On Monday of this week, C. A. Gray, presented his giant collection of Indian Arrow Heads, Beads, etc., to the Midwestern University Museum in Wichita Falls.

Perhaps to a few readers that would merely mean "just another contribution to another school." But to Mr. Gray, and those who knew and followed with interest this ever-growing collection, it is as if a very close acquaintance had left our town. Mr. Gray's is one of the four largest private Indian collections in the United States.

The collection was started over thirty years ago when Mr. Gray found his first specimens while working in an oil field near Olney, Texas. After a number of years he resumed his search for arrow heads, chiefly for relaxation and to get away from the indoor confinement of his shoe shop, until today, this is one of the finest collections in the country, consisting of over 5,000 different pieces.

Civil Service Urges Filing For Post Office Examinations

Bridge of Sighs, Newstyle

United Nations demolition teams are standing by, as this is written, to blow up the famous (or infamous) pontoon bridge over the Injin River that provided, through the weeks of the Kaesong "Truce-Talks" such an uncertain approach to Korean peace. Four times, before the conference itself disintegrated floods carried the bridge away. And four times U. S. Army Engineers rebuilt it at a reported cost of \$2,500,000 each time.

Meanwhile, action along the front increases. UN forces are probing enemy lines while the Reds are lobbing Russian World War Two rockets into the heart of the Allied line and increasing numbers of jet fighters from both sides contend for mastery of the air. In the second of the all-jet fighter plane battles, 80 Russian MIG's fought a losing battle with 30 American Sabre jets. Two enemy planes were shot down, while there were no Allied losses. Equally interesting is the Army's unofficial announcement that a reliable eye-witness reports proof that one of the downed MIG's was flown by a Russian pilot.

And in Washington, Senator O'Mahoney, Democrat of Wyoming, in discussing the improvement in Army health statistics through the years, provided the statistical basis, unwittingly no doubt, from which smart mathematicians estimate our present strength in Korea at 433,000 men. If this figure is substantially correct, and our Allies have maintained their manpower, the UN should have a combined army to equal the minimum figure in General Ridgway's latest estimate (600,000 to 800,000).

But if and when the big push comes, the all-out enemy drive for which our men are tensed, it could well be the bloodiest that American troops have ever met. And who can say that it will not be the opening engagement of that global war we were going to avoid?

Stockpiling International Brass

The national capital took on an extra international luster this week as British Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison, French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman and U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson all stepped from the same plane at the Washington airport after a chatty hop from San Francisco.

In a series of meetings, this week, the Big Three foreign ministers and their advisors are expected to turn their attention from Asia to Europe and to seriously attack the problem of a peace for Germany that would make an ally of that defeated enemy.

British Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Gaitskell was already in Washington (to do a little shopping for 800,000 tons of steel and what-not). We hope King George is better and sitting on that throne eight hours a day.

Cure for Talkathons?

Senator Kenneth S. Wherry, Republican of Nebraska, has introduced into the senate a resolution designed to improve production in that body, while other American workers are doing likewise in mills and factories and shops and on the farms. Under the Wherry resolution, filibustering could be stopped by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting at any session. Under the present rules, cloture requires a vote of 64 of the 96 senators. It was referred to the rules committee . . . we hope for action.

Oklahoma City Boosters Coming Here October 24

Headed by the famous girls' Kiltie Band, the only novelty parade organization of its kind in America, a delegation of capital city business leaders will visit Burkburnett at 5:15 p. m. on October 24. Traveling in a three-bus caravan, the Oklahoma City Goodwill Tour will visit Southwest Oklahoma and North Texas.

The 28-member Kiltie Band, Scottish-clad, all girl musical organization will perform in the street for citizens of Burkburnett and the adjacent trade area. The band whose instruments came from the high and low lands of Scotland is under the sponsorship of American Legion Post 35 in Oklahoma City.

