Traffic Regulations To Be Enforced In Burkburnett

Burkburnett is growing, and growing fast. This everyone can agree on. A comparison of the great number of cars traversing our streets now and a short two or three years ago is quite a contrast. The growth of any city makes necessary more and more regulations-to protect people from themselves and from each other. For a time Burkburnett was 'way behind in its regulations for traffic safety. We're still behind, but in the last year a traffic signal light has been installed at Main and Avenue D, the light in front of the Grade school moved to the intersection at College and Ave. D, and a new police patrol car has been purchased and put in operation by the City.

Chief of Police Willis Bartley, Night Watchman Homer Provence and Nightwatchman Jim Turner, and Pete Bryan have been very patient with the open disregard for the safety of our citizens and school children by the majority of motorists-and that includes our own people as well as those just passing through. Courtesy tickets have been issued, where no fines were imposed; traffic violators have been stopped and cautioned and plead with to be more careful. Instead of getting better, the situation is steadily growing worse. "Eighty per cent of the motorists passing by the schools break the 20 mile speed limit. Fully sixty per cent violate the 30 mile speed limit in other parts of town. A large per cent run red lights. Still a larger number speed up to make a crossing when the light is changing and many others waiting for the light to change in their favor jump the gun and break into the stream of traffic before the light has fully changed," says Chief Bartley. Wrecks, caused by somebody doing something they know they shouldn't, are happening more frequently. One or two such wrecks every day now seems to be the average.

The clamp on traffic violators is being closed beginning Friday morning, October 26, 1951. The situation demands that something be done, and done immediately. Hereafter if you violate any traffic regulation in Burkburnett, be prepared for a trip to the City Hall, or the Justice of the Peace Court, or the County Court. Let your pocketbook and conscience be your guide. The costs go up rapidly as you progress from one Court to another.

It is not the intent, purpose or wish of the Burkburnett Police Department, or of any of the City officials that Burkburnett be known as a "speed trap town." The traffic regulations here are no more strict than you'll find in any other town of like size. The State law is thirty miles inside the City Limits. The twenty-mile zone by the schools is reasonable and approved by the State Highway Department. The traffic lights mean go with the green light and stop on the red light. Cars already in an intersection when the light starts to change have time to clear on across. Those waiting must not dash away until the lane is clear. Parking places at the curb down town are clearly marked. They are roomy enough for any car. Loading zones are so designated. No double parking. The regulations are that simple-just like the ones you find everywhere. From here on out, no more courtesy tickets, no more begging and pleading-just plain, businesslike enforcement.
