Fifteen girls from Burkburnett were among the 280 girls who enjoyed camping during the 30th camping season of Camp Letoli, resident camp of the Camp Fire Girls of the North Central Texas Area Council. These Burkburnett girls represented about 5 1-2% of the total camp enrollment which included girls from Nona, Saint Jo, Bowie, Gainesville, Wichita Falls, Henrietta, Archer City, Olney, Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Holliday, and Electra.

Though this 1951 camp marked the 30th season of the camp, it was only the second year at the Camp's first permanent home 5 miles north of Saint Jo. On arrival this year, the girls found not only the tents, but also 6 brand new rock cabins—5 sleeping cabins and one Blue Bird Lodge. More horses were added to the string that the camp owns, and arrangements were made to swim at the Katy Lake again. Program, in addition to the ever-popular swimming and riding, was highlighted by activities of the girls in blazing permanent trails, clearing cooking sites and a council ring, setting up a weather station, over-night campouts, and all the other outdoor activities that make camping so distinctive.

The girls declared this the best camping season ever, and plans are being made now to increase the permanent facilities for next year.

Walter Jenkins Hits Proposal For Higher Taxes

Walter Jenkins, candidate for Congress in the special election on Sept. 8th, this week blasted proposals that income taxes be increased in the lower brackets. "I am against any increase now in personal income taxes," he declared. "The average American—man, woman or child—is now paying \$360 a day in taxes to federal, state and local governments. That's right at a dollar a day per capita. It's too much."

518 Given X-rays By T-B Workers In Burkburnett

The 1951 county-wide X-ray survey ended on Saturday, August 18th. During the three weeks' survey, 10,491 persons were X-rayed, of that number 518 were given in Burkburnett. An analysis of X-rays given in the different towns in the County reveals that Iowa Park had the highest percentage of population X-rayed.

Mass X-ray surveys are conducted to find unknown cases of tuberculosis, preferably in its early, curable stages, but cancer and tumor of the lungs and heart conditions also show up on the films.

"The pity of tuberculosis," Miss Margaret Hall, Executive Secretary of the Tuberculosis Association, points out, is "that in addition to being extremely difficult to cure, unless found in its early stages, it is contagious and that contrary to the somewhat general belief that older persons do not catch the disease, ANYBODY at ANY AGE can catch—and spread—tuberculosis." As long as one active case is ambulatory, there is the possibility of contagion to others in close contact.

As executive in charge of the survey, Miss Hall announces that the board of directors of the TB Association, composed of citizens, both physicians and lay members, from every section of the County, wishes to publicly acknowledge its thanks and appreciation to the people of Burkburnett for making the survey possible; particularly, Mrs. Daniel T. Sheriff for her untiring efforts as general chairman, to the ladies who volunteered their services to handle the clerical work, to Mills and Fleming for providing a space in their store as an operational base, to the ministers for their announcements, to the merchants for displaying the posters, Mr. Clark Gresham for assuming responsibility for the side walk signs, to Miss Susanne Sheriff for baby sitting so that mothers could serve in clerical capacities. This was a new trend in service to the X-ray survey.

Our especial thanks go to the BURKBURNETT STAR for all the wonderful publicity to this vital public health project.

THE LIGHT THAT FAILED

Every now and then someone asks, "What's become of the 'everlasting' match—Who owns patents on it—Why isn't it being sold?"

Frequently the questioner implies American match manufacturers are keeping this device off the market. The facts are these:

This match was patented by Ringer in Switzerland in 1928. He called it "the repeatedly ignitable match". In the 1930's it was introduced in Holland, where it enjoyed some novelty sale.

It was, in effect, an elongated match-head, the ignitable portions of which were separated by chemical retardants. By very careful nursing a user could light it, blow out the flame, and thus get an average of about 40 lights—along with 40 room-filling whiffs of a vile odor from the retardants.

