The American oil industry is better prepared today than ever to meet any national emergency. Domestic capacity to produce and refine petroleum has increased around 25 per cent since the peak demands of World War II during which the Armed Forces and our Allies never lacked for oil, and all essential civilian needs were met.

Compared to the peak year of 1945, total U. S. crude oil production capacity has been increased 27%, refining capacity 21% and proved crude oil reserves, 24 per cent.

In these five years American oil companies plowed back into their business more than 8 billion dollars for exploration and development and to provide these new facilities.

This record of the American oil industry gives assurance that supplies and facilities will be expanded and adapted with maximum speed and efficiency to meet whatever needs may develop, provided that necessary steel and other essential materials are made available.

America's thousands of oil companies owe their progress to the fact that they are privately managed. The key to the strength of the American oil industry is the driving force of competition. This strength must be preserved. Even with national planning and restrictions, the nation must rely on private management, and although full co-operation with governmental agencies is necessary in times of emergency, nothing should be done that will impair the incentive for competition in normal times.

Proof of this lies in the fact that if private industry's planning and spending had been on the same wasteful and inefficient scale as the record of the political planners and spenders, our nation would be in desperate straits today.

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WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., June 9—After long and serious consideration, I have just made a major decision to resign from Congress and accept the position of General Attorney for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in the State of Texas. I shall not resign, however, until the last of July, or about the time for the summer recess of the Congress. In the meantime, I hope to be able to get favorable report on a number of bills in which I am interested; also to get favorable House action on the state's rights tidelands bill.

Congressional friends tell me I should be exceedingly happy to escape from the terrific pressure and the terrific responsibilities of Congressional life. Congressional service has become more and more difficult, and living in Washington has become less and less desirable in recent years. It has become absolutely impossible for any man to do his full duty as a Congressman and to do his full duty to his family, especially if he has five small children. There is no doubt but what the Gossett family will be much happier and better off to have a home in Texas, where they can live a normal, peaceful existence.

My wife tells me that, because after 13 years of Congressional service we are able to call most of the members of Congress, of the Supreme Court, of the Cabinet, and many Washington celebrities, by the first names, the Washington glamor may have gotten into our blood. Such is not the case, however. I resent the accusation. We know that the real strength and security of this country lies in the hearts and lives of the humble, God-fearing folks from whom we came, and to whom we return, the people who live in the thousands of little communities throughout the length and the breadth of the land.

I would not leave this post of duty regardless of other considerations if I thought any Congressman to be indispensable, or if I thought my remaining here would greatly influence the course of events; such an assumption would be highly egotistical. I recall, in the first year of my Congressional service, attending a joint session of the House and Senate for the celebration of the 150 anniversary of the Supreme Court. Present were all members of Congress, all members of the President's Cabinet, and the top military leaders of the nation. Someone suggested to me what a disaster it would be should a bomb fall on the assembly and wipe out all those present. My reply was that the nation would mourn briefly, and the country would survive without serious harm, since all present could and would be adequately replaced.

My parents taught me at an early age that the only measure of a successful life is whether or not the world is any better off because one lived. It shall be my constant purpose as a private citizen to continue in every way possible to be of public service. The Congress of the United States should perhaps lead public opinion. The American people get from Congress approximately what they demand. Congress follows their wishes. Because public opinion is the real force in a democracy, some of my colleagues contend that I can be of more service as a lawyer and citizen in Texas than as a representative in Congress, especially with the lessons learned and the experience gained here. The Bell Telephone Company is giving me a free hand as their General Attorney to participate in pub-

lic affairs, as well as in the practice of the law. As a lawyer and a private citizen of Texas, I shall not only keep in constant touch with the people, but also with the Congress, most of whose members I know intimately and count my friends. It shall still be my constant endeavor to accumulate more credits than debits on life's ledger of service.

Unlike the old soldier, I do not intend to just "fade away." I shall become a lobbyist, so to speak, for the things I consider good, and against the things I consider bad. I shall write letters to Congressmen, both representatives and senators, and shall see them personally as occasion requires and permits, in an effort to be of assistance to them in their loyal efforts to promote public well-being.

Perhaps away from the strife and confusion of Washington, one can get a clearer, better perspective of things as they are, and of things as they ought to be. I know a vast majority of the members of the Congress want to serve their country. Most of them will listen to an old friend who writes without an axe to grind, and especially when he speaks from experience and with sincerity.

I believe I have served my District well, and I am sure my successor will serve equally well. He shall have all the help within my power to give.

The folks of the 13th District of Texas shall always have the love and gratitude of the Gossett clan. We will always be proud of, and grateful for, the support they have given us.

Because of voluminous work that must be done, this will be our last regular newsletter.
