## NO BONANZA

Do you think that high prices are a bonanza for retailers? If so, a recent factual report on the experience of American Department stores for the first quarter of this year will be enlightening.

In that period, the stores' dollar sales were six per cent better than during the same months last year. But net operating profits—the money the retailer has left after the bills are paid—declined. This was due to a very heavy increase in expenses, including payrolls. Net profits from merchandising operations amounted to only 1.9 per cent of sales.

Other types of retailing have had a similar experience. Inflation has hit retailing all along the line. In many instances it has been impossible to raise prices sufficiently to offset the higher costs. So retailing's profits per dollar of sales, which are very modest in the best years, have gone down.

Moreover inflation has resulted in tougher competition among retailers. High prices naturally produce consumer resistance, and an increase in price consciousness on the part of customers. People tend to "shop around" more and more before buying, in search of the best deal. So the retailer must keep his prices at the lowest possible level if he is to hold his trade.

No, retailing didn't create high prices and it doesn't like them. It's hurt by inflation, just like all the rest of us.

## TEAMWORK

According to a survey made by the National Association of Manufacturers, the supply of consumer goods will be adequate in the next 12 months. This is true of

durable goods, food, clothing and other major items. The Association forecasts that, as a result, there will not be any "uncontrollable pressure on the cost of living" for that length of time at least.

This speaks well for the productive ability of our American farms and factories which are taking the heavy military demands for goods and services in stride, while filling civilian needs in a normal fashion. It also speaks well for another segment of the economy. That segment is retailing—retailing of all types and size, from the biggest chain system to the smallest one-man shop.

With few exceptions, consumers do not and cannot go to a Chicago factory to buy a refrigerator, to a New York loft to buy a suit of clothes, or to an Oregon orchard to buy a box of apples. They go to a retail store where these and thousands of other articles have been gathered attractively displayed, and are offered for sale at prices which are kept at the lowest practicable level by competition. If they don't like one store's prices or policies of services or anything else, there's another not far away which is looking for business and which depends for its existence on pleasing the fickle public.

Mass production and mass distribution are a team—a typically American team. One is just as important as the other.

### Social Security Administration

July is the month for farmers with regular hired help to file social security tax returns for the April, May, and June quarters, Erton F. Tate, Manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security Administration office said today. Regular hired help is defined as a worker on a farm or in a farm household who meets both the following conditions:

1. He must have been employed by the farmer continuously for a full calendar quarter. No tax is due for agricultural labor performed in this qualifying quarter.

2. In the next quarter he is employed by the same farmer in agricultural labor on a full time basis for at least 60 days, and his cash wages for these services are \$50 or more.

Farm owners and operators who have regular hired help and have not yet registered for filing the quarterly social security tax returns should do so immediately, said Mr. Tate, in order that they may get on the mailing list for receiving the tax forms automatically every quarter.

## CHICK CHATS

### REDUCE POULTRY MORTALITY RATE

Although considerable progress has been made in respect to poultry health the past few years, the average poultry flock continues to have a high mortality rate. Too many chickens are getting sick and too many are dying. As a result, it remains for the poultry-raiser to adopt even more rigid disease control measures and enforce still better management programs.

Failure to follow such a plan can cause large losses to a poultryman. His income can fall well below the amount which his flock, if properly cared for, is capable of earning.

Consider, for example, the loss of a single layer. When a layer dies, you lost two things, the bird's sale value and its egg-producing ability. This situation puts more of a burden on the other layers and forces them to share more of the costs.

**Control Number of Deaths**

The job, or goal, of the poultry raiser is to control the flock death rate. Some deaths, of course are unavoidable. But for the most part, a raiser can do a great deal to keep the death rate low. The objective should be: low (below average) mortality rate and good egg production.

There are many obstacles to overcome if the objective is to be realized. But a poultryman who observes sound management practices and watches his flock carefully should have little trouble in realizing consistently good profits from his birds.

This summer, you can help keep the death rate down in your flock by observing the following suggestions. These combined

with proper feeding and clean fresh water supply, should enable you to house a sturdy flock in the fall.

**What To Do**

Rotate the poultry range. Cull regularly. Keep the premises clean. Properly dispose of droppings. Send diseased birds to laboratories for speedy and accurate diagnosis. Apply preventive medicines, such as fowl-pox vaccinations, where needed. Keep poultry medications on hand for conditions that may occur. Control chicken killing animals such as rats, foxes, and owls.

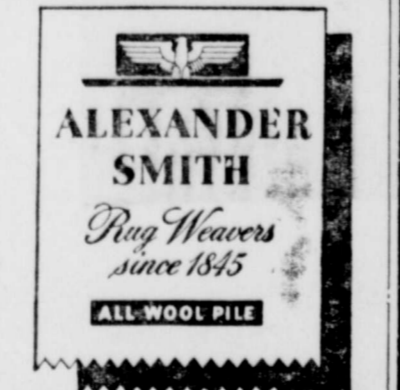
Farmers have only a few more days to apply for Smith-Doxey cotton services.

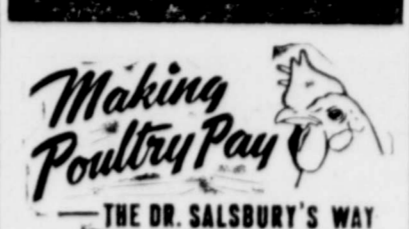

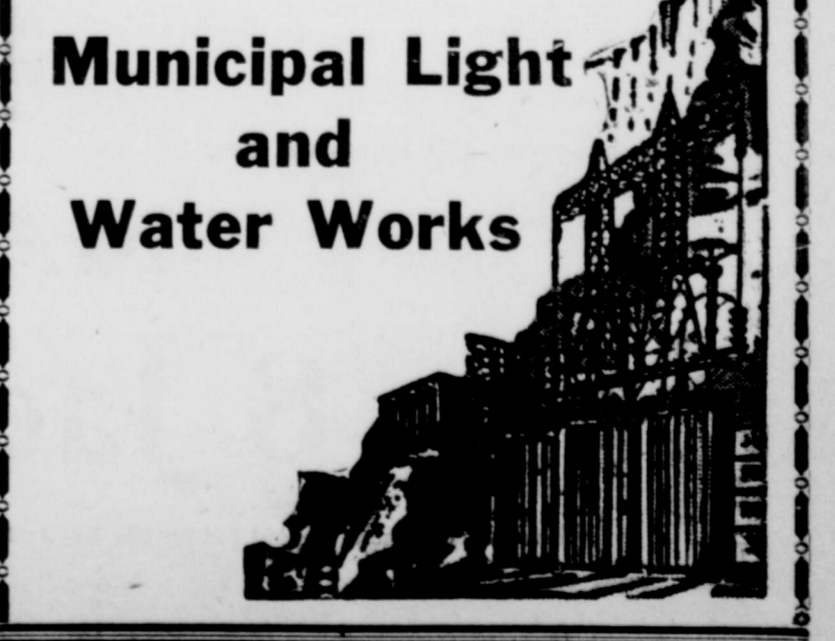

vented the Labor dictators from with-holding the workingman's dues or fees without his written consent. He also helped pass the other Texas labor laws which later became the model for the Taft-Hartley Law passed by the Congress.

Elected to the State Senate in 1950, Wagonseller served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Committee; Chairman of the committee on Stock and Stock Raising; member of the powerful State Affairs Committee, which passes on all tax bills; member of the Public Health Committee; member of the Labor Committee; and the committee which passes on all of the Governor's nominations.

As a member of the State Senate, Wagonseller offered the amendment which brought the Korean War Veterans under the Land program.