In Holland, three of these match sticks sold for the equivalent of 5 cents—or roughly 120 lights for a nickel. In this country, ever since the Civil War, people have been able to buy a box of safety matches, containing 40 sticks, for a penny. In other words, 3 pennies here purchase as many lights as 5 pennies spent for the so-called "everlasting" match.

U. S. patents on this match expired in 1945. Anyone can start manufacture of the repeatedly ignitable match. Chances are no one will, though, for the United States enjoys the lowest per capita expenditure for matches of any country in the world. And only here are matches given away—190 billion free paper book matches yearly!

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

This sounds like a neat amount of pocket change for every man, woman and child in Manchester, but after all, it doesn't amount to much. If each person paid his per capita share of the national debt, it would take \$1,166.00 of this amount. This would leave only \$533.76. His share of the state debt would be \$32.00, which would leave him \$501.76."

TELLING QUESTIONS

It is commonly said that the military forces must be given all the money and materials they need, and that government economy must be confined to non-defense spending. However, the military people have an obligation to buy wisely, in no greater amounts than is necessary, and to make every dollar do full duty.

The other day Congressman John Phillips of California asked a number of very telling questions. He said, "Was it necessary for the Army to buy 68,000,000 can openers, for 1,500,000 men? Or 4,636,000 web belts? Or 6,000,000 cans of paint, in quarts and gallons, a full year requirement, and then demand delivery in 60 days? Or 11,753,000 pairs of combat boots, in a rush? Or buy 1,917,000 pounds of BLACK PEPPER in nine months? Or was it necessary for the Quartermaster to buy five million pounds of oleo at 25 1/2 cents just when the Department of Agriculture was selling 5,500,000 pounds of butter to Italy for 15 cents? This is the scarce buying with which the Administration charges the public, and it is a cause of inflation. Witness the jump in price of the boots just mentioned, from \$7.82 to \$16.00 as a result of this absurd buying."

The American people are determined that we shall be powerfully protected with military force at home and elsewhere, and they are prepared to pay the bill. At best, that bill will be staggering. But if the money is spent hastily, and demand is allowed to unnecessarily outrun the supply, the bill could be actually ruinous both to the economy and the national security, by causing new and ever-greater waves of inflation.

We must have the strictest kind of economy in non-defense spending. And we must also see that the defense dollar is spent in the right way.

