not materially weakened by this slight kink.

Telephone Co. Asks Raise In Burk Burnett Rates

Citing continued losses on its operations in Burk Burnett, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company today asked City authorities for an increase in rates of local telephone service in this city.

"Since 1946, there has been a tremendous demand for telephone service here," C. C. Kirby, district manager of Southwestern Bell, said. "And the telephone company has spent \$130,000 to meet this demand."

"Actually, the telephone system is almost twice as large as in January, 1946," he explained. "There now are 1,050 telephones in service here, while in 1946 the total was 562. "All of this big expansion program has had to be undertaken in the face of the high levels of costs—for materials, equipment, and labor," the district manager said.

The telephone company was granted an increase in rates, "the only one in 18 years," in February, 1949. This increase, together with the addition of more telephones to the system here, brought in more revenues," Kirby said.

"But costs of furnishing service here have been climbing, too," he continued, "and we are still losing money."

New rates requested by the company for main service are \$8 a month for a business telephone; \$4.25 monthly for individual-line residence telephones; \$3.50 for two-party lines; and \$3 for four-party lines.

Kirby emphasized that the \$130,000 spent to expand the telephone plant in Burk Burnett since 1945 did not come from rates telephone users pay for service.

"This money came from thousands of men and women throughout the country who have invested their savings in the telephone business. They expect the management of the business to invest their money where it will earn a fair return."

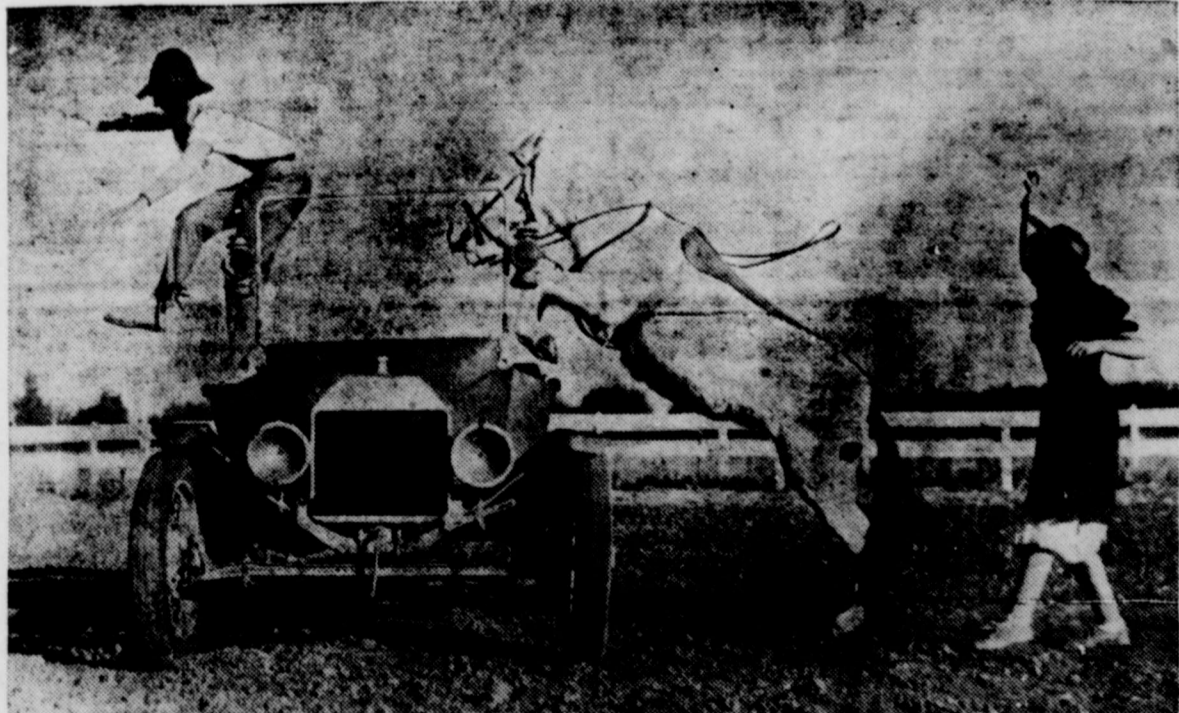

You Ain't Seen Nuthin Yet!

"There will not only be a shortage of goods, but there will be more money to compete for what is left". With these words, Economic Stabilization Director Eric Johnston advises us in effect, "Hold your hats."

"From now on," Johnston predicts, shoppers will begin feeling the pinch. Up to now, he says there have been no shortages and the full impact of military procurement is yet to be felt. "But," he went on, "as the factories start taking steel and wool and aluminum and rubber to fill their military orders, we are going to feel the pinch in our own shopping."

While Johnston was uttering these warnings, the Federal Reserve Board was taking action to restrict borrowing for non-defense capital expenditures in 1951.

What Shall I Do About My War Bonds?