The Oklahoma City Kilties are one of the most widely known musical organizations in the state. It ranks tops all over the country in parades, drills and music. It is an entirely "woman" band and if you miss out on seeing and hearing this remarkable organization you will have missed one of Oklahoma's most attractive and interesting sights.

The Kiltie Band has been an Oklahoma institution for the last quarter of a century. They have performed in New York, in Washington and in many of our 48 states.

The visitation trip is the second of two sponsored in 1951 by the Oklahoma City Chamber's Wholesalers and Manufacturers Division. The division is headed by James E. O'Neil, general manager of Richards & Conover Hardware Co. Jack LaMonte, chairman of the goodwill tours committee which falls under the division and manager of the Mistletoe Express Service, is in charge of arrangements.

Raymond James On the Krishna

LITTLE CREEK, NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 12.—Raymond W. James, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. James of Route 1, Burkburnett, was one of the men of the amphibious force repair ship USS Krishna who were responsible for the vessel's recent winning of five letters of commendation for outstanding services.

The Krishna was engaged in naval operations in far northern waters during the summer months.

One letter expressed the appreciation of Rear Admiral T. Amphibious Group Two, for the "successful performance of a difficult salvage operation."

In one instance repairs made on a ship at open anchorage were said to equal a Navy yard performance.

The vessel, originally built as the landing ship 1149, was converted to a floating repair shop by the installation of heavy machine equipment on the former tank deck.

Commissioned as the USS Kreshna in December, 1945, she was assigned to the Amphibious Force, Atlantic Fleet early in 1946. Since then she has taken part in numerous fleet exercises.

The Social Security Administration qualifies this week for some kind of award in long-range planning. It has officially begun worrying about the 25 million oldsters the U. S. will have on its hands two generations hence.

W. J. Cohen, technical advisor of the SSA (on "what to do till the undertaker comes," no doubt) outlines two points of attack on the problem:

First, to encourage further job opportunities for elderly people who are able to work, and,

Second, to extend social security benefits among those who can't work.

He didn't mention a third point, but we could guess that it is to extend and consolidate the influence and authority of the Social Security Administration. Since their efforts to impose socialized medicine on the American people fizzled, they must seek new worlds to conquer. After which, when we have more or less forgotten about socialized medicine, they can launch that campaign over again.

By that time the SSA will no doubt be taking care of us in a truly luxurious manner. We won't be able to work any longer having worn ourselves out fighting this creeping socialism.

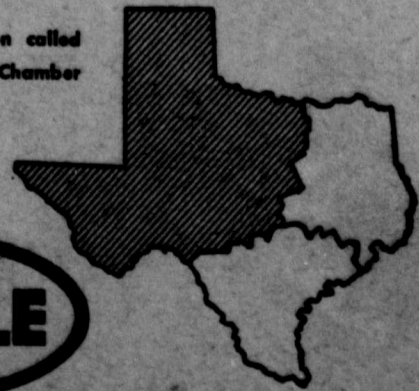

State Health Department Condemns Unsanitary Conditions in Burkburnett

 Our Mr. E. C. Nelson has just returned from a routine in-

spection tour of Wichita Falls, Childress, Burkburnett, and area. In reporting his activities in these communities, Mr. Nelson included an account of his visit to the City of Burkburnett. Mr. Nelson's report indicated considerable concern over the lack of proper garbage and refuse facilities, both from the standpoint of municipal control and individual premise maintain-

ance, especially regarding proper storage, collection and disposal.

Large oil drums used as containers were in general evidence. In most instances, they were without lids and were damaged by excessive rust. As a result, they offered little protection against the invasion of flies, rodents and other vermin.

We are well acquainted with the capability of flies to spread disease; and it is our feeling that, since situations of this nature and similar insanitary conditions, are important factors in spreading communicable diseases, every effort should be made to initiate speedy corrective measures. Every means should be utilized to inform the public of what the dangers are, and to urge their support of proposals which are designed for the protection of community health. Thus, by so doing, a community's prosperity, and the many other things that reflect wholesomeness and attractiveness is further enhanced.