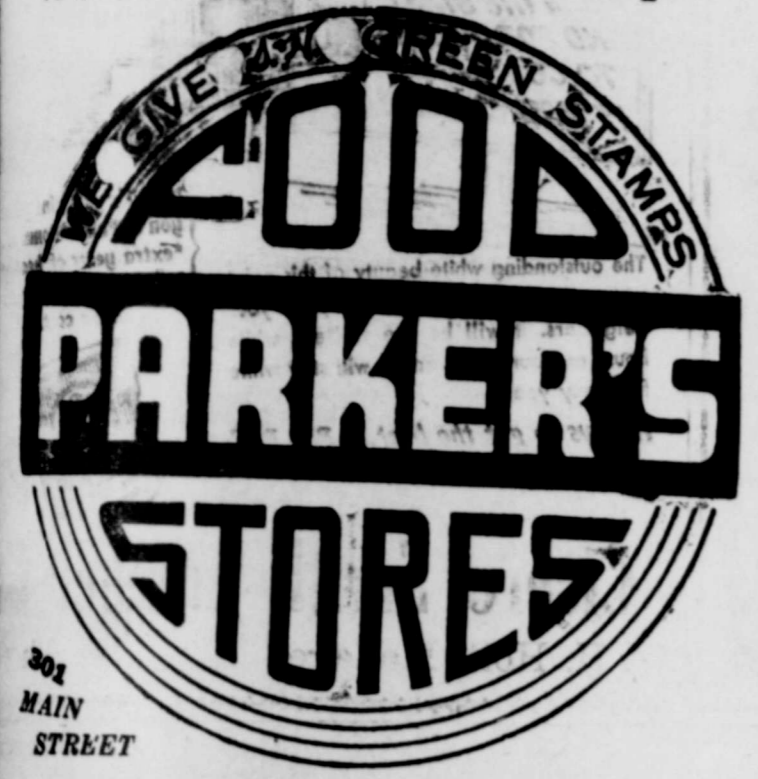

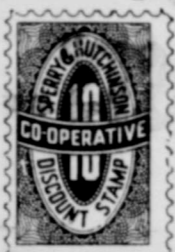

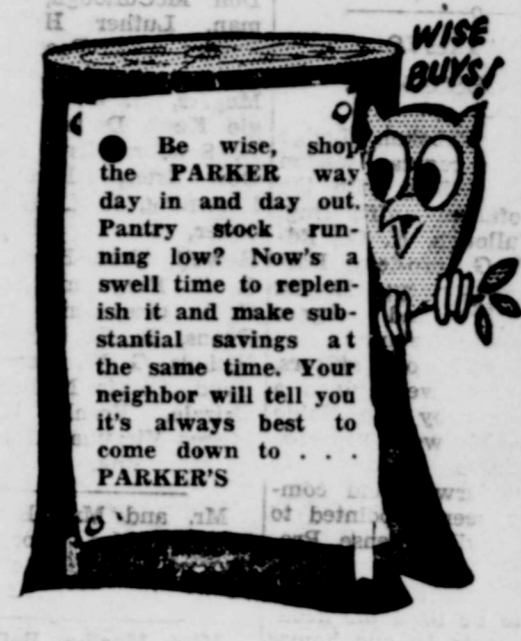

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THE LIGHT THAT FAILED

Every now and then someone asks, "What's become of the 'everlasting' match—Who owns patents on it—Why isn't it being sold?"

Frequently the questioner implies American match manufacturers are keeping this device off the market. The facts are these:

This match was patented by Ringer in Switzerland in 1928. He called it "the repeatedly ignitable match". In the 1930's it was introduced in Holland, where it enjoyed some novelty sale.

It was, in effect, an elongated match-head, the ignitable portions of which were separated by chemical retardants. By very careful nursing a user could light it, blow out the flame and thus get an average of about 40 lights—along with 40 room-filling whiffs of a vile odor from the retardants.

In Holland, three of these match sticks sold for the equivalent of 5 cents—or roughly 120 lights for a nickel. In this country, ever since the Civil War, people have been able to buy a box of safety matches, containing 40 sticks, for a penny. In other words, 3 pennies here purchase as many lights as 5 pennies spent for the so-called "everlasting" match.

U. S. patents on this match expired in 1945. Anyone can start manufacture of the repeatedly ignitable match. Chances are no one will, though, for the United States enjoys the lowest per capita expenditure for matches of any country in the world. And only here are matches given away—190 billion free paper book matches yearly!

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

His share of the state debt would be \$32.00, which would leave him \$501.76."

TELLING QUESTIONS

It is commonly said that the military forces must be given all the money and materials they need, and that government economy must be confined to non-defense spending. However, the military people have an obligation to buy wisely, in no greater amounts than is necessary, and to make every dollar do full duty.

The other day Congressman John Phillips of California asked a number of very telling questions. He said, "Was it necessary for the Army to buy 68,000,000 can openers, for 1,500,000 men? Or 4,636,000 web belts? Or 6,000,000 cans of paint, in quarts and gallons, a full year requirement, and then demand delivery in 60 days? Or 11,753,000 pairs of combat boots, in a rush? Or buy 1,917,000 pounds of BLACK PEPPER in nine months? Or was it necessary for the Quartermaster to buy five million pounds of oleo at 25 1/2 cents just when the Department of Agriculture was selling 5,500,000 pounds of butter to Italy for 15 cents? This is the scarce buying with which the Administration charges the public, and it is a cause of inflation. Witness the jump in price of the boots just mentioned, from \$7.82 to \$16.00 as a result of this absurd buying."