Anyone who has series E savings bonds purchased after May 1, 1941 has on their maturity three choices. Turn the bonds in at his bank or at the Federal Reserve bank and receive the full redemption price. In such case he will have to include in his income tax when he files his return the entire interest accrued on the bond. This, despite the fact that the purchasing power of his investment is substantially less than when he bought the bonds 10 years before. Another choice is doing nothing. The owner can just hold on to his bonds. The third option is to exchange maturing bonds for the registered series G bonds, at an interest rate of 2 1-2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually from the issue date until their maturity in twelve years. Many people are quite concerned with this problem but the average citizen, however, is likely to do nothing, which is the easiest course.

What Does He Plant Who Plants a Tree?

For two hundred years conservation of forests in the United States has been important to wise conservationists. The greatest success has been found when individual communities have become aroused. William Penn was probably the first conservationist when in 1682 he decreed that for every five acres of cleared land one acre of forest land should be maintained. This decree was a community dictum . . . and the people themselves were enthusiastic in carrying it out. In 1804 the Massachusetts Society gave premiums for growing trees. This was then followed by a period of Federal expansion which lasted until after the War Between the States . . . many laws regarding forestry were passed by Government decree. Practically all this legislation did not originate with the people but rather in the legislatures. Little good came from it. Then a small voice—J. Sterling Morton—of Nebraska gave conservation back to the people by inaugurating Arbor Day, a celebration that belonged to each community, hence important to the individuals.

The press of the Nation, carried the conservation idea to every hamlet and every farm in the Nation. This simple idea is now taking practical form in a determination of the people to conserve forests and plant trees with the various states providing the research facilities so that the best methods and practices, as well as sturdy seedlings are available to you. Let every day be Arbor Day to us. What does he plant who plants a tree? He plants an investment in benefits to himself and also, as Cicero said, "he who plants trees will benefit another generation."