Therefore, on the basis of Mr. Nelson's report, and in the hope of advancing public health generally in your community, we respectfully offer the following recommendations and suggestions for your serious and early consideration:

1. Garbage and refuse services should be inaugurated to provide for at least twice weekly collections from each premise in Burkburnett's residential district and at least once daily in business districts.

2. Consideration should be given to the adoption of an ordinance requiring the use of approved type garbage and refuse containers. (An approved type container is of all metal construction, having a tight fitting lid, insect and rodent proof and having a capacity of not greater than 32 gallons.)

3. Consideration should be given to the purchase of appropriate transporting equipment. (Many cities in Texas now use vehicles provided with mechanical packing devices. These units reduce the original volume substantially, and thereby the amount in haul cost is appreciably lowered.)

4. Disposal of garbage and refuse should be accomplished by means of the sanitary landfill method. (We are sending, under separate cover, certain information which may be useful in this regard.)

5. Consideration should be given to the construction of proper sewage treatment facilities, removal of unsatisfactory and insanitary OUTDOOR toilets which are not now in the municipal sewage collection system.

6. Building codes of sufficient strength should be adopted to assure other installations of suitable sanitary facilities.

Please permit us to thank you and Mr. Carver for the kindness and courtesies extended our representative during his visit

in your city; and, if we can again be of service to the citizens of Burkburnett, please be assured of our sincere desire to do so.

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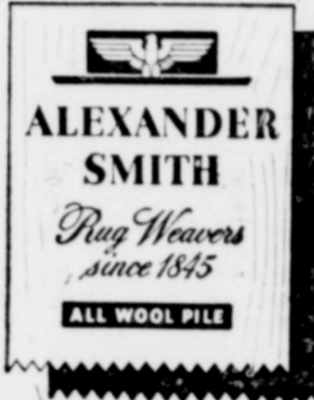

Social Security News From Tate

If you work for yourself and are planning to include your own name on the quarterly social security tax return you file for your employees—don't. So says Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

Tate says that many self-employed businessmen who were brought under social security as self-employed people by the 1950 amendments are under the impression that they should report their own income in the same way they report the wages paid to their employees. That isn't correct. Self-employed people report their own net earnings for social security purposes only once a year, at the end of the year when they make their own individual income tax returns.

Self-employment earnings, except earnings from operating a farm and from certain professions, are covered by the law and must be reported if they are \$400 or more in a year. A form for making the annual report and figuring the tax, which is 2 1/2 per cent, will be included with individual income tax forms. The special form, which self-employed people must file for the first time with their income tax returns early in 1952, will be used to give them social security credit for the first \$3,600 of their self-employment income for 1951.

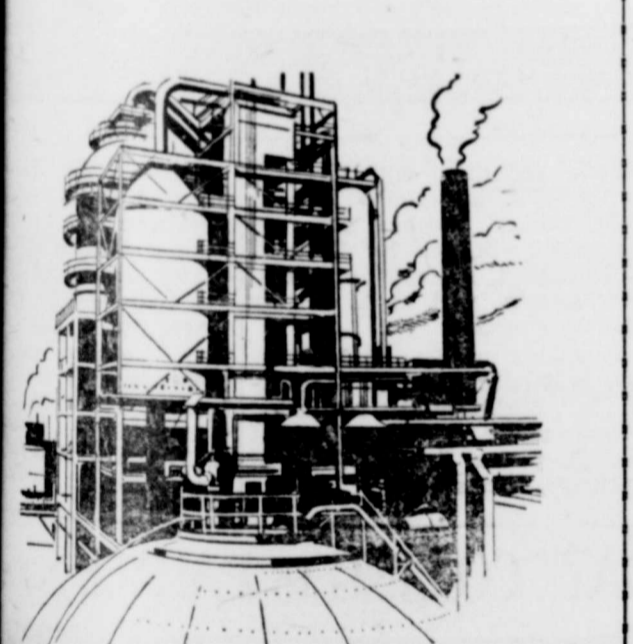
