The home of Mrs. Tom Boyd was the scene of a lovely gift shower given for Mrs. Darrell Nichols, Thursday evening.


Games and contests were enjoyed, prizes going to Mesdames Nichols and Greer which they presented to the honoree.

## Oklahoma City Good Will Group Coming To Burkburnett

O'Neil is general manager of Richards & Conover Hardware Co. in Oklahoma City.

A delegation of 50 Oklahoma City businessmen, headed by James E. O'Neil, chairman of the Oklahoma City Chamber's Wholesalers and Manufacturers Division will visit BURKBURNETT in a three-day Goodwill Tour through Southwest Oklahoma and Northern Texas, arriving here about 4:15 P. M., OCTOBER 24th.

The goodwillers will be accompanied by the Kiltie Band and will be transported in a 3-bus caravan, according to Jack LaMonte, manager of Mistletoe Express Service and chairman of the goodwill tours committee of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce.

The 28-member Kiltie Band, Scottish-clad, all-girl musical organization will perform in the street for citizens of Burkburnett and adjacent trade area. The band whose instruments came from Scotland is sponsored by American Legion Post No. 35 of Oklahoma City.

"Our stay will necessarily be brief," LaMonte said, "but there will be plenty of time for the Kilties to perform and for the Oklahoma City group to get acquainted with some of your citizens."

On the program also, will be an exchange of greetings between local civic leaders and a representative of Oklahoma City.

## Calling the Tune

Government regulations or no government regulations, the consumer has much to do with calling the tune when it comes to prices and business turnover and other such matters.

In late months, according to the commerce department, retailers have reduced their inventories—in other words, they've cut the size of stocks on hand. And the reason for this is what the commerce department calls a "softening of consumer demand." That is, people didn't buy as much as they had previously—and so the retailer trimmed his sails to fit the prevailing wind. There was nothing else he could do.

Some people still think that the retailer is a tough customer who's prime ambition in life is to outsmart and exploit them. The retailer couldn't be that even if he wanted to—not if he means to stay in business for any length of time. Just as a burnt child dreads the fire, so does a customer hurry by the store where he got a real or fancied trimming. The competitor down the street is there to welcome him with open arms. The biggest problem any retailer has—all the way from the one-man specialty shop to the chain with thousands of outlets—is trying to figure out what the consumer wants, what he will or can pay, what his desires will be tomorrow or next week or next year.

The bulk of buyers are primarily interested in prices—and that is especially true in this inflationary era. For reasons of self-preservation if no other, retailers keep prices as low as possible. You can offer the consumer goods, but you can't force him to buy. In the long run, the consumer is the boss.

## Toward Better Health

Propagandists many of whom seem to be government employes, for federal compulsory health insurance commonly attempt to lower the boom on opponents of the scheme by claiming that it is being fought by people who have no interest in bettering our general health standards or in improving the quality and scope of medical care.

That's quite an indictment, and it deserves attention. If it is true, a great many millions of typical Americans, of all ages and occupations and creeds and income levels, have a cynical and selfish disregard for the public health. For example, hundreds of national and local organizations have gone formally on record in opposition to com-

pulsory health insurance. These include, to list but a few, the American Association of Small Business, the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary, AM-VETS, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Catholic Welfare Conference, the National Federation of Press Women, and the National Grange.

Is it logical that the members and directors of such diverse groups are against better health and improved medical care? The answer, of course, is No! Many of them indeed are leaders in the search for practical ways and means to raise our standards of health to the highest conceivable level. They are actively and aggressively supporting science's long and brilliant war against disease. But, at the same time, they are opposed to compulsory health insurance, for they are convinced that it would lead to political domination of the healing arts, to socialized medicine and consequently, to a sharp decline in medical standards and our health. And the record—as found in England and elsewhere—supports this belief 100 per cent.



**Mayor Jones of Wichita Falls Talks to Firemen**

Ed's Note: Mayor Harold Jones of Wichita Falls spoke to the West Texas Firemen and Fire Marshals' semi-annual meeting held here Sept. 6th. Although his remarks were directed to Volunteer Firemen, they are of interest to our entire citizenship.

This organization is unique in American society and government. Unique in that it is perhaps the only remaining example of citizens giving without charge their physical efforts for the betterment and protection of their community.

There was a time well within my memory when it was the accepted practice to maintain our rural roads by each able-bodied man contributing so many days of labor or a team or other equipment. This contribution of road work was required by law, and it is only in recent years that we have got away from that idea and adopted one whereby each of us participate in community or government activity by simply writing a check. Most of us contribute nothing except the dollar. We are, in effect, becoming check book citizens, who begrudgingly pay, criticize those who collect, and belittle the efforts of those who spend the money we contribute.

Personally, I am gratified that this organization is still very actively in existence. Few of our citizens realize that your efforts benefit anyone except the fellow whose house is on fire and fail to grasp that it is your efforts that each year make possible tremendous savings in insurance premiums to every citizen of your respective communities.

In addition to your fire fighting activity and insurance premium savings to your communities, I know that each of your communities is a better community because of your active participation in its protection. Because you as individuals undertake a given task, the only reward for doing which is the appreciation of your fellow citizens, and more frequently that appreciation turns to criticism before the fire is out, makes of each of you a citizen more capable of grasping the problems of community life. It gives to each of you a deeper concern for the welfare and safety of your community and a keener desire for efficiency and decency in the solving of your community problems.

While I have said you serve without compensation, I know that you do gain tremendous satisfaction from your own personal knowledge that you as individuals are doing a job for your community as best you can. If that alone is not adequate compensation, then there is remuneration in being able to say to the check book critics that none of his money is going to you, that there is a vacancy on the line beside you, and he can either join you in the fight or go to a place hotter than fire fighting.

This is a great institution. It typifies a selfless co-operation that built our nation, and I am personally very proud to be invited to be with you here in Burkburnett, where the citizens and the city officials have done a fine job of preparing for this meeting.

It's no more of a sin to play golf on Sunday than any other day, the way most people play it.