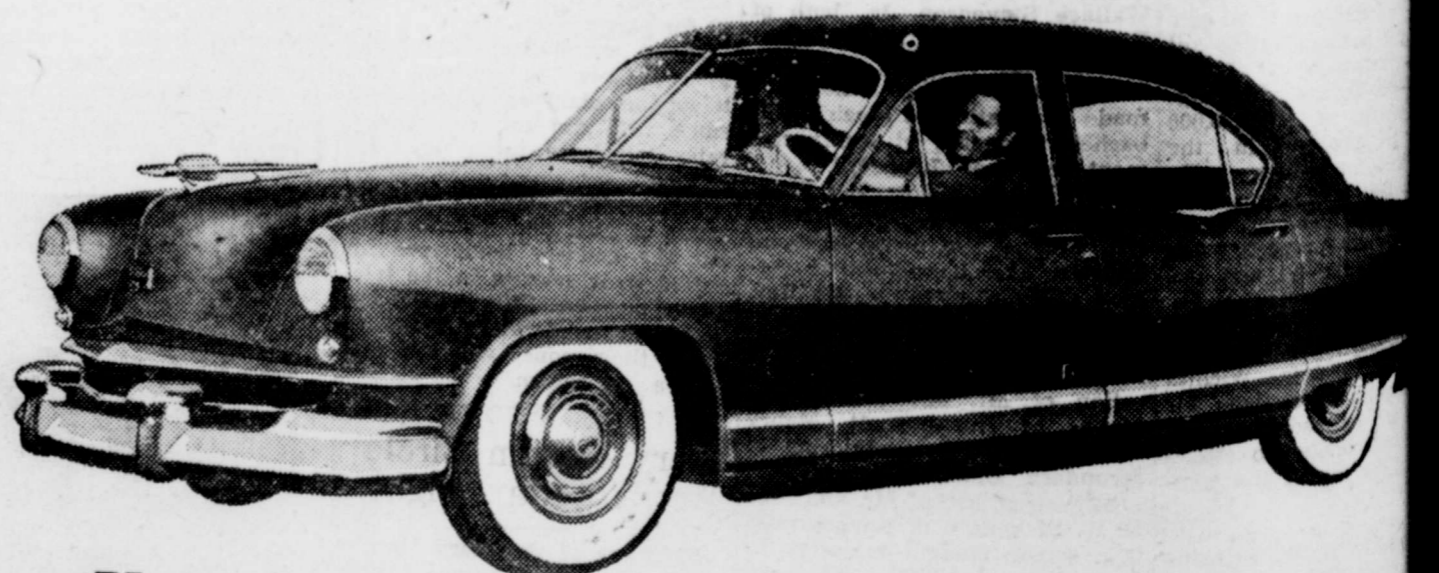

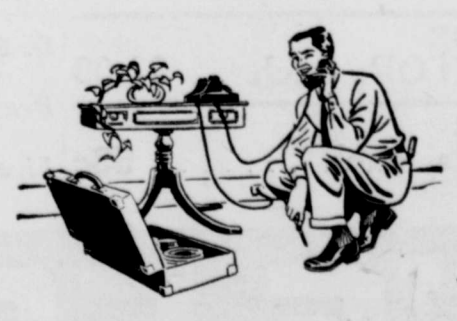

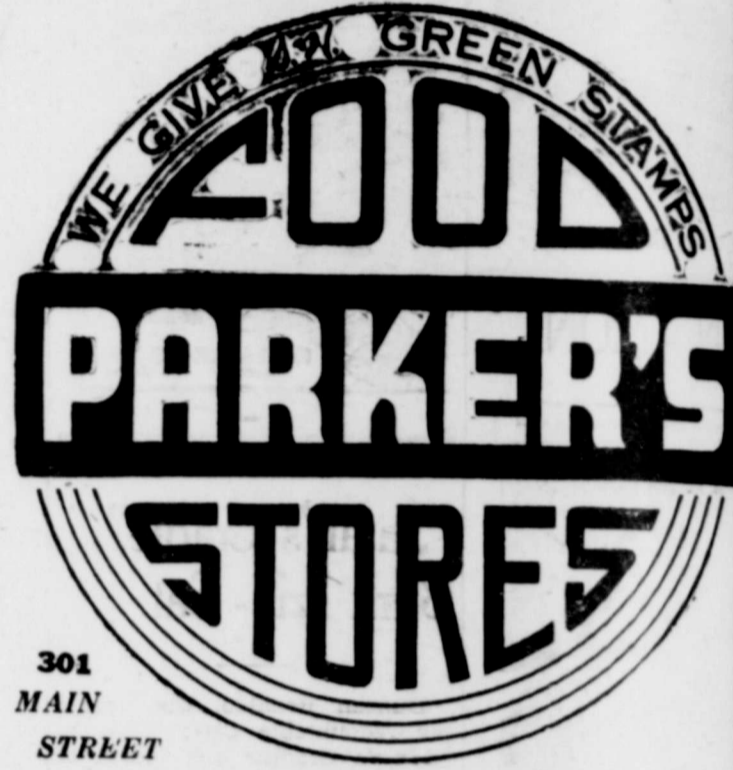

A group of men from Wichita Falls and Sheppard Air Force Base were present to present the problem of traffic congestion facing Wichita Falls and affecting every part of the county. This congestion has been brought about by the enlargement of Sheppard Air Force Base. As stated by a number of the group, everybody wants to keep the Base here, and all must face the fact that something must be done by County citizens if the Base is further expanded and put on a really permanent basis.

Those from Wichita Falls were Russell Willis, Ralph Millburn, Henry Grace, Ben Blanton, and W. O. Allen. Representing Sheppard Air Force Base was Col. L. C. Stratton.

A proposal is underway to present the Commissioners Court with a petition asking that an election be called so voters could decide if an added 7 1-2¢ per \$100 valuation tax should be

levied, which would go into the road and bridge fund. It is proposed that each Precinct be allotted its share of the levy, on the same percentage basis that the fund is now divided. The added revenue would be about \$4,000 per year for the Burkburnett Precinct. Wichita Falls would use its extra money for buying right-of-way for construction of added highway routes into and through the city. The proposed plan, which was looked upon with most favor by the State Highway Department, was one that called for an overpass across the Iowa Park Highway and across the railroad where the Sheppard Access Road intersects the North-South highway at Casey's and the Pioneer Drive In.

for her club.

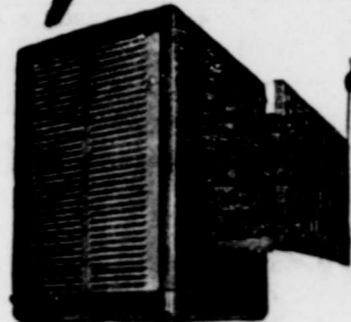

 resolution signed by the Mayor

 City Secretary shall serve as
 proper notice of said election.
 Notice shall be given in accord-
 ance with Article 704, Revised
 Civil Statutes of 1925, as amend-
 ed by Chapter 382, passed at the



 Statistics compiled by the Na-
 tional Fire Protection Association
 show an encouraging decline in the
 incidence of roof fires through-

 fires originating in the roofs of

 of fire. But now, reports Percy
 Bugbee, head of the NFPA, roof
 fires have dropped to tenth on the

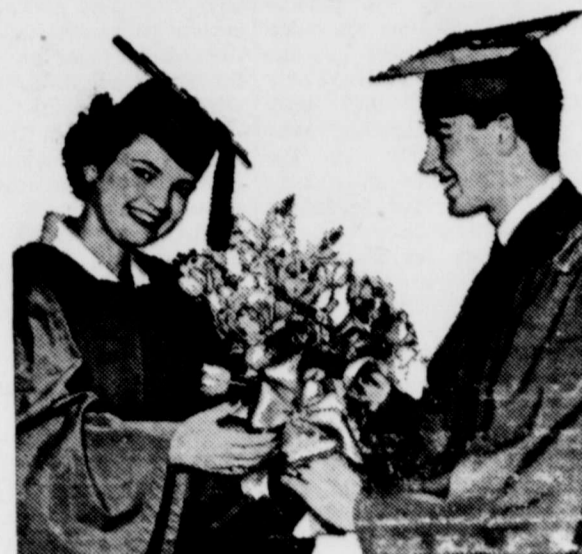