The American people are determined that we shall be powerfully protected with military force at home and elsewhere, and they are prepared to pay the bill. At best, that bill will be staggering. But if the money is spent hastily, and demand is allowed to unnecessarily outrun the supply, the bill could be actually ruinous both to the economy and the national security, by causing new and ever-greater waves of inflation.

We must have the strictest kind of economy in non-defense spending. And we must also see that the defense dollar is spent in the right way.

Junior Livestock Division Added to Tex.-Okla. Fair

The newly created Junior Livestock Department of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair holds area-wide interest for FFA and Four H Club members. This department has incorporated the better features of the old "Four-H and FFA" division and the new features planned jointly by area vocational agriculture instructors and county agents.

More classes have been added in each of the four divisions. Premiums will be paid senior and junior classes of beef calves on Hereford, Angus and Shorthorn steers; three classes are listed for Hampshire, Suffolk, Shropshire, Dorset and Southdown sheep.

Swine premiums are offered on Poland China, Chester White, Hampshire, Duroc Jersey, Berkshire and OIC. Dairy premiums go to Jerseys, Guernseys and Holsteins.

Grass, livestock and dairy judging contests will be held. Grass judging teams are referred to Extension Service Farm Bulletin No. B-182, also legumes most often encountered in the fair area will be used in judging contests.

Good Construction Lowers Home Costs

Look beyond the price tag when purchasing a home. Although attractively priced, a house is a good buy only if its construction assures economical maintenance and operation. The important details can be ascertained by inspection at various stages of the building operations.

With either a basement or crawl space, the center of the house should be supported by wood or steel columns or masonry piers topped with a steel girder or heavy beam. Subflooring laid diagonally provides greater strength, and joists should be braced at intervals with X-shaped bridging.

The roof should be of fire-resistant material, such as asphalt shingles which protect most American homes and farm buildings. Asphalt shingles are applied over a smooth, solid roof deck. An asphalt saturated felt is nailed to the roof deck before the shingles are applied. The most popular asphalt shingle is the three-tab square-but shingle. The three-in-one shingle, economical to apply, is designed for five-inch exposure to the weather. In areas where high winds are to be expected, use of a quick-setting cement to fasten down the tabs is recommended.

Another sign of good construction is sheathing applied diagonally instead of horizontally. This gives the walls more strength and usually indicates the builder will be particular about other details. Doors and windows should not stick or bind and stairs should be level and firm with no vibration under foot.

Modernized Home Keeps Civil War Era Charm

Remodeling brought this 80-year-old home up to date without losing any of its Civil War era charm.

Despite its old style of architecture, small rooms and inconvenient layout, foliates Practical Builder magazine, the house was made completely modern inside and out.

An unusual feature of this modernization project was the construction of the garage and breezeway of the same odd-sized sand and clay brick as contained in the original building. An adequate supply of this obsolete brick was obtained by purchasing and dismantling another building erected in the Civil War period. In this way, the addition was made to look like a part of the original structure.

The problem of how to remove the "undesirable" front porch without making the front of the house look bare was solved by taking away the porch superstructure and leaving the stone foundation and filling. This provides a patio for flower planting and a place for relaxation.

At the same time, the house was made weathertight by application of a new roof of fire-resistant asphalt shingles. Asphalt shingles in a subdued color were selected to "reduce the height" of the house to give it a more compact appearance. Bright-colored asphalt shingles are often used to give squatly houses an appearance of greater height. The

roof color is the dominating note in exterior color planning. Improvements also included relocation of the front entrance and numerous interior alterations. Replacing a closed stairway, new stairs and baluster, finished in mahogany, blend nicely with the new mahogany vertically planked interior of the living room. Tastefully decorated through-



out to accentuate its classic simplicity and beauty, the house provides an excellent example of what can be done to combine the best features of "new" and "old" in home modernization.
